Dr. DeWolf Hangs Himself.

A dispatch from Kentville, N. S., to the St. John Star, says that Dr. DeWolfe, who has been committed to Kentville jail for the murder of Bessie Harris at Wolfville, hanged himself in his cell on Thursday afternoon. It appears that he got hold of an axe handle and putting it across the stove pipe hole in the roof, he fastened a sheet to it and then around his neck, and kicking away the chair on which he was standing he launched himself into eternity.

A Marvellous Invention.

A London correspondent of the New York Times tells of the discovery of a Mr. Binns, a practical inventor and designer and cotton spinner at Bradford, England, who has constructed machinery which could be set at work at the beginning of the week, and would go ahead until the end without being touched, so long as the steam engine continued to work. He claims that the operation of manufacturing proceeded continuously without tending; that the owner locked up his mill at night and went to bed, while the machines maintained their busy revolutions, turning out miles of silk cords, fringes, trimmings and other things; that whereas he used to employ scores of hands, he now only needed a stoker, a book-keeper, and a few cleaners and packers to put up the produce of his automatic mill. When there is a breakage of the yarn the machine pauses, mends the break and goes on again. Binns thinks of coming to America some day.

Revival of English Trade.

In these days of gloomy reports from the manufacturing centres of the Mother Country, it is refreshing to read the following, which is a Washington, U. S., despatch, received this morning: "The United States Consul at Leeds, Eng., gives encouraging reports of the revival of trade and manufacturers in that district; the woollen trade especially thriving. Customers from France and Austria are beginning to appear in un-wanted numbers. In the flax trade there is a marked improvement; flax machinery in considerable quantities is being imported from the United States. The coal trade continues depressed, the miners working only three days a week.

"The Consul at Leith, Scotland, shows the agricultural interest of Scotland slowly adapting itself to the present condition of things. Rents of farms have been reduced at least 4 per cent. Many cases of sequestration have occurred. The importation of cattle, sheep, &c., from America, increased at a remarkable rate last year."
