It was with sincere sorrow that the residents of Murray Harbor learned of the passing of one of its most respected residents in the person of the late Barry B. Hugh at the early age of twenty nine years. The deceased was the son of Silas D. Hugh and his wife, nee Florence Bowles of Dover. His death occurred at the Prince Edward Island Hospital on September fifteenth. He was stricken with poliomyelitis and although receiving medical attention he was called by Our All Loving Father to his home above on above date.

Barry, as he was known by all, was a young man of many fine qualities of character, he engaged in all kinds of sport and was especially interested in baseball and during the past season was a valued member of the Sunshine Island Dairy softball team in the City Softball League. His presence will be sorely missed and long remembered by all the residents of Murray Harbor Village where he was always most active in anything that tended for the betterment of the community. During the past world war he served in the Royal Canadian Navy and since the war was associated with his father and sister in a general mercantile business in Murray Harbor.

His funeral, which was largely attended, attesting to the esteem in which he was held in the community, was held on the afternoon of September seventeenth, the service being conducted by his pastor the Rev. H. C. McDougall assisted by the Rev. Mr. Fraser of Valleyfield. The hymns at the service were "Safe In The Arms Of Jesus" and "Lead Kindly Light." The pall bearers, all uncles of the deceased, were John Bowles, Watson Bowles, Len Hooper, Sydney Munn, and Earl Munn of Murray River and Malcolm F. McLeod of Uig. When South put down his last trump, West could of course discard the heart queen, while dummy threw a club, but when South then led to the king of hearts, West was in a most unenviable position, and South took 11 tricks.

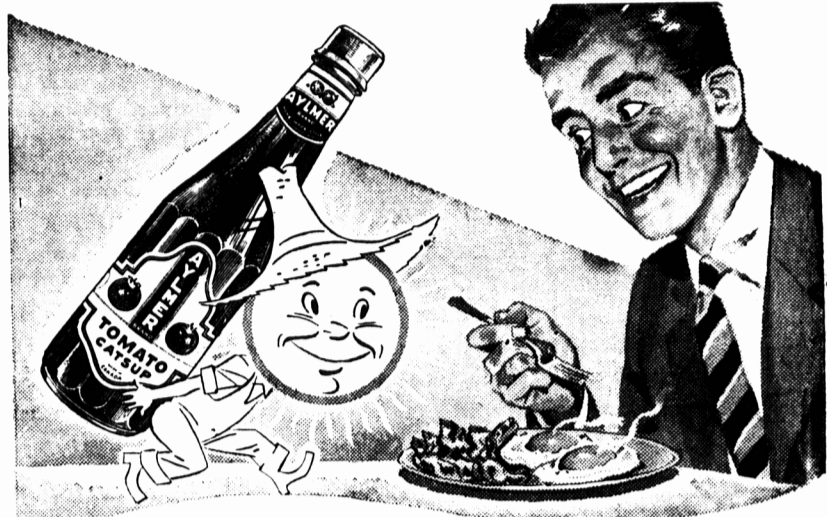
