Dragger Fleet Now Operating Out of Souris

The dragger fleet is sailing out of Souris once more. After tune-up trips for the engines, in the vicinity of Souris harbour, and a check on tackle and equipment, seven or eight of the pudgy, stout, little craft cast off their lines, and left for the fishing grounds earlier in the week.

Since then the boats have been nosing around Northumberland Straits searching out the fish and they have already taken some haddock according to a representative of Eastern Packers who was in town yesterday from Souris.

If the boats have luck they expect to land some fish by next Monday. Eastern Packers, who will handle the draggers' catches are in conversation with the craft every day by ship-to-shore radio.

Providing the fish landings are good, many people in the Eastern part of the Island will have more or less steady employment in Eastern Packers filling plant. In the Company's lobster packing plant many more workers will be on the payroll during the lobster season. This lobster factory not only handles the fish caught off Souris, but much of the catch of fishermen taken at Basin Head, Fortune, and some trapped on the North shore of Kings County.

These latter reach Souris by truck. By the middle of next week, Souris should be one of the busiest spots on the Island, with very few people still unemployed.

A definite shortage of female workers is looming, in fact, and it may become necessary to bring some girls from Richibucto, New Brunswick.
