Agricultural Notes.

Stop the churning when the butter is in granules about the size of wheat kernels.

Cablage are splendid winter feed for poultry, and should be saved for that purpose.

Milk for cheese making—whether whole or partly skimmed—should be perfectly sweet.

As ordinarily piled, manure loses much of its value. If a shelter cannot be given it, cart it on to the field soon after it is made.

The trouble with long potatoes is that they tend to become pointed at the end, and this is the beginning of their speedy degeneration in yield and quality.

Be sure your stables are thoroughly ventilated, remove all droppings immediately, and freely use absorbents and deodorizers—such as sawdust, dry earth or cut straw, never omitting a liberal use of plaster.

Far superior to the well water is that of some spring which is brought to various places in and around the farm building from a neighboring hill side. There are very many places where pipes can be laid. There is a great loss sustained by farmers giving or allowing their stock to seek and drink water that is at the point of freezing.

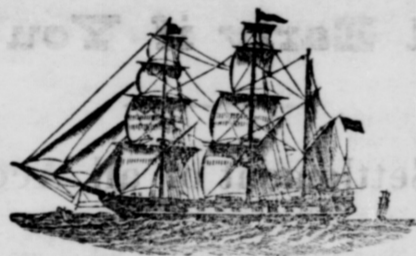
