

Growth of the Surplus.

The augmentation of the Dominion revenue continues, it seems, the returns for November showing an increase over those of the corresponding month of last year of nearly a round half million dollars. Nobody can now doubt that the Finance Minister's estimates which a while ago were so keenly criticised and rudely ridiculed were based on calculations which took fully into account the real facts of the situation. Unless the expenditure increases as rapidly as the revenue, a handsome surplus is assured. Of course, a certain increase of expenditure is inevitable, but we hope that all practicable economy is being observed. A fair surplus, after all the Dominion services shall have been maintained in a condition of complete efficiency, and all obligations shall have been promptly met, will be of great service to the Dominion. We trust the surplus will be large enough to warrant a remission of taxation in some directions.—*St. John News.*

The Earthquake at Agram.

The recent earthquake at Agram, Austria, was almost as terrible as similar convulsions in South America. The damage to private buildings in that city alone amounts, according to the best estimate, to upwards of four millions of florins. Among the minor inconveniences consequent upon the disaster, the total suspension of lighting by gas is severely felt. But the inhabitants are not simply deprived of light by night, but even of fire by day. The chimneys of most of the dwelling houses have fallen down, and though the cold has been very severe, the citizens have not ventured to light their fires as usual. The damage to the cathedral is so great that the tower at least will have to be pulled down and rebuilt from its foundations; but it is feared that the nave of the building is also irremediably ruined. This is the more to be regretted, as the Agram Cathedral is one of the oldest and most interesting ecclesiastical structures in the Austrian Empire. It was consecrated as long ago as 1217. The loss and damage in works of art and antiquities in the city are very great. A most extraordinary natural phenomenon was observed at a spot about nine kilometres from Agram. There a number of fountains of hot water burst out from the earth. These geysers, which resemble the well known hot springs in Iceland, where, however, only temporary. It was also noticed that all the rivers and streams within a certain radius of Agram suddenly rose more than a yard above their previous and usual level.

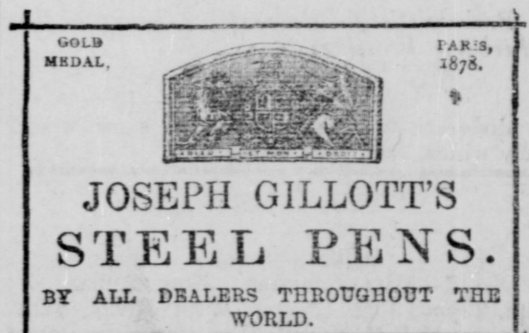
