Urges Patterson To Get Heavyweight Bout Going

CHICAGO (AP) — Jim Norris, president of the International Boxing Club, urged champion Floyd Patterson's manager Wednesday to "fight for any promoter, but let's get the heavyweight division activated again." The IBC and Patterson's manager, Gus D'Amato, long have been at odds, although Norris declared any grievance has been imaginary on D'Amato's part. Norris is here for today's signing of middleweight champion Carmen Basilio and Sugar Ray Robinson for their March 25 title bout at the Chicago Stadium. "D'Amato says he won't do business with the IBC because we failed to live up to an agreement to get bouts for some of his preliminary fighters," said Norris. "I thought I straightened that out after Patterson defeated Archie Moore for the heavyweight title. But I suspect this attitude of D'Amato's all was planned and if it wasn't that point, he would have picked another argument to back away. "If I was a manager with the heavyweight champion of the world, I'd let other managers whose only living comes from preliminary fighters get some food for their table. PATTERSON IS PAWN "Patterson simply is being used as a pawn in this thing, but I say let D'Amato go box for any promoter he wants to—and I'd like a chance to compete with any other promoter—and let's get the heavyweight division activated again." Norris said had the IBC been able to work with D'Amato "at least one logical contender" already would have been fought with another title match in prospect for June.

Bobby Boyd, Holly Mims Battle To 10-Round Draw

MIAMI BEACH, Fla. (AP)—Chicago's Bobby Boyd and ring-wise Holly Mims of Washington battled to a 10-round draw Wednesday. Boyd was floored for the mandatory count of eight in the eighth round. Mims, fighting for the first time since last April 19, came on strong in the later rounds and was sharper with the fewer punches he landed. The veteran of 10 years of ring warfare frequently tied up the younger Boyd but couldn't find the companion of the hard right to the jaw that sent Boyd to the canvas midway in the eighth. Boyd, 2½ to 1 favorite, sent looping rights and lefts to Mims' head but they didn't slow up the rugged Washington fighter, who clinched frequently and worried Boyd with his arm-lock tactics. Referee Eddie Coachman and judge Eddie Teal called the fight even while judge Barry Pearson saw it 96-94 for Boyd. The Associated Press card had it even.

Suspend Tennis Star Rochon

MONTREAL (CP) — Indefinite suspension of Henri Rochon, who has played on 10 Canadian Davis Cup teams, was announced Wednesday by the Province of Quebec Lawn Tennis Association. The 33-year-old southpaw ranked No. 7 nationally and No. 3 provincially in 1957, said he is considering an appeal. The suspension by the PQLTA was for "conduct deemed unethical, derogatory and detrimental to the association and to tennis in general." The formal resolution was prepared by a statement saying Rochon appeared before the council last Sept. 19 regarding complaints and that Rochon "has openly admitted statements for publication to the effect that the 1956 council's attitude was 'disgusting.'"

Canadiens Beat Maple Leafs 2-0

TORONTO (CP) — Leftwinger Dickie Moore and centre Jean Beliveau scored late in the third period Wednesday night to give Montreal Canadiens a 2-0 victory over Toronto Maple Leafs in a National Hockey League game that produced a severe crackdown on players who beef about penalties. The two ace Montreal forwards broke up the game in the last six minutes and handed Leafs, tied for fourth place with Boston Bruins, their 21st loss in 45 games this season. Canadiens extended their lease at the top of the league to 19 points over the second spot New York Rangers. Russians Plan Tennis Campaign

MOSCOW (AP) — The Russians, planning to make 1958 their big kick-off year in tennis, hope to net former amateur champion Fred Perry of Britain to get the ball rolling. The Soviet seek Perry's help in organizing their first major international tennis tournament in Moscow this summer. In particular they look for the former titleholder to line up players competing in this year's Wimbledon championships. The Russians, for the first time, will participate in the Wimbledon junior division competition this year. They also are attending the European Gallea Cup tournament for boys and a Rumanian tournament at which they hope to meet top American talent. Victor Kollegorsky, head of the tennis section of the Soviet state committee for physical culture and sport, said Wednesday his committee had been corresponding with Perry and the Briton has promised to help the Russians with their July 20-27 international tourney.
