Funeral of the Prince.

FULL PARTICULARS.

A NATIONAL SOLEMNITY.

LONDON, Jan. 21.

The train bearing the remains of the Duke of Clarence and Avondale arrived at Windsor at 3.30 o'clock yesterday. The coffin was taken on the shoulders of men from the Tenth Hussars. It was wrapped in a silken Union Jack. On it was a wreath sent by the Queen. A silken ribbon was attached to the wreath on which were the words: "A mark of the tenderest affection and love from a devoted, loving and sorrowing grandmother." Minute guns were fired from the round tower. The Life Guards had the right line, followed by the bands, which played the funeral marches alternately. A detachment of the Tenth Hussars and the Horse Artillery preceded the gun carriage, upon which the remains were placed. On either side of the gun carriage walked officers of the Tenth Hussars. The charges ridden by the Duke, saddled and bridled, with the boots of his owner reversed, was led after the gun carriage. The Prince of Wales, Prince George of Wales and the Duke of Edinburgh, Prince Christian and Prince Henry of Battenberg, and the Marquis of Lorne. Then followed the Grand Duke Alexander as representing the Czar of Russia, Prince Albert of Schleswig Holstein, the Crown Prince of Denmark, the Duke of Oporto, brother of the King of Portugal, Prince Frederick Leopold of Prussia, the Duke of Teck between Prince Ernest of Lipdingen and Prince Edward of Saxe Weimar. The services were conducted by the Dean of Windsor, assisted by the Bishop of Rochester. The choir sang hymns selected by the Queen. The entire service was marked by solemn impressiveness. To-night the remains of the Duke will be quietly removed to the Memorial Chapel where they will find a final resting place.

No Discrimination.

OTTAWA, Jan. 21.

The steamer Stanley has been ordered to tow the barkentine Erema, now off Georgetown harbor, into Charlottetown harbor.

Mr. James McShane has been re-elected mayor of this city.

General Telegraphic News.

QUEBEC, Jan. 19.—Twenty-eight families leave Quebec at the end of this month to settle in the Edmonton district.

OTTAWA, Jan. 19.—Mr. Chapleau's health to-day is somewhat worse and medical advisers insist on his going south for a month or two at least.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Jan. 19.—Orders were issued at the navy department to-day to concentrate the squadron now under Admiral Gherardi and Walker at Valparaiso. This will make nine vessels carrying 75 first-class guns, besides secondary batteries and about 1,500 men in Chilean waters.

TORONTO, Jan. 19.—The Bishop of Toronto leaves on Monday for Europe, where His Lordship intends to spend a few weeks. He hopes to complete arrangements by which the Archbishop of Canterbury will visit Canada in the autumn, for the purpose of attending the Provincial Synod, which meets in Toronto in September. The great question of the consolidation of the Church in British North America will then be discussed and the scheme, if possible, consummated.

PARIS, Jan. 19.—R. publiquis Francis in a stirring article on the situation of affairs in Morocco, says France would oppose with all her strength British occupation of Morocco, which, it says, would be a lasting humiliation for Europe.

LONDON, Jan. 19.—B-th English and Germans have been having a bad time of it in Africa. A tribe rejoicing in the name of Wadigoos have defeated 300 Germans in the Tanga district and driven them into the bush with great loss. It is a remarkable fact that the disaster was due to an insufficient supply of cartridges, and proves that even German organization sometimes breaks down. The English troubles are still more serious, though not from a military point of view. Mr. Johnston, heretofore an explorer has been making war on the Arab slave-dealers. They in turn, not liking interference with their insalubrious rights to steal niggers, have made war on Mr. Johnston and have defeated him on Lik-Nyas, if not elsewhere. The accounts, both of the fighting and the losses differ. But it is agreed that the Arabs were victorious and that reinforcements must go to Mr. Johnston from Zanzibar.
