

First Cargo Of Gypsum Arrives From Newfoundland

With the arrival of the M.V. Fergus direct from Cornerbrook Nfld. carrying a cargo of gypsum wall-board and gypsum laths, production by L.M. Poole and Co. who are handling the product in this province, cement and an additional quantity of wallboard will be carried on the next trip from Cornerbrook.

Another favourable indication of increased trade between the two provinces is shown by recent shipments from St. John's of birch plywood, hardwood flooring, fireproof doors, all of fine quality. On the outward trips from Charlottetown to St. John's the "Fergus" has always carried a full load of general produce.

Shippers at Cornerbrook are well pleased with this new development as it provides a direct contact between them and the Maritime Provinces by water. On the next trip the "Fergus" will call at Pictou. The "Fergus" is owned and operated by the Gulf and Northern Shore Shipping Co. of Pictou, with head office at Charlottetown.

Army And Navy Corps In Joint Manoeuvre Yesterday

Members of Prince Edward Island's Army and Navy corps yesterday engaged in a joint manoeuvre on the frigate H.M.C.S. Lanark and the H.M.C.S. Fort Erie. The ships left Charlottetown at 9 a.m. yesterday morning and arrived back at the Railway Wharf shortly after 6 p.m. in the evening.

During the voyage, actuality demonstrations of the operations of the different parts of the ships were enacted by crew members of the vessels. For the convenience of the instructors, the guests were divided into small groups. Radio stations were set up at various points on the frigates and regular connections were made with persons at other points on the ships, with persons on the other boat, and also with land divisions which moved at a comparative speed to and from Summerside.

GOVERNOR PROWSE ABOARD

Crews aboard the ships were honored by the presence of Lieutenant Governor T.W.L. Prowse. His Honour took the cruise aboard the H.M.C.S. Lanark, where he also read the lesson during the church services which were held on board during the trip towards the western port.

The vessels covered the 52 mile voyage to Summerside in three hours and forty-five minutes at speeds between 16 and 17 knots per hour. During the voyage both ships demonstrated anti-submarine gun action with the use of imaginary targets. They tied up at the Summerside wharf at 12:45 and remained there until 2:15 p.m. While there, they made a partial exchange of crews with the land division.

Atlantic Provinces Teachers Discuss Problems At Meeting

The Atlantic Conference of high ranking teachers and officers of the teachers' organizations of P.E.I., Nfld., N.B., and N.S., have just concluded a two-day session at Charlottetown.

Among important topics discussed were recruitment and retention of teachers, problems of financing education.

Increased enrolments have aggravated the already acute shortage of teachers in all of the Atlantic provinces. An accelerated program of teacher recruitment appears necessary. The delegates selected suitable candidates for admission to teacher training institutions and measures necessary to retain a large proportion of those entering teaching should go hand in hand with the recruitment program.

This contribution will be forwarded today to the Synod office at Halifax for furtherance direct to the Disaster Fund Committee at Springhill. Rev. Canon J.T. Ibbot announced that a further contribution would be made next Sunday by members of the congregation and also by the Sunday School children.

Local Men Participated In Aiding Disaster Victims

Sinclair Cutcliffe and City police officer Hugh MacKinnon returned from Springhill early yesterday morning after assisting in the surface preparations for the reception of victims of the mine catastrophe. They arrived in Springhill at three o'clock on Thursday with a companion from Amherst and were joined by a pipeline mine mechanic at the pit-head when he came off duty with a view to setting up camp several miles away, intending to do some shooting on Friday.

Having completed the job and on nearing Springhill on return, they noticed the pall of smoke hovering over the pit-head area. They were told of the disaster and at once volunteered for duty of any kind. All night Thursday they were assembling and marking equipment as it arrived and was distributed to a temporary hospital set up in the Armouries. All through the night on Friday they were assigned to the movement of tanks and buckets of hot coffee and early Saturday morning they were assigned to ambulance duty in moving the injured to hospital, as they were brought out of the pit.

Mr. Cutcliffe said last evening that the heartrending scene of watchful waiting by relatives over the entire period between four o'clock on Thursday and when he left there at midnight on Saturday was distressing in the extreme.

Describes Hardships Of Catholics In China Today

The sufferings and hardships being endured by the Chinese people in the defense of their Catholic faith and the challenge facing the youth of the free world today were vividly outlined by Miss Elizabeth Reid, noted Far East correspondent and newspaper editor, in speaking yesterday afternoon at the Catholic Youth Festival held at Saint Dunstan's University.

Miss Reid also spoke last night delivering a public lecture on "China Today" in the University auditorium. Her lectures were highlights of an inspiring afternoon and evening.

Miss Reid based her afternoon address on the words "Challenge", "Strategy" and "Response" pointing out the challenge facing the Church, the strategy that could be used by lay people in meeting the challenge and the response that is needed from the individual members.

In reference to the challenge facing the Church in the Far East she cited the case of the Bishop of Hong-Kong who had been imprisoned by the Reds for three years. (At the time Miss Reid was living in Hong Kong, the editor of the Sunday Examiner in that centre.)

She recalled that the people prayed for three years for the Bishop's release. Then the Vicar General of the Hong Kong Diocese ordered a Black Fast, a day during which the Catholics of the area neither took any food or liquid a few days later on October 7, the Feast of the Holy Rosary, word was received that the Bishop had been released and was at the border awaiting entrance to freedom.

She described the return of the Bishop, clad in coolie clothes and the tremendous joy in which his people greeted him back of how they vested him on the train and of the manner in which they revered him after his release as a symbol of suffering and courage.

She recalled other incidents of the manner in which Chinese people are suffering for their faith as she spoke of the challenge of prayer and penance which faces Christians here in the Free world.

Miss Reid recalled that Pope Pius XII had said that he had great need of his lay people as well as his Bishops, Priests and Sisters in spreading the faith and that it is the responsibility of each one to make Christ visible in our own lives. Miss Reid was introduced to the group by Miss Claire Burge.

Most Reverend Malcolm A. MacEachern, Bishop of Charlottetown stressed the importance of each one working to save other souls besides his own. "Spiritual selfishness is a most horrible thing," stated His Excellency. "We must work to save other souls."

He told the group that they should not be afraid to speak up and proclaim salvation. "There are too many silent in this important matter," he stated.

The day's activities were attended by members of the Basilica Youth Club, Liguorian Youth Club and Catholic Actionists from nearby parishes.

Activities opened in the morning at eleven o'clock with Mass.
