

# Soviet Nationals Win Second Game in Row

TORONTO (CP)—The powerful Soviet national hockey team defeated Canada's national squad 4-0 here Sunday to give the Russians a second straight win in the first two games of a scheduled eight-game Canadian tour.

The crowd of 13,000 watched the fast-skating Russians dominate the game. They outshot and outskated the Canadians and were to no loss to use the bodies.

Vyacheslav Stajarschinov sparked the Russians with two goals. His last, mid-way through the first period, came at the end of a three-way picture play.

Tevgeny Mayorov and Yuri Jakushev got the other Russian goal.

Viktor Konvalenko started the game in the Russian goal but a leg injury in the first period forced him to retire in favor of Viktor Tomachev, who tended goal in the second period.

The game was indicative of the team's play in the Canadian National team in the world tournament at Tampere, Finland, last week.

Specially noticeable was the rugged Canadian defence unit and a lack of accurate shooting around the goal.

# Ellis Scores With 1 Second Left To Give Toronto Tie

NEW YORK (AP)—Ron Ellis had given New York a 3-1 edge with one second to play in the tying goal, but the deficit earned Toronto Maple Leafs a 3-3 National Hockey League tie with New York Rangers Sunday night.

Ellis' counter, after the score had leveled at Madison Square Garden with New York Rangers' Glenn Hall and the Leafs' swarming around goal, left the Leafs' goal in a tangle. Glenn Hall, left Toronto's goalie Johnny Bower, had been removed for a while earlier when Ellis cut the Leafs' lead to 2-1.

Referee Bill Friday had whistled for a face-off deep in Rangers' half but the clock kept ticking and the buzzer sounded Friday ruled there were six seconds remaining and, after an auxiliary clock was set, the puck was dropped.

Ellis scored from a melee in front of the cage, pushing the puck into the net with 1.1 seconds left for his 11th goal of the season.

Goals by Rod Gilbert and Earl Gargner — 51 seconds apart in the second period.

Keen took a pass from Carl Brewer, glided in on Plante and beat him from about 20 feet away at 18:41 of the period. The goal was Keen's sixth.

Camille Henry's 11th goal of the season scored at 15:27 of the middle period. He was stopped by Phil Goyette's backhand shot but Gilbert flipped in the rebound.

Infielder scored at 13:27, completing a three-man rush started by defenseman Larry Cahen. Cahen got the puck in Dick Duff, took a return pass and centered perfectly for Goyette, who fired a 30-footer past Bower. It was the centre's sixth goal.

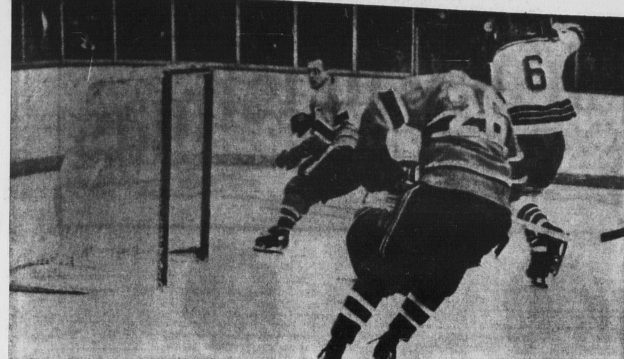

# Montreal's Bruins 5-4; Chicago Shuts Out Wings

BOSTON (CP)—Montreal Canadiens rallied for four goals in the final period Sunday night to dump Boston Bruins 5-4 and retain their grip on first place in the National Hockey League.

The Canadiens, down 4-1 after the second period, bounced back on Dave Balon's two goals and goals by Reggie Fleming, Tom Williams, Ted Green and Dean Prentice.

Boston needed the winner after taking a pass from Claude Provost at the blue-line, clearing through the Bruins defence and firing out Boston goalie Ed Johnston. He ignited the comeback at 9:54 of the third with his first goal of the game.

Backstrom cut Boston's lead to 4-3, banking home Claude Larocque rebound at 15:15. Richard Crozier on the hottest Montreal line with Balon and Provost, got the equalizer three minutes later by knocking in Provost's rebound.

The Canadiens, who have won seven of their last eight games in the climb to first place, bombed Johnston with 20 shots in the final while Montreal goalie Charlie Hodge faced just five, making a total of 13 saves in the game to Johnston's 31.

Boston's second-period outburst appeared to be an insurmountable lead. The first two Bruins goals were deflections, Fleming tipping in Orlando Kurtenbach's pass across the goalmouth and Williams steering home a blue-line drive by Green.

Gilles Tremblay cut the score to 4-1 but then Green and Fleming pushed shots past Hodge.

First period play was exceptionally rugged. Boston's defence had great difficulty clearing the puck and, on at least three occasions, lost the puck for close-in Montreal shots.

Only Johnston's sharp netminding kept the Canadiens from scoring.

But as bad as Boston played, the Canadiens weren't much better. Their play, which started strong, became as ragged as Boston's before the period closed. The passing finesse they displayed at the start degenerated into a puck-slappage display.
