### Restoration Of Hapsburgs Again Revived

(A. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) PARIS, June 5.—The Archduke Otto was reported in Switzerland near the Austrian border tonight awaiting the result of his appeal for the restoration of the Hapsburg throne.

The Austrian legation insisted he was still in his Belgian exile.

French officials were awaiting a report from the minister in Vienna, and said France would uphold the Rumanian, Yugoslavian and Czechoslovakian allies in "whatever action" they decided upon "in the event Otto should return against their opposition."

### Pioneers Eke Out Victory Over Wings

Perce McCabe's sizzling single over second base with two out and the bases loaded in the last of the ninth sent Dods and W. Durant of the Pioneers across the plate with the tying and winning runs to end a bang up game of baseball last night. The score was 7-6. The game was a pitchers duel between Herman Durant of the Pioneers and Roy Daly of the Red Wings. "Pony" was supreme for eight innings allowing but five scattered blows but weakened momentarily in the ninth to allow two on bases with one out. Big Jim Wilson went to Daly's aid but the fire of Tuesday evening was not present and he allowed Steel to single filling the bases. He struck out H. Durant for the second out but Perce McCabe who had previously struck four times in four tries brought the game to a dramatic end with a line drive that went for a single and credited Wilson with a loss.

Durant pitched steady effective ball after the first inning when he was nipped for three hits and three runs. Phillips, Ward and Lidstone scored on the strength of three singles and two costly errors at third. Millman got the Pioneers first run in the last of the first when he walked, stole second and reached third on a wild pitch and scored on Larkins' sacrifice. Jim Millman and H. Durant added another brace in the Pioneers half of the third on three singles. Dave Larkin showed his batting eye of last year by driving in both runs with a perfect liner to right.

In the Red Wings half they added three runs to double the score as the Pioneers allowed three errors and a single scratch hit. Wilson and the Clow brothers were the scorers but this brought the Wings bats to silence for the rest of the game as Durant lightened up and his mates showed the pep and spirit that win ball games. Millman added a run in the sixth, Ward one in the eighth and then the Pioneers pushed two across in the ninth.

Incidents of the game were, the spectacular base running of Millman, Lidstone's nonchalant one hand stab of Willard Durant's long hit to deep centre in the fourth and excellent fielding by LeBlanc, Larkin and E. Ward in the outer gardens. Jack Wright appeared behind the plate for the first time and turned in an excellent job. He was mainly responsible for the completion of the nine innings by keeping the game going smoothly and quickly at all times. The series is now tied at one game apiece.

The final game of the series, which is one to get the boys in shape while a decision on the Island League is given by Charlottetown, will take place at the school diamond Tuesday sharply at 6:15 p. m.

When the Supreme Court at Summerside resumed yesterday morning, His Lordship, Mr. Justice Arsenault addressed the jury on the Muttart case.

His Lordship pointed out that there were several classes of criminals. This case had to deal with those who do not intentionally commit a crime, but through not using reasonable care to safeguard the public, transgress against that part of the Criminal Code, which says, that anyone having in their possession a thing, inanimate or animate, which is dangerous to the public, and through neglect or carelessness in its use endangers public life is guilty of criminal negligence. This His Lordship pointed out is the means the law uses to safeguard the public.

There is no question, that all over the world the automobile has brought about serious problems, that in many ways have caused death and accidents. These problems have received the attention of governments, and have been in the courts in civil and criminal action. A person operating an automobile

### Ralph Muttart Given Two Year's Suspended Sentence

Found Guilty Of Criminal Negligence. Jury Strongly Recommended Court's Clemency.

Two years' suspended sentence with recommendation for cancellation of his automobile driver's license was given Ralph Muttart of Summerside yesterday by Justice A. E. Arsenault when a Supreme Court jury found the driver of the automobile which killed Walter Clark of Kensington last November guilty of criminal negligence. The jury strongly recommended the court's clemency.

Muttart was tried on a charge of manslaughter laid against him in connection with Clark's instant death when a horse and wagon he was driving were struck by the accused's car.

The verdict was returned under section 284 of the Criminal Code of Canada, which provides imprisonment for two years to anyone found guilty by negligently causing bodily injury to any person.

Mr. K. M. Martin, K. C., made a plea on the prisoner's behalf when called for sentence. He asked the court to take into consideration his comparative youth, his hitherto blameless character, after fifteen years of blameless car driving, and that the civil claim for damages had been settled, and lastly the very strong recommendations for mercy contained in the verdict of the jury.

His Lordship in passing sentence, stated that he would take into consideration the representations made by counsel. He would also consider the fact there was no criminal intention on the part of the accused and that after the accident he did not run away but rendered all the assistance he could. Also that his previous record was good and that this was the first time in this province there had been a conviction under section 284 in a matter of this kind. In view of all this and the fact that the jury had strongly recommended mercy, he would suspend sentence and the prisoner be released on his own recognizance to be of good conduct, during a period of two years and a recommendation to the governor in council that the prisoner's license would be cancelled, if one has been issued and none be issued for a period of one year from this date.

His Lordship said, that he had on previous occasions let young men off on suspended sentences and he had never had cause to regret having done so and felt he would have no reason in doing so on this occasion. As he had previously remarked, he considered that anyone who has killed a man not with intent is punished severely with his own state of mind but that some punishment is necessary to act as a deterrent to others. The court adjourned until Monday morning.

because he may drive fast, does not necessarily imperil the public. Fast driving does not necessarily mean bad driving. Speed must be regulated according to the nature of the road. If a driver speeds up on a long stretch of road, that is more or less his own concern; but if he has not a full view, if he speeds, then he does so at his own risk. Under the Criminal Code, drivers are under an obligation to any thing that is dangerous and every one must take precaution not to injure the public in the use of such things. His Lordship pointed out that it was for the jury to weigh the evidence and to decide whether the prisoner was using reasonable care. One driver saw the horse and wagon and the other did not. Twilight is admitted to be a dangerous time to drive, but that is more reason one should drive more carefully.

The prisoner said, he had his car under control, it was quite evident that he had not. Prisoner may have been looking at the approaching car and that is why he did not see the wagon. His Lordship went on to say that no one wants to convict a young man for an accident. Punishment for crime is given as a deterrent for others. If crime is left unpunished others are encouraged. The law must protect life and property. If the prisoner was guilty of criminal negligence he should not go unpunished. It would cause others to take chances. It has always been the law that anyone must not endanger life and property. If you do so you come within the law.

Fatal accidents sometimes happen through the victims own fault, and not the fault of the person handling the instrument. This is called misadventure. The question here is, Was this a misadventure or was the prisoner using reasonable care in operating his car. If you think he did use reasonable care then the verdict is not guilty.

His Lordship said, that he believed it was the duty of those operating horse drawn vehicles to carry lights for their own protection, very frequently at night when two cars meet a carriage is blotted out. The public however, must understand when they drive a motor vehicle, they must drive slowly until any danger is past. That is the only way the public must be protected. No one has any desire to punish, but His Lordship said, he had the desire to let the public know that they must operate a car in a reasonable way.

If you find the operator of the car negligent you must not let anything stand in your way of saying so. The twilight and black road, on which lights do not reflect, made driving dangerous and was an element in this case. The overshadowing trees had something to do with the accident. These things must be taken into consideration. It is possible the young man was keeping his eye on the other car and not watching what was ahead, and possibly going at too high a speed.

An amendment of the Criminal Code provides that a jury may bring in a verdict of criminal negligence in place of manslaughter. If you have any reasonable doubt you have to give the prisoner the benefit of that doubt.

The jury left the witness box at 11:15.

RAISING THE INVALID'S BED

### New Trial For Dan Bannister June 24

(C. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) FREDERICTON, N. B., June 5.—J. Bacon Dickson, deputy attorney-general, announced today the Crown would not enter an appeal from the judgment of the appeals division of the New Brunswick Supreme Court granting Daniel Bannister a new trial on the charge of murdering Philip Lake.

Bannister's second trial will be heard before the court of the King's bench for Westmorland County on June 24th when the court opens with Justice J. H. A. L. Fairweather of Saint John presiding. The new trial was granted on grounds of mis-direction by the trial judge.

Unless clemency is granted Arthur Bannister will hang on June 20 in the Westmorland County jail.

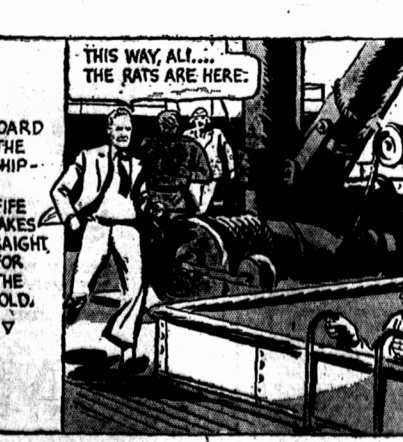
