C. A. F. station at Summerside under command of Ptl. Lt. W. P. Palmer. Lined up behind the Guard was the band of the E. I. Regiment under Cpl. Frank Smith.

### Baptist Sessions At Wolfville

(WOLFVILLE, N.S., Aug. 28 — (CP) — Rev. Paul R. Caudill of Memphis, Tenn., today opened the 108th annual convention of the United Baptist Churches of the Maritime Provinces with the first of his devotional series entitled "The Kingdom Man."

The convention quartette, which will continue the ministry of music throughout the sessions, sang "The Just Shall Live By Faith." Quartette members are: Rev. B. R. Hamilton, McAdam, N.B.; Rev. W. Davidson, Charlottetown, and Donald McClure, East Point, P. E. I.

The executive report was read by General Secretary Waldo C. Machum, Saint John, N.B., who said one of the notable features of the report was increased willingness of Maritime Baptists to support the missionary and overall program of Maritime Baptist Churches. The Advance Campaign had brought to the enterprises of the churches almost \$150,000 and some 2,000 members were added last year. Total monies raised last year was \$1,520,633.74.

Rev. Fred Gordon, Kingston, N.S., presented a report on the Rural Life Committee. The significant result of the report was the convention's approval to institute a department of rural life directed by a six-member committee to be appointed by the Home Mission Board and the Executive Committee of the convention.

At sessions Wednesday, Rev. George Simpson of Bedford, N.S., was elected president of the Maritime Baptist Institute. Other officers are Rev. Reuben Davis, Lower Coverdale, N.B.; Rev. Donald McClure, East Point, P. E. I.; and Walter Debbow, Moncton, all vice-presidents; George Allen, Truro, executive member; and Rev. H. E. Colpitts, Hillsborough, N.B. secretary-treasurer.

### Women's Missionary Union

In her presidential address given before the many delegates to the Women's Missionary Union convention at Wolfville Baptist Church, Mrs. C. T. Nisbet, Sussex, said the past year had been successful. and Federal Parliament and their wives, Justices of the Supreme Court and other citizens were formally presented, His Excellency left the building. Just outside the entrance on the right was a flag-graped plaque erected on one of the columns relating the history of this Province. The Governor General pulled the cord which let the flag drop for the unveiling ceremony. He then stepped close to the plaque to read the brief history written there. In company with Provincial officials His Excellency then walked from the Provincial Building to the Cenotaph where members of the Canadian Legion were lined up waiting. President of the Charlottetown Branch, Charles Sinclair, handed a wreath to the Provincial Command president, Maj. A. H. Peake, who in turn presented it to the Governor General. After laying it at the base of the monument he stood at attention as Bugler B. Doiron sounded the Last Post.

### At City Hall

At the City Hall he was greeted at the entrance by Mayor J. D. Stewart, accompanied by City Clerk James Fullerton. In the Council Chamber he thanked His Worship for the warm welcome and remarked in reply to the welcoming speech that "Charlottetown is a long tradition of loyalty to a Queen. Its streets and squares commemorate the Royal House." He expressed his deep appreciation to the Mayor on the presentation of the Key to the City which he said "symbolizes its freedom," and remarked that it was an honor which he would cherish.

"I remember with much pleasure my former visits to this historic city. The mellow charm of Charlottetown is as great as the beauty of your lovely countryside," the Governor General said and remarked that "the visitor of today would not be content with the observation of the 18th century surveyor who described this site as 'the most proper place, the land being level, dry and healthy'. Little did he dream of the charming capital city which the visitor sees today; nor could he possibly have realized that in the quiet atmosphere of your community great decisions were to be made which subsequently led to the uniting of our country."

### Previous Visits Recalled

In his address of welcome, which appears in full below, Mayor Stewart recalled with pleasure the previous visits of Rt. Hon. Mr. Massey and said that his vast knowledge of Canada marked him as the most understanding representative ever to fill the high office. Following the brief speeches members of the City Council and the fire engines appeared to the Governor General by the Mayor. Also presented were City Recorder K. M. Martin, and members of the Water Commissioners, as well as wives of the military acting as special aides.

Just as the ceremony in the Council Chamber was coming to a close there was a sudden roar from the first floor of the City Building and the fire engines sped out with sirens screaming in answer to a call. Conversation stopped briefly until the noise abated as the machines went out of hearing. The Governor General then signed the official Guest Book of the City of Charlottetown.

This was almost a repetition of his act in the Confederation Chamber where he signed the new Provincial Distinguished Visitors' book. There Commissioner Robert Gray presented the book to His Excellency for his signature half way down a brand new page. After leaving City Hall the Governor General and his official party drove to Government House where he was to be the guest of His Honor Lieutenant Governor T. W. L. Prowse and Mrs. Prowse. As he arrived he was greeted with a salute from the gates of the 28th L. A. A. Regiment firing from Fort Edward in Victoria Park.

### Premier's Address

Following is the text of the address of welcome given by Premier J. Walter Jones in Confederation Chamber: "May I please Your Excellency: "On behalf of the Government and people of Prince Edward Island I most heartily welcome Your Excellency on your first visit to our Province as Governor-General and Commander-in-Chief of Canada. "I beg to assure Your Excellency of our loyal devotion to Her Most Gracious Majesty, Queen Elizabeth the Second, whom Your Excellency represents, and of our patriotic pride in being a member of the great British Com-

monwealth of Nations over which she presides. "Shortly before Your Excellency assumed your present high office, the nation of which we form a part was called upon to mourn the death of our late beloved Sovereign, King George the Sixth, and I feel sure that in no part of the Commonwealth have his many noble qualities as a King and a gentleman been more warmly appreciated or his death more sincerely lamented than in this Province. Deeply as we feel the loss of a ruler so greatly beloved we rejoice that in his Royal Daughter our Liege Lady Elizabeth the Second we welcome a Sovereign upon whom we can rely to carry on the noble traditions of her illustrious forebears.

"We realize that you have come to a Province of which you already have considerable knowledge, and the citizens of Prince Edward Island join with me in the hope that this visit, though brief, may be enjoyable and last impressions that Your Excellency will soon visit us again."

### Mayor's Address

Following is the address of welcome read by His Worship Mayor J. D. Stewart: "Sir: "The Mayor and Council of the City of Charlottetown welcome you in the name of all its citizens.

"We, in this Island Province, like all people in the other provinces, recognize with approval that you are the first Canadian-born citizen to fill the high office of Her Majesty's representative to our Dominion of Canada, which is not only an honour to yourself but a much greater one to this Dominion, in that so distinguished a Canadian should become our Governor General of Canada.

"We feel, Sir, it is most appropriate that you should visit the Province and the City where the idea of a Dominion Federation was conceived.

"We recall with pleasure your visit to Charlottetown and these very Chambers, not so many years ago when you were Chairman of the Royal Commission on National Development in the Arts, Letters and Sciences. "Your vast knowledge of this Canada of yours and ours marks you as the most understanding representative ever to fill the high office which has been conferred upon you by the British Crown.

"As an appreciation of the honour extended us by your visit, Sir, we extend to you the Freedom of our City, and symbolic of it, we ask you to accept this key. We offer it to you, Sir, not for its intrinsic worth or value, but for what it signifies and as a souvenir of the Capital City of our Island Province."
