Reason Fish Disliked — Not Properly Prepared

"It is my considered opinion," observed the Chef, "that the reason people don't like fish is that they haven't had it properly prepared. And by that I mean cooked in interesting ways and attractively garnished."

"For example, a contrasting or compatible sauce goes more than halfway in making fish cookery a success."

"Here are two new sauces from the test kitchen for sea-food cocktails, fresh oysters or clams on the half-shell. They are tangy and appetizing without that familiar too-sweet overtone."

All measurements are level; recipes proportioned to serve 4 to 6.

Fish Cocktail Sauce: Combine 1 c. seasoned tomato sauce, 2 tsp. lemon juice, 1/2 tsp. salt, 1/4 tsp. Tabasco, 1 tsp. prepared horseradish, 2 tsp. minced celery and 1 tsp. grated onion. Chill.

Seafood Mayonnaise Sauce: In a small bowl, combine 1 c. tart, 1/4 tsp. garlic salt, 1/4 c. chili sauce, 1/4 tsp. Tabasco, 2 tsp. tarragon or cider vinegar, 3 tsp. chopped olives, 1/4 c. chopped sweet gherkins and 1 tsp. minced onion. Chill.

Tomorrow's Dinner: Cream of corn chowder, devilled seafood, brussels sprouts, sliced beet-lettuce salad, prune cake, coffee, tea or milk.

Devilled Seafood: This may be made with canned crab, lobster, salmon or tuna. If crabmeat or lobster is used, drain and remove any shell and shred the meat. If tuna or salmon are used, drain off the oil and use it to replace the butter in the following recipe.

Melt 2 tsp. butter or use the fish oil as suggested. Stir in 2 tsp. flour and 1 tsp. dry mustard.

When smooth, gradually stir in 1 c. milk. Cook - stir until the sauce boils. Add 1 tsp. minced parsley, 1/2 tsp. salt and 1/4 tsp. Tabasco.

Stir in 1 egg, beaten with 1 tsp. milk. Add the contents 1 (6 1/2-7 oz.) can crabmeat, lobster, salmon or tuna and 1/4 c. soft enriched bread crumbs.

Fill crab shells or individual casseroles with this mixture. Top with 1/2 c. soft bread crumbs mixed with 2 tsp. melted butter. Bake 20-25 min. in a moderate oven, 375 degrees F.

Sunday Dinner: Citrus fruit cup baked glazed ham, baked idahos,

mixed vegetables, pimiento coleslaw, pineapple gel with custard sauce, coffee, tea or milk.

Pimiento Coleslaw: Fine-shred enough crisp cabbage to make 4 c. Add 1 tsp. grated onion or minced scallion, 2 tsp. minced parsley and 3 canned pimientos, cut in short strips.

Toss with 1/2 c. not - sweet French dressing, mixed with 1/2 c. dairy sour cream and 1/4 tsp. extra salt.

Baked Idahos from the Chef: When serving baked Idahos, cut a deep cross in the top of each potato and, from the bottom, press up the pulp. Dust with paprika or minced parsley.

Pass a choice of special toppings consisting of crumbled crisp bacon dairy sour cream with minced chives or a drop of liquid onion or chopped roasted peanuts, sauteed in butter.

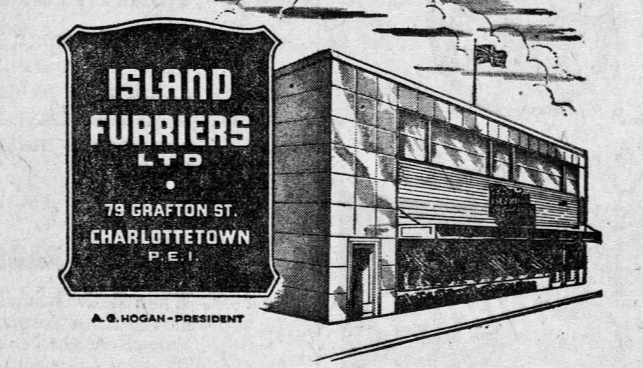
