In last spot were New Glasgow, Moncton K. of P. and Edmundston, N.B., with 16-24 records.

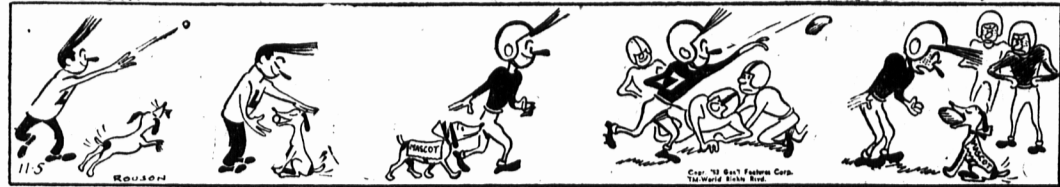
Dartmouth set a record for the highest team total with 1,673, one better than the old mark set by Moncton Rodolphs.

## Sport Echoes From Prince County

In spite of adverse weather conditions work goes on at the site of the new Summerside "Big Five" rink. We were out to see how things were progressing yesterday and although rain was falling intermittently the construction gang was busy at the work of excavating and laying the cement foundations. Looking at them gives a fellow a grand and glorious feeling.

It is hard to tell at this stage of operations just when the rink will be ready for even limited activities. If we are to have ice in the building this winter, even if a little late, it would seem to be a good idea to have a hockey program of some kind. After all, the Bedeque Ring doesn't have artificial ice, and they surely have a pretty ambitious program each year. We wouldn't be at all surprised if it were a profitable program too.

**Won't Enter Court**

"Since Marcotte has shown his wish to play with our club, we shall defend his right to do so," Marcotte signed with Frontenacs, new entry in the Quebec Junior Hockey League, with approval of the executive of the Quebec Amateur Hockey Association. Last season he played with Quebec Citadelles, who were ousted by the QAHA and now are playing in the junior division of the Ontario Hockey Association, with QAHA approval.

**Backed Citadelles**  
 Citadelles took the matter to the Canadian Amateur Hockey Association, which last week ruled in Citadelles' favor.

Martineau indicated Frontenacs will adhere to the QAHA decision, which okayed Frontenacs' acquisition of Marcotte. Martineau said he doesn't know if the QAHA can reverse its decision.

## Saints Defeat Prince Of Wales 3-0 On Kelly's Try

The Saint Dunstan's University Intermediate team defeated Prince of Wales College 3-0 on picking quarter John Kelly's try yesterday afternoon to take a one game lead in the Provincial Intermediate Intercollegiate series.

Kelly, who played the first half and part of the second as fullback was moved up behind the scrum by coach John Eldon Green late in the game. He scored shortly after the switch, crossing the Welshmen's line at the twenty-five minute mark of the last half.

The slightly built picking quarter ducked and dodged his way to scoring territory from a scrum on the Prince of Wales ten yard line. He took the ball as it came out of the scrum and raced through a maze of players to fall over the line in the far right hand corner.

The teams went into the second game on an even-temper basis as the result of their 10-10 draw in the opener. They both opened at a fast pace with the Welshmen forcing the play.

There were few good scoring opportunities in the first half as the battle sea-sawed back and forth between the 'twentys-fives. In the second half, the Saints with the wind behind them, controlled play but had only three good scoring chances as they could not crack the stubborn P. W. C. defense.

The Saints could easily have added to their totals on penalty kicks inside the Welshmen's 25 yard line. However they missed three chances from about twenty yards out.

Norris Mizuno, Prince of Wales College inside half, played a standout game for the losers. Time after time in the second half he held the Welshmen together as he ran for twenty yard gains or rallied his backfield to stop the Saints' offense.

In the first half the Welshmen almost hit paydirt before the game was five minutes old. They marched to the Saints line but a ground kick of a loose ball by a Saint Dunstan's forward relieved the pressure.

Jim Gaudet ripped through the Welshmen's line for long gains late in the first half as the Saints backfield began to move. Defensively John B. Fisher stood out for the winners with his low tackling. Fisher and Max Callaghan showed the only low tack-

lers of the afternoon. Gaudet and Billy MacIsaac of Saint Dunstan's both came close to scoring in the second half but were stopped at the Prince of Wales five yard line. Kickbacks by Rollie Lee and Dave MacLeod relieved the pressure for the losers on both occasions.

A half-line run by Jack MacDonald and MacIsaac set the stage for the only scoring play of the game. MacIsaac after taking a pass from MacDonald raced to the Welshmen's ten. Kelly then scored from the scrum.

During the last five minutes play ranged around centrefield. As the final whistle blew the Welshmen were in St. Dunstan's territory with Mizuno leading an attack.

The game was capably handled by Earl Nicholson.
