Cleve Craswell Dies In Hospital

Cleve Craswell, a Charlottetown photographer whose work has taken prizes the world over, died Friday in the Prince Edward Island Hospital. He was 73.

A native of Charlottetown, son of the late Lemuel H. Craswell and Harriet Saunders Craswell, Mr. Craswell began his photography career over 40 years ago in the studio of the late James Bayer, and later with Mrs. Craswell, the former Clarinda MacDonald of West River, began operation of a studio on Great George Street where he worked until the time of his death.

It is believed that at one time, in the earlier days of photography, the Craswell studio processed all amateur photography done in the province.

An extremely charitable man, Mr. Craswell took an active interest in the affairs of the less fortunate and many a needy received weekly boxes of groceries without knowing the name of their benefactor.

Mr. Craswell was interested in work to aid crippled children and the retarded and would make regular visits to the retarded children's schools. It was noted that the children were so appreciative of Mr. Craswell that many would visit him while he was in hospital.

The late Mr. Craswell was very active in the affairs of the Charlottetown Rotary Club, was a Board of Trade member, took keen interest in the affairs of Royal Canadian Legion and at one time was a member of the Oddfellows' organization.

He was a member of Trinity United Church.

Surviving besides his wife are a brother, Merrill, and a sister, Mrs. Rena Tomlin, both of 45 Rochford Street.

The funeral was held from Trinity Church yesterday.
