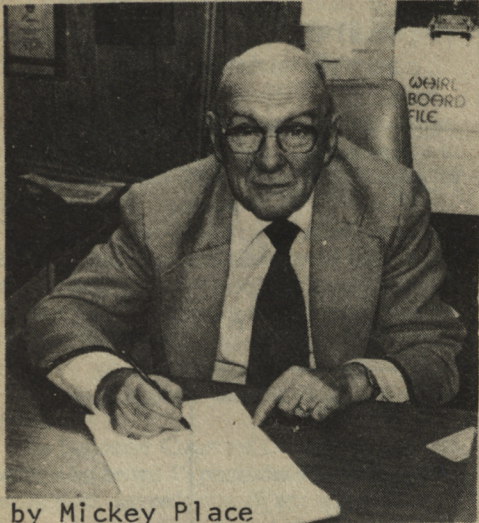


# ONLY FAIR SUCCESS
