DOWN THE BACK STRETCH

A former great race horse and well-bred stallion who has left a few of his progeny to carry on battles over the turf—Josedale Hoosier 2:07—was found dead early this week by his faithful trainer, Elwood Shw. Josedale Hoosier was by a great sire, Grattan McKinney by Grattan Royal and has all the characteristics of the Grattan family. He was a good race horse but during his career he met a super horse in Mighty Hanover 2:02 1/2 and other pacing stars like Tip Abbe 2:04 1/2. The greatest speed that he was ever watched over by the Mr. Glasgow N. S. Union track was on July 25, 1945, and the starters were Mighty Hanover 2:02 1/2, owned by W. G. Stewart, New Glasgow, Josedale Hoosier 2:07, owned by Charles J. Walker, Halifax, Tip Abbe 2:04 1/2, owned by MacDonald and Jamieson, New Glasgow and Widow's Pride 2:05, owned by Clarence Wry, St. Stephen. Mighty Hanover (Harrison) won the first two heats and one of them was so close that the backers of Josedale Hoosier (Hood) were confident that his nose had shown in front. There was a big argument and following it in the third heat Josedale Hoosier was the winner, with Tip Abbe (J. O'Brien) that had been a 3-3 finishing second, Widow's Pride (Trimble) was 4-4-4. Time: 2:06, 2:06, 2:09— a new record for Union Track.

Hanover in another Free For All at New Glasgow on August 1st, finishing 2-2-2 with the Hanover horse winning in 2:07, 2:06 1/2, 2:06 1/2. They were pacing giants in those days as the time will show, and Mighty Hanover attracted the attention of parties in Quebec, who bought him from Mr. Stewart. Josedale Hoosier continued racing for several years and latterly in the ownership of Dr. George Bishop was a much admired and liked performer.

W. G. Stewart had a wonderful stable that year. Besides the Hanover horse he had Colleen Scott 2:06 1/2, a double-gaited mare with a record of 2:09 1/2, trotting, the slow class pacer Pat Abbe, that took a record of 2:11 1/2 and the 2-year-old Alpha Hal by Hal Dale. He disposed of all these horses and Alpha Hal was placed in the stud in Ontario and has produced some very fast pacers up there.

Looking over the summaries that year he noticed Mack Fingo racing of the pace and he had a record of 2:15. Last year the 13-year-old Mack Fingo won the 2-mile trot at Truro, Oct. 10, in 4:46 for owner-driver Fulton Moreside, Windsor Jct., N. S. He still had the winning habit this year.

Plans Probe of Attempt To Bribe Boxer

PATERSON, N. J. (AP)—Passaic county prosecutor Donald C. Colletter said Friday he will call in Vince Martinez to get the full story of an alleged \$20,000 bribe offer made to the boxer, and then refer the case to a grand jury.

Colletter said that even if, as Martinez says, he cannot identify any of the men he said tried to get him to throw an Oct. 29 fight with Carmine Fiore, he will ask the grand jury to conduct an investigation.

He said that should developments warrant, he will ask the panel to return John Doe indictments against the purported bribers.

Martinez, seventh-ranking welterweight, confirmed the bribe attempt Thursday after the story was published in Sports Illustrated, a weekly magazine. Martinez said the offer was made near his home in nearby Haledon two days before he stopped Fiore in the seventh round at Madison Square Garden on Oct. 29.

Plans Probe of Attempt To Bribe Boxer

OTTAWA — Carrying out one of the most vital defence jobs in Canada are the men—and women—who operate and maintain the RCAF's early warning radar system. One of these is Leading Airwoman Hettie Mae Weatherbie daughter of Mr. and Mrs. B. A. Weatherbie, Montague, P. E. I. She was born at Valleyfield, P. E. I., and attended Montague Memorial School, before joining the RCAF in November, 1952.

Stationed at one of the RCAF's radar units "somewhere in Canada," LAW Weatherbie received her training at RCAF Station Clinton, Ont., where she learned the fundamentals of radar before being transferred to her present unit. She now is carrying out an important defence role as a fighter control operator, the RCAF has announced.

As a fighter control operator LAW Weatherbie's duties include operating the radar scopes, which detect aircraft flying within a specified area. Information thus obtained is transferred to a plotting table and the location of the aircraft ascertained. If it cannot be identified as a "known" or "friendly" aircraft, RCAF jet fighters are scrambled to intercept the unknown.

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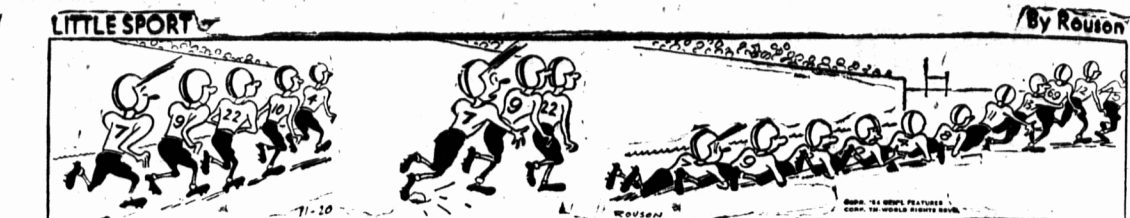
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Toronto Left-winger Has Broken Hand

Islanders Swamp Hawks 8-1 In Rugged Game At Forum

The powerful Prince Edward Islanders came within three points of the Atlantic Coast Senior Hockey League lead last night as they swamped the high-flying Hawks 8-1 at the Forum before the largest crowd of the season. The Islanders, displaying more organization and scoring power than they have all season, collected two unanswered goals in the first period, split markers in the middle session and pulled goalie Nick Pidsodny's average down with five goals in the first and furious final frame.

Vip Palladino made his first start since he suffered a broken nose several weeks ago. During the first period he played with the protection of a plastic helmet over his nose but had some trouble seeing the puck so, he came out for the second and third periods without the protector. Vip worked at center ice last night between Carver and Copper Leyte. During the penalty-killing periods, Danny O'Connor and Copper Leyte and Lloyd Hinchberger controlled the play with amazing ease and were at times stronger on the offensive than when at full strength. Cecil Dowling dressed for the Brklacich gang but was used sparingly.

Copper Leyte grabbed the puck at center in the first face-off of the game and carried it up to the opposing blue-line. He then slid a short pass to Carver who was crossing the line directly in front of Pidsodny. Orin let drive with a waist high 20-footer that hit Nick on the elbow and bounced into the corner of the net.

Shortly before Joe Lepine and Orin Carver had their roughing duel, Wally Kullman, Ray LeDuc and Wimpy Jones roared in on the Moncton defence with Wally banging in Roy's short rebound to give the Islanders a 2-0 lead. This finished the scoring for the first session. The Islanders swarmed all over the Hawks' net and peppered Nick with 14 shots while goalie Jim Shirley of the locals was kicking out seven drives. Jim foiled Moncton center Frank Dorrington who picked up a pass in front on the net from Houle at the 17 minutes mark.

Lorne Hennessey made it 3-0 in favor of the Islanders at 11:35 of the second on a pass from Lloyd Hinchberger and Buck Whitlock. Bob Bonness spoiled Shirley's chance for a shut-out four minutes later as he was sent in the clear by John LeClerc and Mike Demchuk inside the island line. Play was fairly even in this period with the Hawks out-shooting the locals 8-9.

The Islanders return home after the game tonight and will meet the Caps at the Forum on Monday night.

HUNTERS' CORNER

The Hun and pheasant season closed last night and the curtain rung down on a very successful upland game bird season. It was the introduced species that contributed to its success for our native upland game birds, the Ruffed grouse, was a minus quality in most hunters game bags. To this columnist's way of thinking it was the best year for Hungarian partridge dating back for quite some time. The birds were larger this season and in top condition. The last two days of the open season were ideal for huns and pheasants and in sharp contrast to the preceding week (Continued on page 14)

September, with starts on 12,760 units—one-quarter more than in September, 1953. Units completed totalled 8,615, a slight drop from the 8,643 finished in September 1953.

The biggest increase in September housing starts was in Ontario, up to 6,235 from 3,967 last year. Starts increased in the Maritimes to 496 from 472. They declined in Quebec to 2,594 from 3,229, and in Newfoundland to 127 from 200.

September completions dropped in Quebec to 2,324 from 2,885 in September, 1953, and in the Maritimes to 234 from 318. They increased in Newfoundland to 170 from 139.

In the first nine months of the year, housing starts were up from last year in Prince Edward Island, New Brunswick, Ontario, Manitoba, Alberta and British Columbia. The completion rate was higher in all provinces except Newfoundland.

McCurdy Cup Finals Here Today; Saints V S Mariners

Coach A. J. MacAdam announced last night that, when his team goes against the Saint John Mariners in the McCurdy Cup, emblematic of Maritime Senior Rugby Championship, this afternoon, only Rob Money is missing from his regular line-up. Bob is a patient in the Charlottetown Hospital suffering from an attack of pneumonia and will be replaced by Frank Slowey who earned his birth on the Saints' senior squad when he went into the line-up as a replacement last Saturday in the game against Nova Scotia Technical College.

Originally the St. Dunstan's team had decided to be satisfied with their Intercollegiate Championship because of the pressure of time and because of the difficulty of meeting the financial requirements set down by the constitutions of the senior circuit. The sportsmanship of the Saint John Mariners was the factor which dictated the reversal of policy, for the Mariners were not only unwilling to claim the McCurdy Cup by default but agreed to meet the local team more than half-way in the financial question.

The St. Dunstan's team won the Maritime Intercollegiate Championship last Saturday afternoon when they defeated Nova Scotia Technical College by the score of 5-0, after previously winning over Acadia twice and once before over the Tech team to win the Maritime Intercollegiate Series. Saint John Mariners won their Senior Title by defeating the Nomads of Charlottetown in the semi-finals and the Windsor, N.S., Seals in the finals. They were anxious to play Acadia University, the second place team in the Intercollegiate League, nor were they satisfied to take possession of the McCurdy Cup without first earning it in competition. In their only game on Prince Edward Island against the Charlottetown Nomads the Mariners proved that they were a hard-fighting, rugged and competent team. In their two games against the Nomads the Mariners scored 17 points to the local team's 8 and thus won the right to advance against the Windsor Swastikas, whom they defeated 12-0 in the finals. The fans who saw the second game against the Nomads, which was played in Charlottetown, realize that in the Saint John Mariners the Saints meet their stiffest opposition to date.

Today's game will mark the first time that the finals for the McCurdy Cup have ever been held in Prince Edward Island. As one team after another in the Maritimes changes to the Canadian Football one wonders whether it will not possibly be also the last.

The game is scheduled to get underway on the St. Dunstan's gridiron at 2:15 p.m. and will be handled by Gordon Bennett.

Shaw's showing improved steadily throughout the four-day competition. He was eighth and last in the first heat, moving up to fifth for the next two, slipped to sixth in the fourth race, finished third Thursday and trailed Mentilla by 35 seconds Friday.
