 in the prize list. But the fact does not necessarily show that he is a better boy than one who does. Generally the prize takers carry the day. It should be the object of every pupil to gain a prize. If he fails one year, he should try harder the next.

Professor Cayen could only reiterate the expressions of satisfaction that fell from the lips of Professor Anderson. He thought the teachers and the pupils alike deserved great credit. With Professor Anderson, he liked occasionally to hear a good blunder in an examination. There is something human in it. He expressed surprise and pleasure at the proficiency in Latin, displayed by Charles Martin—whose study of the language had, he was informed, only commenced last September. He agreed with the opinions of Professor Anderson on the subject of prizes and prize takers. He instanced Gladstone and others—great prize-takers—who had attained to great power and influence in the world.

Mr Manning expressed pleasure in all that he had heard. He had listened to the examination in both rooms, and thought it, on the whole, very creditable.

H. Lawson, Esq., said he had been hearing the little one's. He thought the little one's department quite as important as the big one's. On the whole he was very well pleased with the examination. The "little one's" had, evidently, a very intelligent notion of Grammar and History. They were, also, good spellers. He instanced Greeley the great journalist, Hugh Miller, the great editor and geologist, and Dickens the great novelist, as men who had attained to high positions without the advantages of schooling.

Professor Anderson explained that these were, however—at least the two latter—highly (self) educated men. He contended for the dignity of education.

Mr. W. L. Corron added a few remarks.

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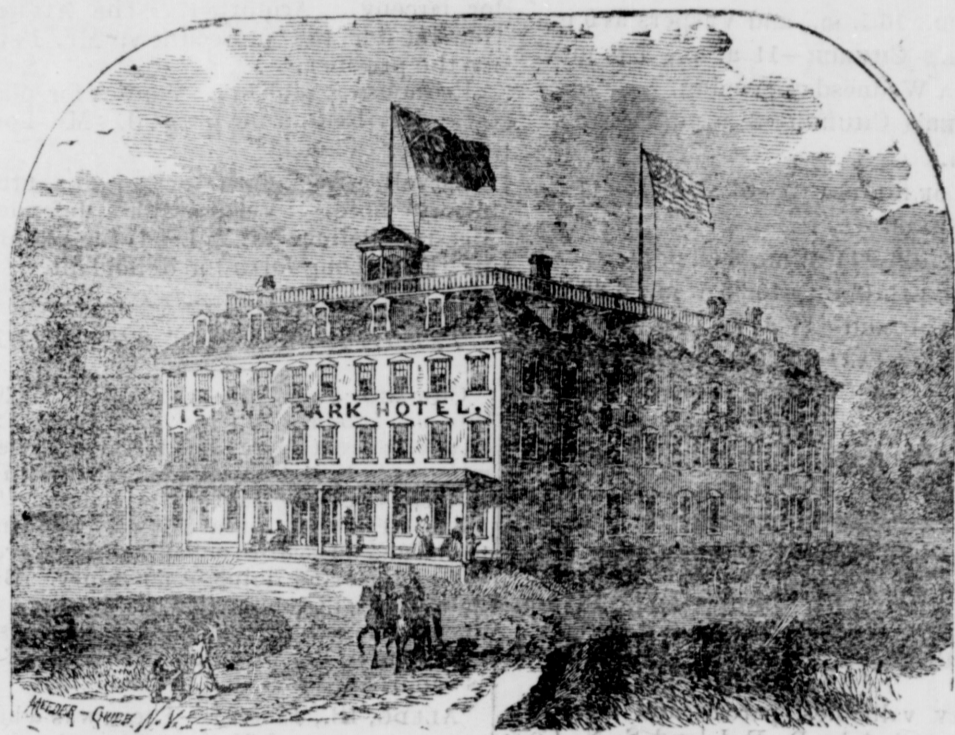
