New School Buildings In Ch'Town Royalty

Work was started yesterday by the County Construction Co., on four new school buildings in the Charlottetown Royalty area. Two of these new buildings will serve Central Royalty, and the others will be in Winsloe and East Royalty.

One acre has been purchased in Central Royalty, and the two buildings for this site have been planned on the campus idea, with the possibility of two or three other buildings being added in the future. It is also suggested that the one acre be increased to five at a later date.

Although no definite plan has been made in regard to the former Central Royalty school, it has been proposed that it be moved to the new location and used as an auditorium for the school children of the area.

This new campus is located between the Mt. Edward and Brackley Point roads, and new roads will be cut to link it to already established highways.

The new buildings at Winsloe and East Royalty will each provide for three rooms, and will be located on fields adjoining the sites of the present schools.

Freighter Still Fast On Reef

PORT OF SPAIN, Trinidad, June 26 (CP)—The passenger-cargo vessel Canadiana, constructed here, was fast on a reef off Grenada tonight after an unsuccessful towing attempt by her sistership Canadiana Cruiser.

The Cruiser had turned back from a northbound voyage to Montreal. The vessels are owned by Canadian National Steamships Ltd. Her constructor had a Canadian cargo for Trinidad and South Caribbean ports when she struck the reef Friday. It is understood her side was badly ripped in the grounding and she radiated Jamaica for a tug.

Butchers in the London area had only 10 per cent of their allocated stock. The striking drivers demanded that negotiations on their demand for a weekly increase of 25 shillings be speeded up.

Seek Two Car Loads Yorkshire Sows In P. E. I.

Purchasing orders for two car-loads of Island Yorkshire sows were received here yesterday by Mr. H. W. Clay, Senior Livestock Fieldman for the Dominion Department of Agriculture from Mr. Frank Baker, Western Director of the Industrial Council of Meat Packers, Winnipeg.

The orders are for sows born in April and May and will be shipped to Manitoba in August. It is thought there will be about 70 sows in each car load. These hogs will be distributed among Manitoba breeders by the Relief Fund authorities in Winnipeg so that they will constitute further advertising for Island swine.

These purchases evidently result from the gift car load of gilts which Island farmers are forwarding to flood stricken Manitoba farmers in the surrounding Red River area. This car of hogs will be loaded for its destination on July 3 and 4.

A few more hogs are expected to be contributed to the gift carload so that a full car of young pigs may be sent to the Manitoba farmers.

Andrew MacRae, of Beaton and MacRae's feed mixing plant at Winsloe, has seen to it that the hogs will not go hungry as he has donated one ton of feed for the gilts long trip to their Prairie homes.

Mr. Baker, who made the purchase of the two car loads of sows, will be here in August to judge swine at the Provincial Exhibition.

The court's decision will mean that Lily Aves Duffell, 30, formerly of Middlesex, England, and now believed residing in Toronto, will regain the custody of her young son.

In dismissing the appeal of the foster-parents, Mr. and Mrs. Raymond A. Martin of Toronto, against a judgment handed down by the Ontario Court of Appeal, Mr. Justice J. R. Carwright said in his judgment:

"It is, I think, well settled that the mother of an illegitimate child has a right to its custody."

He said that the mother could only lose her right to the child by abandonment or by "so misconducting herself that in the opinion of the court her character is such as to make it improper that the child should remain with her."

There was no evidence that Miss Duffell had either abandoned the baby "or that her conduct and character are other than excellent."

He added that the wishes of the mother "must be given effect unless very serious and important reasons require that, having regard to the child's welfare, they must be disregarded."

Unwed Mother Regains Custody Of Adopted Child

OTTAWA, June 26 (CP)—Five justices of the Supreme Court of Canada today unanimously decided that a two-year-old child should be returned to his unwed mother, although she had previously allowed the child to be adopted by foster-parents.

This decision, ending a long court battle by the mother for the return of her child, is expected to set a precedent for other adoption cases in Canada. It may mean that other mothers may seek the recovery of children given out in adoption.

(At Toronto, Gourley L. Howell, who acted for the mother in the case, said such recovery depends upon whether the mother files her intention to revoke her consent to adoption within a two-year period after she has given her consent. After two years, when adoption papers have been finally taken out by the adopted parents, such recovery is not legally possible, he said.)

The report of the building committee was given by Mr. B. Davis who paid tribute to Mr. C. G. O'Brien, General Secretary of the Institute for the excellent manner in which he conducted the task of setting the building into workmanlike condition.

This morning most of the specialists will begin their series of meetings which extends through the conference. At nine o'clock the Engineering section, the Society of Animal Production and the Canadian Phytopathological Society will hold separate meetings. Six since of Wales College. The Soils Section will meet at 10 o'clock and one hour later the Scholarship Committee will meet.

C.N.R. President Speaks On World Trade

(By The Canadian Press) HALIFAX, June 26—World trade conditions are seriously affecting Canada but "there is nothing to be gained by wringing our hands," president Donald Gordon of Canadian National Railways said tonight.

"We must vigorously pursue the search for new markets—particularly in the United States where devaluation has given us a competitive advantage," Mr. Gordon said in a speech prepared for delivery to the Halifax Board of Trade, now celebrating its 200th anniversary.

In the U.S., "the enlightened views held by the administration give promise of breaking down some of the ramparts of economic nationalism which have long obstructed the entry of Canadian goods into the American market."

"We must look to the development of our natural resources to see whether they can be processed still further... or whether they can be combined to turn out the kind of products for which markets are already available."
