### Political Parties in Canada.

The Canadian Monthly, for June, contains  
a somewhat remarkable article on the  
above subject. We do not, in every re-  
spect, agree with the writer, but there are  
a few passages in his article worthy of wide  
reading. Speaking of Canadians position  
as colonists, he says:—

"We are now nothing but colonists, a  
political grade just above that of a  
Coolie. The first thing necessary for us is  
the Prince Edward Island suffrage. It is  
to be hoped we shall not have to wait for  
it until they get it in England. Copying  
English Acts of Parliament is the fit occu-  
pation of colonists. Let us now attempt  
something for ourselves."

After a few cutting remarks about the  
old Conservatives, Mr. Norris says:—

"The National Policy is successful and  
will be maintained. It has answered the  
purpose of a revenue tariff, met the defi-  
ciency, and has given protection and encour-  
agement to native industries. There never  
was a measure since Responsible Govern-  
ment was granted so beneficial to the  
country. The fact is the National  
Policy and the Canadian Pacific Railroad  
are the cornerstones of Confederation. They  
flow from it naturally—as naturally as the  
conclusion from the premise; and it is mat-  
ter of the greatest surprise to Canadians  
how it is that any party can be found to  
oppose them."

Considering that the writer surveys the  
ground from an impartial altitude, the  
force of the foregoing is worth a score of  
party editorials. But this even more com-  
plimentary:—

"No one can help coming to the conclu-  
sion that we have received from the Con-  
servative party all we could expect from it  
and more."

Regarding the Reform Party, Mr. Nor-  
ris says:—

"It has been under the control of a man  
during the last twenty years, who was en-  
tirely out of the current of Canadian opin-  
ion and Canadian life. \* \* \* George  
Brown might have said, 'I am the Reform  
Party.' \* \* \* It is an evil thing for a  
party to have as its leader a foreigner. The  
Reform Party has such a leader, and  
hitherto Mr. Blake has not shown that  
strength of character so necessary in a  
leader."

And now, we learn at last, of what the  
Party of Reform consists. It is hybrid:—

"The Reform Party is made up of two  
classes—fossilized Tories and men of Amer-  
ican proclivities."

Perhaps our Reform friends may receive  
a valuable hint from the following, and  
may settle themselves quietly in their pre-  
sent cool shades for some time to come:—

"Now, what is the prospect for the suc-  
cess of the Liberal party at the next elec-  
tions? It is at present very doubtful. The  
people will not tolerate disturbing either  
the National Policy or the Syndicate con-  
tract. These things must be left alone."

### CRICKET.

ADVICE TO YOUNG BATSMEN.

The following advice to young batsmen is  
taken from "Cricket and How to Excel in  
it," by Dr. W. G. Grace:—Cricket, like  
most other games, must be played when  
you are young, if you wish to excel in it,  
and a great deal of practice, patience, and  
a good temper is required to become any-  
thing like a first-class bat. It is of the  
greatest importance for a young player to  
have proper instructions, and to be shown  
a good style of batting at the beginning of  
his cricket career. A correct style and  
position are half the battle; a bad style is  
easily learnt, and when once acquired is the  
most difficult thing in the world to lose.  
In the first place, then, play always with a  
straight bat. If you try to hit a well-  
pitched ball with a crooked bat, and do not  
quite time it you will be bowled out for a  
certainty, whereas had you hit it with a  
straight bat you would have saved your  
wicket. The first object of a batsman is to
