King To Cruise Along Dalmatian Coast

(C. F. Cable By Guardian's Special Wire)

LONDON, July 30—No council of state will be appointed to act for the King during his forthcoming holiday in the Mediterranean Sea, it was understood tonight.

The King has made arrangements for the use of the luxurious yacht Nahlin, owned by Lady Yule, widow of Sir David Yule, former wealthy Anglo-Indian merchant.

Official documents and state papers requiring the royal signature will be sent to the King by king's messengers and government messengers at various points along the route, where they will be picked up by two escorting destroyers.

It was learned that the cruise will be along the Dalmatian coast and in the eastern Mediterranean. Probably it will start about Aug. 8 and last about a month. No detailed itinerary has yet been planned but government authorities in London will be kept informed of the King's whereabouts.

The escorting destroyers will be in constant wireless touch with the Admiralty and the King also will be able to contact London directly from the yacht. If any unforeseen developments occur rendering His Majesty's presence in London desirable special arrangements will be made for him to make a speedy journey back.

Captain Doyle, master of the Nahlin, visited St. James's Palace today and discussed arrangements for the cruise with officials of the King's staff.

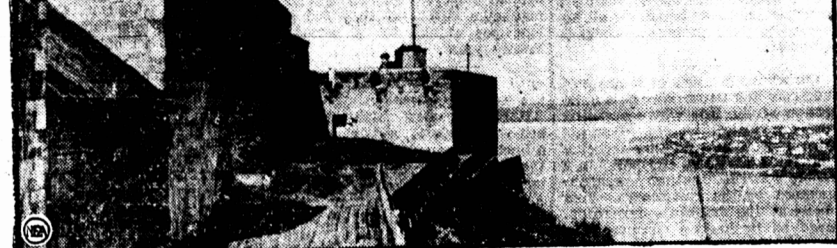

FIREMEN SAVE FAMILY WASH

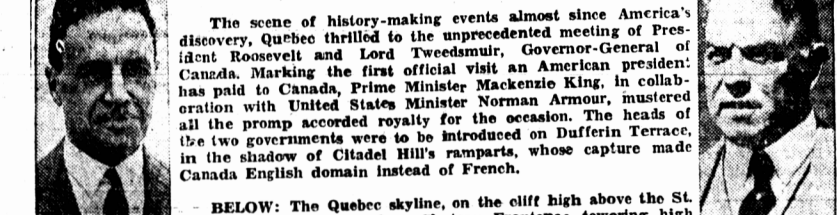

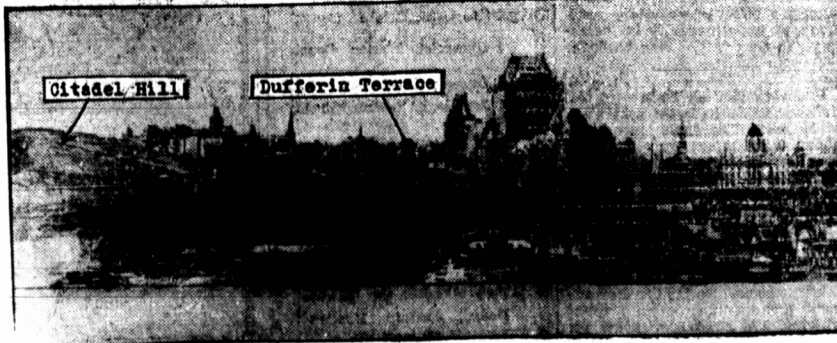

VANCOUVER, July 30—After more than 30 years of distinguished service as Vancouver representative of Toronto Conservatory of Music, Mrs. C. J. WELCH BAKED HAM

(Jessie Read, Dieltian, Toronto Telegram) 1 slice ham, 2-1/2 inches thick. Whole cloves. 1-2 teaspoon dry mustard. 1-3 cups Welch's Grape Juice. 1-2 cup brown sugar. Put ham in baking pan or casserole. Stick cloves into fat, about an inch apart. Rub dry mustard into fat and lean of meat. Cover with Welch's Grape Juice bake covered for one hour at 350 deg. F. KARPIS GETS LIFE FOR KIDNAPPING

ST. PAUL, July 30—Alvin Karpis, co-leader of one of the most ruthless gangs of kidnapers and bank robbers in the nation's history, was sentenced to life imprisonment today for the \$100,000 abduction of William Hamm, Jr., wealthy St. Paul brewer. Charles Fitzgerald, minor member of the gang and the alleged "greeter" in the Hamm kidnaping, also drew a life sentence.

Both men pleaded guilty to the crime. Karpis showed no emotion when Judge M. M. Joyce pronounced sentence. Asked if he had anything to say, he declared that John (Jack) Peifer, convicted Saturday as a conspirator in the abduction, was not involved in the Hamm case. "Jack Peifer is absolutely not guilty because I know the circumstances," Karpis said. "He had nothing to do with the kidnaping."

Fitzgerald, who allegedly jerked Hamm into the kidnap car after greeting him near the Hamm brewery June 15, 1933, also said Peifer had no part in the crime. Meanwhile attorneys for Peifer, whose date of sentencing was set for Wednesday, said they would ask for a new trial tomorrow.

"WORST EVER"

GODERICH, Ont., July 30—Chief of Police R. C. Postlethwaite, on the job for 30 years, has seen a lot of bathing suits in that time, but he says this year's models are the "worst ever." "The young men of today don't seem to have any respect for the ladies and ladies don't appear to care much whether they have or not," commented the chief after a visit to the beach here and at Grand Bend. "It was different when I was a boy," he added. Asked what he thought of the girls' costumes, Chief Postlethwaite replied: "Oh, I leave them to use their own judgment pretty much, but I don't think much of some of the girls' bathing suits—or lack of bathing suits." A by-law dealing with bathing suits states the body must be covered from "neck to knees."
