YACHT IN PORT.—The handsome steam-yacht May, owned in Philadelphia, arrived here on Saturday evening and sailed again yesterday forenoon. She had a party of fifteen on board. During her stay in Charlotteown the May was supplied with meat by Messrs. Saunders & Newsom.

TEA PARTIES.—Tea are today being held at St. Agn's and St. Peter's Bay. The attendance at both is large. The special from Charlotteown for St. Peter's had between fifty and sixty passengers from the city. Several missed the train because of some misunderstanding as to the time it was to leave Charlotteown.
