S. S. LABRADOR A TOTAL LOSS But the Passengers are Said to be Saved

SEVERAL OF OUR ISLAND MERCHANTS ON BOARD.

Vessel was Wrecked off the Skerry Vore Lighthouse.

HALIFAX March 2.—The Dominion Line Steamer Labrador, which sailed from Halifax on Thursday, went ashore on the Skerry Vore.

It is believed that the vessel is a total loss, but it is thought that all of the passengers were saved.

The Labrador had fifty-six passengers on board, among whom were Agoniceo the political agent of the Filipino Junta; and L. E. Prowse, S. A. McLeod, of the firm of Moore & McLeod, W. W. Stanley, of Stanley Bros., W. A. Huestis, of Perkins & Co., C. J. Leigh, jr., of Messrs. W. A. Weeks & Co., and J. A. McLaren, of James Paton & Co., all of Charlottetown. No particulars have been received yet.

[The Skerry Vore lighthouse, where the steamer is reported to have been wrecked, is twelve miles off Three Island, in the Hebrides of Scotland, and is fifty or sixty miles from any means of telegraphic communication which probably accounts for the lack of particulars.]

Mr E. H. Beer, the agent in Charlottetown of The Dominion Line, received this morning the following telegram from the agents of the Company at Montreal:—"Have just received the following cable from London:—Fear Labrador is a total loss but everybody saved."

Mr George Stanley, who telegraphed the Montreal agents, also received a reply confirming the above despatch regarding the total loss of the ship and stating that the passengers had all been got ashore.

The Skerry Vore is a rock that is dreaded. So rough and wild is the sea that it was only after numerous attempts, all resulting in failure, that a light was at last established upon it. Time and again were the light houses destroyed and washed away; but finally in 1844 the present structure was completed after four years of building. The Skerry Vore light is second in importance only to the famous Eddystone Lighthouse.

LATER

Messrs. James Paton, Geo. Stanley and B. C. Prowse cabled to their London agent through the day for information and received the following telegram in reply:—"Island men all saved."

ANOTHER DESPATCH—ALL SAVED.

LONDON, March 2.—The Labrador struck in a thick fog. The passengers and crew were saved in boats.

One boat landed at Skerry Vore lighthouse. The remainder were picked up by the German steamer Viking.

If the ship is not broken up there will be an endeavor made to save the mails when a steamer can be obtained.

Passengers and crew lost everything they possessed.

There was much excitement when the ship struck; but the fears of the passengers were calmed by the assurance of the captain.

The passengers have been accommodated at hotels and private houses in Tobermory, Scotland.

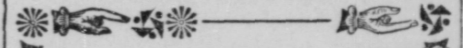

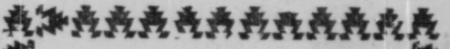
