DEATH OF AN OLD AND RESPECTED IRISHMAN.—Mr. Michael Hughes died of paralysis at his residence, Fort Augustus, on Monday, the 14th inst. THE case of C. Bonoit, charged with a breach of the Canada Temperance Act, was resumed at the Stipendiary Magistrate's Court this forenoon. Mr. Peters appeared on behalf of the prosecution, and Mr. Davies for the defence. Mr. Davies argued (1) that the information should specify the exact date on which the liquor was sold, and the conviction should be confined to that date; (2) that every selling is a different offence, and (3) that the fine cannot be more than \$50 for the first offence, and more than \$100 for the second. Mr. Peters argued to the contrary, stating (1) that as long as liquor is proven sold it is not necessary to state in the information when, or to whom. (2) That the act left the lines in the discretion of the magistrates to impose according to the gravity of the offence. The magistrate after hearing the defence adjourned until to-morrow. Mr. Martin who appeared on behalf of Mrs. Hoggan stated that the point in her case raised in his case was the same as those raised by Mr. Davies, and he therefore asked for an adjournment of that case, which was granted.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

CANADIAN.

HALIFAX, Nov. 20. The schooner Enterprise, Captain Hurstou, from Windsor, bound to Parrsboro in ballast, was capsized near Partridge Island, off the latter port, on Friday. Three men on board took to the small boat, but were swamped and all went down. The two with Capt. Hurstou were John Haws and a Dutchman, name unknown. The vessel was afterwards towed into Parrsboro.

UNITED STATES.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 20. Late yesterday afternoon, as Guiteau was being conveyed from the court room to the jail, in a covered van, a person on horseback rode up to the side and after peering through the grating to satisfy himself as to Guiteau's position, suddenly fired two shots through the side of the vehicle, then put spurs to his horse and rode away at a furious pace. One shot was harmless and the other inflicted a slight wound in Guiteau's hand. The prisoner was nearly overcome with fear, but was hurried to prison. During the evening a man named Wm. Jones, a farmer living in the outskirts of the city, was arrested as the person who fired the shot. He is an eccentric individual who is well known to the police. To-day, one of the guards who was accompanying the van, and who fired at the assailant, positively failed to identify Jones, and states that he is not the man. Various rumors are in circulation in the eastern part of the city regarding attempts which will be made to shoot Guiteau. Many persons are believed to have concurred in an action with that result, in view of what has taken place since the trial commenced. No apprehension is felt by the officers of the jail that any further attempts will be made to take the life of the prisoner.

BOONEVILLE, Mo., Nov. 30.

Thomas S. McDerman, marshal of this city, shot and killed A. B. Thornton, editor of the Booneville News, greenback organ, yesterday afternoon. The News yesterday morning had an article reflecting on McDerman's official acts, and indulging in some personal abuse.

NEW YORK, Nov. 20.

Quigley W. Hawks, builder, made an assignment yesterday. In September he put twenty-seven mortgages on record in one day, aggregating \$200,000. His liabilities are reported to be very large. Rev. BOSTON, Nov. 20.

Colonel Needham, bank examiner, stated to-night that the capital of the suspended Pacific National Bank is \$1,000,000, with another million for which stockholders will be drawn upon, will suffice to pay all depositors and other creditors. The Central National Bank, which is involved in the Pacific failure to the extent of \$900,000, has secured sufficient aid to tide over its liabilities, and will continue business on Monday as usual, it being stated that they have \$250,000 over and above what can be demanded by its creditors and depositors. Cashier Young, of the latter bank, whose surreptitious transactions with the President of the Pacific Bank caused trouble in the Central Bank, has been discharged.

EUROPEAN.

TUNIS, Nov. 19.

Four Arabs implicated in the massacre of twelve employes at Oued Zurga railway station, were executed here to-day. It has been decided that an army corps 20,000 strong will continue to occupy the principal point of the regency until January 4th, 1882.

LONDON, Nov. 20.

Sir Charles Dilke had an interview with Gambetta and Rouvier, Minister of Commerce, yesterday. It was found impossible to fix any date for the immediate resumption of treaty negotiations, though there is still reason to hope they will be resumed shortly.
