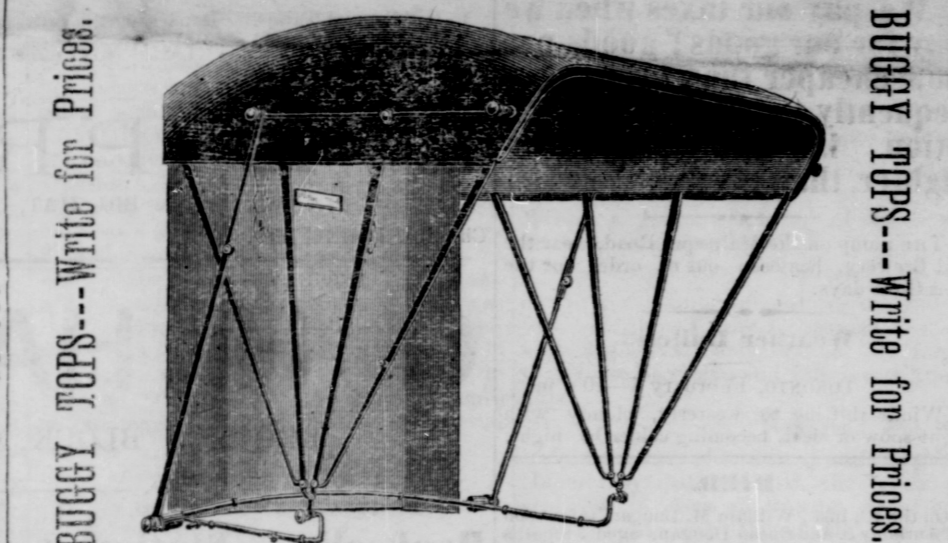

KING'S COUNTY.

PUBLIC MEETING AT MONTAGUE BRIDGE.
A large meeting of electors was held in Montague Hall on Wednesday, 2nd Feb., Hon. Thomas Amner in the chair. All the candidates were present. The policy of the present Dominion and Local Governments were ably defended by Messrs. McDonald, Muttart, and Cyrus Shaw, Esq., M. P. P.
Messrs. McDonald and Muttart were nominated by Cyrus Shaw, Esq., and supported by Messrs. Wm. Sullivan, Robert Dewar and others, which nomination was carried by a large majority. The meeting was most enthusiastic, and the prospects of the Liberal-Conservative candidates are above par. Murray Harbor District will give a good account of itself on election day in behalf of the popular candidates, McDonald and Muttart.

POLITICAL MEETING AT BAY FORTUNE BRIDGE—THE SECRETARY'S REPORT.

A number of electors, approximating one hundred and fifty, assembled in the Schoolhouse at the above mentioned place on Tuesday evening last, to hear recounted the great political questions of the day regarding the Dominion.

PRINCE COUNTY.

MESSERS. YEO AND PERRY ON THE TEMPERANCE QUESTION—SUPPORTED BY JAMES F. WHITE.

Sir,—Will you permit me to direct the attention of temperance workers to the political campaign now going on in Prince County. I do not know, nor does any one else know the true policy of the above named candidates upon this question, as they make promises to both sides. I am not an ultra Scott Act man, but no man of any shade of politics can fail to see the good work that the temperance movement has done in securing an intelligent vote at our elections. Not many years ago nearly every rum seller in town and country had to be subsidized at election times at a cost of from one to five hundred dollars, and very independent they were at it. They simply named their price, or demanded that their "House be opened" and rum supplied *ad libitum*, they to be paid by the candidates, and a good stiff payment in advance was required. They would tell the candidate that if he did not do it, the other side would—in the end they got it from one party or the other. Temperance men and others were congratulating themselves on this system having been put down by the Scott Act; that the rum traffic had got so low that respectable politicians had ceased to make capital out of it; that in fact its usefulness as a power at elections has gone. Messrs. Yeo and Perry however, appear to think different, Mr. James F. White, of Alberton prides himself on being a barroom politician and an eloquent speaker. A few years ago he was dismissed from the Customs at Alberton for misappropriation of funds. In one instance he suppressed the entry of a vessel with a valuable cargo of merchandise, collected the duties and got off with the bootle. He is one of the most notorious violators of the Scott Act in the whole Dominion. He has been fined, and re-fined, and the Supreme Court has more than once had its time taken up hearing this worthy's appeals. Yet this is the man whom Messrs. Yeo and Perry take round with them to their public meetings to address the electors in the cause of purity. He was with them at Summerside, Miscouche, Cape Traverse and other places, but the good sense of the people at all these localities refused to hear Mr. White, and administered a severe rebuke to Messrs. Yeo and Perry for attempting to foist this man's views upon them.

On behalf of the independent electors of this County, I for one protest against such influence being used in this campaign, and trust that a proper rebuke will be administered in consequence of it to Messrs. Perry and Yeo on election day.

Grit vs. Tory Rule.

GRIT RULE. Public Debt. In five years the Grits added \$4,613,897 to the net debt, and left nothing to show for it—but Fort Frances Lock and a few other monuments!

TORY RULE. Public Debt. In seven years, the Tories added \$6,913,523 to the net debt, and there is to show for it the Canadian Pacific Railway and other public improvements in all parts of Canada.

Public Works. During the Grit term the total expenditures upon public works chargeable to capital was \$3,333,932, or 88-7/100 less than the increase of the debt. That is to say the Government of the Grits added to the permanent obligations of the country nearly seven millions more than they expended upon public works having for their object the development of trade and cheapening of the cost of transportation.

Interest Charges. When the Liberal party came into office the average rate of interest payable upon the public debt was 3 1/2 per cent., and five years later they had reduced it to 4 1/2 per cent., or by 1/4 per cent.

Assets. In 1873 the assets of the Dominion amounted to \$29,941,970, and yielded an average rate of interest of 1.55 per cent. In 1878 the assets had increased to only \$31,896,191, and the average rate of interest was 1.63 per cent, a gain in five years of \$1,954,221 in assets and an increase of 3/4 per cent. in the rate of interest.

Under Tory management of public affairs, the assets mounted up to \$38,585,915, an addition of \$8,693,716, or within a fraction of 100 per cent., while the average rate of interest yielded augmented to 3.94 per cent, an increase of 2.38 per cent.

LETTERS TO THE EDITOR.

Prices Compared.

Sir,—The Grits are working hard in this district, and their usual stock of lies is not yet exhausted. Nevertheless this end of the district will give a good account of itself on the 22nd inst., and will roll up a good majority for the peoples candidates, McDonald & Muttart. I was looking over my pass book to-day for 1878, the last year of Grit one sided free trade rule, and in comparing prices with 1875 I find the following result: On Dec. 14th, 1878, I sold 40 bushels oats at 26c., cash, \$10.40. I laid out for 1 bbl. flour \$6.75, 2 lbs. tea, 78c., 1 lb. tobacco, 48c., 1 gallon kerosene oil, 45c., 4 lbs. sugar, 34c., 1 gallon molasses, 50c., 2 lbs. cotton warp, 80c., and got 31 cents in cash. On Dec. 14th, 1885, I sold 35 bushels oats at 27c., cash, \$9.45. I laid out for 1 barrel flour, \$4.90, 4 lbs. tea, \$1.05, 2 lbs. tobacco, 90c., 2 gallons kerosene oil, 62c., 10 lbs sugar, 65c., 1 gal molasses, 35c., 2 lbs cotton warp, 50c., and got 39c in change. I in the latter year had 5 bush less oats, bought nearly double the quantity of goods, and still had more after paying for them than in 1878. And the goods were superior to those I bought in the free trade year. I voted Grit once, but shall vote the straight Liberal-Conservative ticket on the 22nd inst., and every free and independent elector should do likewise. I almost forget to mention about the fishery bounty that benefits us so much. We don't forget how the Grits opposed it, from Mr. Blake down to James Yeo, and voted against it too.

Cardigan Notes.

Despite the Grit cry of "hard times" trade at Cardigan Bridge is fairly active. The other day over fifty teams were noticed passing the Bridge within one hour.

Mr. J. F. Norton is busily engaged building a wharf near the Bridge, which, when completed, will be quite an acquisition to the shipping accommodation.

The trade in Limestone engages many teams, who at this season of the year, haul it to the farms of the surrounding country.

Politics are waking up. The Grits are holding caucus meetings every week, and are pretending to be making quite an effort for Robertson and McIntyre. They say they are not well organized; but the great trouble with them is they have the wrong side of the question. The people have no confidence in their political filis; and the 22nd of February will show once more that "honesty is the best policy" for politicians as well as ordinary mortals. The Liberal Conservatives are well organized, they have the best side of the question, their men are working quietly with a determination to win; and if other sections of the County do as well as Cardigan, the Government will have two supporters from King's County.
