### Veteran Boxing Ref. Demoted By British Board Of Control

LONDON (CP)—Charles Davidson, veteran British boxing official, Thursday was demoted by the British Boxing Board of Control. Davidson, 58-year-old London chartered accountant and a fight referee for 30 years, said he would "certainly appeal" the board's decision to downgrade him from "star" to an "A-class" referee. The action means Davidson no longer is able to handle world or British title fights, or bouts classed as British championship eliminations. Wednesday Davidson was called before the board to answer complaints about his handling of a bout Sept. 19 between Dick Currie and Frankie Jones for the Scottish flyweight championship. He was alleged to have spoken to people outside the ring between rounds during the fight, which he awarded to Jones on points. Last November Davidson was

concerned in another boxing dispute. His decision of a draw between James J. Parker of Toronto and Ewart Potgieter of South Africa was criticized. Most observers thought the Canadian had won. In Britain, the referee is the sole arbitrator.

### Argonaut Bosses Reflect Bid To Negotiate Sale

TORONTO (CP)—The executive of Toronto Argonauts have scotched rumors that the Big Four football union club may be sold this season by rejecting a bid to negotiate for a syndicate of Toronto businessmen. Joe Wright, club vice-president, said:

"The directors of the Argonaut football club have decided the club is not for sale. We will continue to operate the club in the 1957 season."

The offer to discuss sale came from a syndicate headed by stockbroker Eric Cradock, Charles F. W. Burns and John Bassett, Jr., publisher of the Toronto Telegram.

There have been rumors lately that the last-place Argonauts, who have lost nine of 12 games this season, would be sold.

Both fans and the press have criticized the club executive recently for its poor showing on the field and for the firing last week of backfield coach Bill Earley.

## Rough Riders Seem Sure Of Gaining Play-off Spot

Ottawa Rough Riders, low man on the Big Four Football Union's stunted pole atop at season's opening, now seem certain of seeing their first playoff action in five years.

They move into Toronto today to grapple with the Argonauts and only a 44-point defeat can keep them out of the third and final playoff spot. A victory, on the other hand, could put them within range of the second-place slot, now occupied by Hamilton Tiger-Cats. That, of course, would depend on the outcome of today's game

between the first-place Montreal Alouettes and Ticats in Hamilton.

### Landy May Withdraw Because Of Ban On Olympic Facilities

MELBOURNE (AP)—There were indications Thursday that Landy, world's fastest miler, might withdraw from the Australian Olympic team because of the ban on international competition on Olympic facilities between now and the start of the Games Nov. 22.

Sir William Bridgeford, executive director of the Games, announced the ban earlier this week, saying he did not want a "thousand little Olympic Games in the month ahead."

Landy was unable to compete in the Australian track trials the last two weekends because of bruised tendons in his heels but was named to the team in both the 1,500- and 5,000-metre runs. It was anticipated that he would run himself into condition against the world's best in pre-Olympic contests.

Landy himself had nothing to say. However, other Australian athletes held a protest meeting. Equally bitter were the three members of the British team—Gordon Pirie, Brian Hewson and Ken Wood. They did not attend the protest meeting, however.

Bridgeford's ban closes the Melbourne cricket ground track, site of the games, until competition starts. Workouts, but no competition, may be held at Olympic Park and the University of Melbourne tracks.  
The Australian army, however,

has made a cinder track at Puckapunyal available to the international runners. It is some 65 miles from Melbourne.

Later, however, approval was given for privately run trials between international athletes on Melbourne's four cinder tracks.

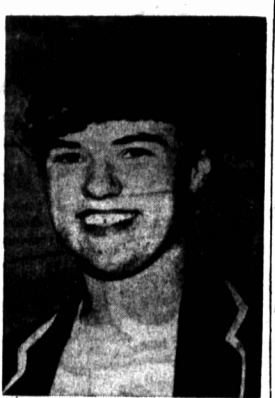
Bill Uren, general manager of the Australian Olympic team, said athletes will get as much and as fast competition as they like. He said trials will be arranged between team managers from all countries but will not be open to the public.

Rocky reiterated his intention to stay retired. "The same reasons that induced me to quit are still good enough to keep me out," he said.

Rocky, with his brother Lou and a few friends from his hometown of Brockton, Mass., arrived in the private plane of Art Peters, a friend from Holland, Mich.

Of the coming fight between Archie Moore and Floyd Patterson, Rocky thinks Moore "has too much on the ball for a youngster like Patterson."

### Great Ruby Team To Visit Canada

VANCOUVER (CP)—The Barbarian Football Club, possibly the greatest name in English Rugby, will visit Canada next year for games in Toronto and Montreal, and British Columbia, the British Columbia Rugby Union announced Thursday.

The British team will leave home by air April 24 after its traditional Easter tour of South Wales and will play in Toronto April 27. It will fly to Vancouver for three and possibly four games in B.C. En route back to Britain the Barbarians will play a final game in Montreal.

### Alouettes May Reach 500 Mark

MONTREAL (CP)—Montreal Alouettes, already holders of the Big Four league scoring record for a season, may become the first team in professional football to reach the 500 mark.

Alouettes have scored 437 points in 12 games this season, with two more to go to collect 63 and hit the 500 total. They have already gone past their 1955 Big Four record of 388, scored in 12 games. They sailed past their old mark last Saturday in trouncing Hamilton Tiger-Cats 22-14.

Statistics indicate that the closest any pro team has come to 500 was the 466 total rolled up in 1950 by Los Angeles Rams of the National Football League.

### Money To Burn Remains Favorite

LONDON (AP)—Money To Burn remained the 1-to-1 betting favorite for the Oct. 31 running of the Cambridgeshire Handicap at a call-over by Britain's top bookmakers Wednesday night—a few hours after 39 horses had been named for the race.

Money To Burn, a three-year-old owned by Lady Belinda Dugdale, is scheduled to carry 102 pounds over the mile and a furlong of the Cambridgeshire course at Newmarket.

Top-weight Hafiz II, owned by Larry MacPhail of Maryland, was coupled with British-owned Retrial as joint 100-to-8 second favorites. The last Irish sweepstake of the season is based on the Cambridgeshire.

### Communist China Protests Against Nationalists

LAUSANNE, Switzerland (AP)—Communist China formally protested Wednesday against the admission of a team from Nationalist China to the Melbourne Olympic Games.

Otto Mayer, chancellor of the International Olympic Committee, said Nationalist China had previously protested against the admission of Communist China. Both protests are to be considered by the committee at Melbourne, but Mayer said the committee would probably reaffirm its decision to admit two Chinese teams.

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### Archie Moore And Patterson Sign For Bout

CHICAGO (AP)—Archie Moore and Floyd Patterson has signed for a Nov. 30 heavyweight title bout at the Chicago Stadium which may pay each fighter \$150,000.

At the signing ceremony, President Norris of the International Boxing Club said the match for Rocky Marciano's vacated crown might produce a \$500,000 net, including \$200,000 from home television.

Moore, light-heavyweight champion, and Patterson will share the 60 per cent slice of the net receipts on a 30-30 basis.

Norris said the stadium will be scaled for a \$471,000 gate with tickets ranging from \$5 to a \$30 top.

"We're shooting at a \$300,000 gate, but this is a very attractive match and that may be a low figure," Norris said. The contracts both fighters signed did not provide for a return bout.

### Don Cockell To Seek Divorce

SEVENOAKS, England (AP)—The pretty wife of Don Cockell, former British heavyweight boxing champion, said Wednesday night she is leaving him for a handsome ex-servant.

Cockell, who lasted nine rounds with Rocky Marciano in San Francisco in 1955, and the sailor, Welshman (Taffy) Clark, brawled in a local saloon. Neither was injured.

Mrs. Cockell, 28, said she met Clark at a dance two months ago. "I've told Don I'm not going back to him," she informed reporters.

"I've been counted out in my biggest fight, said Cockell. I'm He said he would ask custody going to get a divorce.

### Tony Anthony To Fight Wallace At The Garden

NEW YORK (AP)—Tony Anthony of New York and Gordon Wallace of Bramford, Ont., the British Empire light-heavyweight champ, will meet Friday, Dec. 7, at Madison Square Garden in the second stage of a light-heavy elimination series. It will be a 10-round match.

The first of the elimination bouts will be staged Wednesday at Chicago between Chuck Spiveer of Detroit and Will Hopener of Germany.

Archie Moore holds the world's light-heavyweight championship but he meets Floyd Patterson Nov. 30 at Chicago for the heavyweight title vacated by Rocky Marciano. If Moore wins, he automatically will be forced to relinquish his 275-pound crown.

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
