Crowded Coupe Hit By C.N.R. Flier In Ontario

BRANTFORD, Ont. (CP)—Three men and a Vancouver girl died and another man was severely injured Saturday when their crowded coupe was hit by a Canadian National Railway flier as they set out on a transcontinental motor trip to the West coast.

Crumpled Car

Rescuers, who worked for more than an hour with back-saws, crow bars and blow torches to free all the victims from the wreck, said the crumpled car was "welded" to the front of the locomotive.

Worked For Hour

About a dozen men worked more than an hour to free the bodies and the injured man from the wreckage.

- HALIFAX (CP)—The liner Ascania landed 224 of its 700 passengers here Sunday and sailed during the night for New York, where a longshoremen's strike is expected to end today.
- KINGSTON, Ont. (CP)—Traditional scarlet tunics and pill-box caps have been authorized again for Royal Military College cadets, Defence Minister Brooke Claxton announced here Sunday.
- MONTREAL (CP)—Canadian Limited Saturday announced receipt of a new \$24,000,000 order from the federal government for F-86 Sabre jet aircraft.
- The announcement did not say how many aircraft will be built as a result of the new order.
- BOURNEMOUTH, England (AP)—Lord Lyle, British sugar magnate, died Saturday at the age of 71. He was stricken with pneumonia while crossing the Atlantic on the way to the Bahamas in January, spent a week in a New York hospital instead, and then sailed back home.
- SULLIVAN, Ind. (AP)—Will H. Hays, 74, who left President Harding's cabinet to clean up Hollywood movie morals in the roaring 20s, died of a heart condition at his Sullivan home Sunday.
- The one-time Republican national chairman and postmaster-general, who served 24 years as movie "czar", had returned ill from his New York residence last October.
- It was as the \$150,000-a-year president of the Motion Picture Producers and Distributors of America that his strong personality left its sharpest imprint on the public.
- He took that job in 1922 after a law career in Indiana and service as Republican national chairman before he was 40.
- He retired in 1945, with his "flair of good taste in an industry which had accepted the principle of self-regulation.

Death At Parrsboro Of Archdeacon Harris

Venerable Archdeacon Charles R. Harris, M.A., B.D., one of the outstanding leaders of the Anglican Church in the Maritime Provinces, who had been a patient in the Amherst Hospital for several weeks, passed away early yesterday morning.

Early Career

Archdeacon Harris attended St. Peter's Bay School, then under the direction of the late Dr. T.H. Hunt. He graduated from King's College, Windsor, N.S., with his Master's degree. He was ordained deacon, June 18, 1905, and Priest on June 10, 1906. Prior to his ordination he was a lay reader at Georgetown, P.E.I., and also served temporarily at Barrington and Mulgrave, N.S., and then was appointed Rector at Port Medway, N.S.
