## Strange But True

To date 25,000 prisoners have been murdered in Korea, and this is a grim reminder of the horrors of war. Last year the Chrysler automobile plant in Detroit went on strike. The walk-out lasted 90 days and cost \$1,287,918, 080. The strikers lost \$78,918,000 in wages; part time workers lost \$27,000,000, and 6 1-2 million were unable to purchase the normal \$272,000,000 worth of supplies, while \$910,000,000 is the loss ascribed to dealers and factory. Who won? Nobody. . . . It bomb were dropped anywhere near Union Square, New York City, 75,000 persons would die immediately, perhaps twice that number would be dangerously wounded, and the city of skyscrapers would become a huge pile of rubble. To cope with such an emergency, 24,000 pieces of equipment including welders, dynamite, hydraulic jacks and over half a million pints of blood is being placed in readiness.

Unquestionably the world's most costly substance is produced in the Sam's \$500,000,000 Oak Ridge radio-isotope plant. In 1949 the plant produced less than one ten-thousandth of an ounce and the average shipment of isotopes weighed less than the graphite in a man's pencilled signature. The stuff is dangerous to handle, so must be stored in lead-sheathed tunnels. Workmen use long poles in handling the stuff, looking at their job through mirrors, since a direct gaze, even through plastic is too dangerous. Should the worker happen to get sprinkled with this deadly material he is rushed to a special shower in special containers weighing as much as hundreds of pounds.
