Her faith was so strong and unclouded, she lived in such close touch with her Divine Master that her very presence was an inspiration, and she enabled one to realize what a power there is in the religion of Jesus Christ which could lift her above her long continued suffering and weakness into the very "peace of God which passeth all understanding." She leaves a husband, a son, and four daughters, not to "sorrow as those who have no hope," but rather to rejoice in the blessed memory of one who "walked with God and was not, for God took her."
