

Moncton Hawks In 3-1 Win Over Beavers

MONCTON, N.B., Dec. 5 — (CP) — Moncton Hawks, growing stronger in each outing in the Maritime Major Hockey League, tonight trimmed league-leading Saint John Beavers 3-1.

The win left the Hawks in sole possession of third place in the league standing.

Ronnie Rowe started Hawks off to victory when he rapped in Morris Hamilton's pass midway through the first period. Other Hawk marksmen were defencemen Sandy Milne and George Scholes.

Beavers averted a shutout in the third period when Kenny Watson fired an unassisted goal.

The game was a hard-hitting, fast-moving affair all the way with the Hawks employing a forward checking game which has

kept them unbeaten in their last three games.

Beavers were marked so closely that they were able to get only one shot on the Moncton net up to the time Hawks had rapped in two tallies in the first period.

Hawks were on the offensive all the time, breaking up the Beavers pattern plays before they got organized in the Saint John end. They pumped 11 shots at Phil Hughes in the first period while Lockhart was handling four in the Moncton end.

Play was even in the second period, both goals handing an equal number of shots. But Hawks capitalized on the breaks, Burman setting up Scholes for the game-clincher at the 14-minute mark.

Beavers applied the pressure in the last period, but again the close checking of the Hawks held them at bay until the 15-minute mark when Watson batted in the lone Saint John tally.

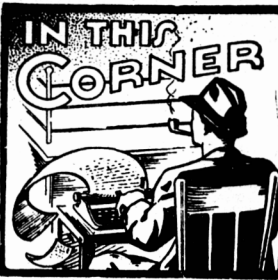

The phones were kept busy last night as numerous worried fans called up to inquire about the unfortunate injury to Hal Gordon. Hal, whose goal tending has put the Islanders into second place in the league standings, received a cut on the upper lip running upwards towards the nose which required several stitches. The cut was near the one which he received in an earlier game at Saint John and while Hal could probably play Friday night, club officials have decided that Hal should get a well-earned rest.

Supporters of the Islanders will regret to see "Red" Favero wearing a Glace Bay uniform. "Red," who was among the first players to join the Islanders when they were formed last year, was one of the team's hardest working players and highest scorers. Although he gave away a lot of poundage to most of the opposing players "Red" never stepped back from any of them and he fought in the corners for the puck with the biggest of the defencemen.

As coach Lamoureux said the Miners wanted somebody worthwhile and in Favero they got somebody worth while. "Red" in the past two years, has done a lot for the Islanders and for Charlottetown in helping to put it back on the hockey map. His goal scoring and penalty killing achievements here will not be forgotten here for some time and he can always feel secure about having a second home in this city. A quiet spoken player, he was always easy to approach by the press and we hope that his efforts with the Miners will be as successful as they were with the Islanders.

Seven appears to be the Islanders' lucky or unlucky number. They commenced the season by losing seven games in a row and then came back to win seven and tie one before they were defeated. Last night they were defeated again after running up an unbeaten streak of seven games. In the seven games previous to last night the Islanders had won five and lost two. On top of that the Millionaires were playing without the services of seven of their players. The men missing were MacIntyre, Petersen, Levandoski, Marineau, Frezell, MacBride and Prokop.

If there is such a thing as a jinx in hockey the Millionaires have it over the Islanders in Sydney ice. The Islanders have yet to win their first game in Sydney. Last night's loss made it three this year and last season the Millionaires defeated the Islanders twice, tied one and left one unfinished in four games in the steel city. Forum. There's another jinx too—the Millionaires have not won on Island ice this year.

Johnny Horeck apparently took Leo Lamoureux's remarks about his inability to coach to heart and now has his team in sole possession of third place as the result of the Hawks 3-1 win over the Beavers. The Hawks evidently used the same system of play against the Beavers as they did against the Islanders and with greater returns. One thing the Moncton forwards have is speed and they are fast enough to keep the opposing team disorganized and to take advantage of the breaks which come as the result. But what kind of a game would it be if both teams played the same style of hockey?

Islanders Suffer 5-2 Defeat At Hands Of Sydney Millionaires

SYDNEY, N.S., Dec. 5 — (CP) — Charlottetown Islanders, at their burly best, couldn't stop a short-staffed Sydney Millionaire team tonight as the defending Maritime Major Hockey League champions came up from the cellar with a 5-2 triumph before 2,131 fans.

This one had all the flashback of last year's playoff rivalry that lacked only the profusion of high sticking. It had everything else shady. A pair of reticent referees, uncoordinated on delayed whistles and icing incidents, only scratched the surface in handing out four penalties, three of them to Charlottetown's Bruno (Red) Favero.

Both sides suffered major injuries, principally Charlottetown who lost the services of goalkeeper Hal Gordon, hit flush on his upper lip by a bullet shot from Don McRae's stick at 6:34 of the second period. Luckily Gordon, rated one of the finest and most gentlemanly netminders in the league, suffered no fracture.

He was removed to the dressing room and from there to City Hospital where several stitches were taken to close a deep gash under his lip. He returned to the scene for the third period to watch his successor, Grey Floyd, Sydney Millionaires junior goalkeeper, turn in a steady performance.

Millionaires had a 3-0 edge when Gordon was removed and it was taken victory thereafter. Islanders, however, gave Floyd better protection through the 33 minutes and 26 seconds he worked than they had given Gordon in the earlier stages.

Outlooked was Islanders' cagey Buck Whitlock who had two point-blank scoring opportunities in the first period and fired past the net on both. Whitlock was a minor casualty late in the game when he twisted an ankle in a collision at centre ice.

Favero Traded For Goalie Bob Arneil

Islanders' starry right winger Bruno "Red" Favero has been traded to the Glace Bay Miners for goal tender Bob Arneil, it was learned from coach Leo Lamoureux via long distance telephone early this morning.

"There are still a couple of details to be ironed out and the deal is not quite completed," stated Leo, but he added that it would be unless complications set in.

Right winger Denis Smith is expected to be used in Favero's place. Smith will be recalled from Halifax and if Smith is not placed on the wing, defenceman Bob Gray will likely move up front.

The deal was made necessary last night by the injury to Islanders' goalie Hal Gordon. It was made between Leo and Miners' coach "Bud" Polle in Glace Bay.

Coach Lamoureux stated that the price was high for the Islanders and that he was sorry to have to trade Favero. "I did not want to let him go but the Miners wanted some one worth while," stated Leo.

It is unfortunate that trades have to be made, he added, but very often they work out for the betterment of the players involved.

The deal will break up the Trainor, Favero, Pawlyshyn combination that was the scourge of the Big Four League last season and which was beginning to hit on eight cylinders this year.

Favero, who was the best right winger in the league last year until he became a victim of virus pneumonia, piled up a total of 93 points from his 32 goals and 61 assists. He was sixth highest scorer in the league.

He is a hockey product of Barrie, Ontario and came to the Islanders last year after playing with the Owen Sound Mercurys for two seasons. At the end of the 1950 season he went to the Allen Cup Champion Toronto Marlboros.

Young Arneil, who has been sharing goal tending duties with Don Hicks of the Miners, is the property of the Detroit Red Wings. He will likely be playing here Friday night against Sydney.
