The new fire bell "Little John" did not arrive by Boston boat this afternoon. THE "Northampton" will go on a six weeks' visit to Quebec on the 25th inst. DURING this oppressive weather the only person who keeps a school is the country teacher. NEXT Tuesday, (Caledonia Day) is to be proclaimed a general holiday in the next "Royal Gazette." Four cases of drunkenness were disposed of in the usual manner at the Stipendiary Magistrate's court to-day. THE market to-day was very small. Butter was sold as high as 20 cents. THE export of live stock from Montreal to Great Britain during the present week was 1,516 head of cattle, 151,121 sheep and 336 hogs. A COMMERCIAL traveller for a boot and shoe house in Montreal, a widower, has eloped with Mrs. Macpherson, of Toronto. The husband is on his track. SEVERAL dangerous holes are uncaired for on Peake's No. 1 Wharf. A team passing down this afternoon added another to the number by breaking through a weak plank. A FRENCH attempt at child murder has come to light in Halifax. A negro, who kept up an unlawful intimacy with a woman, attempted to kill her child by running a sharp brad-awl into its brain. A FIGURE HEAD was recently found by the barque "Golf of Devon," which arrived at St. Johns, Nfld., on the 30th ult. It is the figure of a goddess, and is believed to be the figure-head of the missing training ship "Atlanta." THE Montreal Citizen's Committee have undertaken to raise \$10,000 to provide outside attractions during the exhibition week. It is probable an effort will be made to bring professional scullers there from all parts of the continent. It would be well if parties in this city who are engaged in building operations would pay some slight attention to the manner in which the temporary sidewalks are laid before the buildings in course of erection. Too often are these temporary ways dangerous man traps. WRECK SOLD.—The wreck of the ship Gondolier, of P. E. Island, as she lies with the cargo in her at Sable Island, was sold at auction on Friday last for \$225. Mr. F. C. Stevens was the purchaser. The divers that are now at work on the ship have the privilege of working until the 5th of August. THE regular session of the Grand Lodge of the L. P. B. N. A., I. O. O. F., will open at Summerside on Wednesday, 11th inst., at 10 o'clock, a. m. The representatives from St. Lawrence Lodge are—J. P. Irving, Thos. R. Callbeck, Theo. L. Chappelle, W. C. DesBrisay and A. B. Stewart. Wilsey Lodge will be represented by Benj. Bremner, George A. Sharp, William Worth and A. D. White. MILWAUKEE has a romance of two old people, as follows: Early in September the widow of the millionaire banker, J. B. Martin, of Milwaukee, will be married to F. G. Tibbets, one of the leading bankers of Philadelphia. Mr. Tibbets is seventy years of age and Mrs. Martin 65. Mrs. Martin controls about two million dollars' worth of property in Milwaukee. On her husband's death he requested that she should marry Mr. Tibbets, who was her first lover when the two were too poor to marry. Mr. Tibbets has remained a bachelor all his life. JOHN MELLICK, formerly of St. John, N. B., merchant, of good standing, was, on Saturday last, sentenced to fifteen years' imprisonment in the Penitentiary, for forgery. Judge Watters, in sentencing him, said: "Your case may prove a warning to others, and prevent a commission of similar crime in future. The sentence of the Court is that on the first indictment (for forging the name of Henry Mellick, his uncle), you be imprisoned in the Dorchester Penitentiary for the space of five years; on the second indictment, for forging the name of Putnam Bros., a further five years, to be computed after the end and expiration of the first sentence, and on the third indictment for forging Mr. Alex. A. McDougall's name, five years, to be computed after the end and expiration of the previous sentence—with hard labor." THE Picnic of St. Patrick's Total Abstinence and Benevolent Society takes place to-morrow. The committee have left nothing undone to make the occasion as enjoyable as possible. Two large dancing booths have been erected and some of the best violinists in the city engaged. A first-class refreshment booth will be on the ground, presided over by an experienced person. Among the other attractions will be a square heel-and-toe walking match, which will give some of our local pedestrians an opportunity of displaying their speed. Men's and boys' sack races and running races will also take place, for which liberal prizes will be offered. The grounds, which are opposite the residence of Geo. W. DeBlais, Esq., Malpeque Road, are surrounded by beautiful shade trees, and the distance from the city is so short, that it affords an opportunity to every one—both old and young—to attend. It now turns out that the Queen did write to the Sultan, urging him to comply with the demands of Europe regarding the Greek Frontier.

NEWS BY TELEGRAPH.

EUROPEAN. LONDON, July 31. A Bombay despatch says it is now calculated that Gen. Pnayro's force will reach Candahar on August 25th. The latest statements make Burrows' force 200. CABUL, July 31. The news of the disaster has had no effect yet on the affairs here and matters are progressing as before. The news is very imperfectly, if at all, known to the Afghans. LONDON, July 31. The first reinforcements will sail from England on Tuesday, and before the end of September the last of 4,500 going out will have landed at Bombay. A Bombay despatch says that now that the effect of the first shock of the Candahar disaster is over, the situation is regarded more favorably. It is now admitted that the garrison of Candahar ought to be able to hold its ground with ease. A private letter from Candahar dated the 18th describes the effect of the news of Ayob Khan's advance across Helmand as already very considerable. Merchants and well-to-do people were burying their property and preparing to leave the city. SIMLA, Aug. 1. Reports from Quetta indicate that Ayob Khan did not follow up victory by pursuing the British. It is stated that Burrows has succeeded in bringing a large portion of his troops into Candahar. LONDON, August 2— a. m. The Standard's Bombay correspondent telegraphs that the battle between Burrows' forces and Afghans is said to have been well contested. British cavalry and artillery were badly cut up at commencement of the fight, but infantry inflicted such a heavy loss on Ayob Khan that he has not ventured to advance upon Candahar. The Viceroy of India telegraphed on Sunday that Ayob Khan did not follow British retreat. Burrows' force has arrived at Candahar. When messenger left Ayob Khan was encamped where action was fought. This seems to confirm the news that Ayob Khan had suffered heavily. This news was brought by natives to Quetta. LONDON, Aug. 1. The Times' Cabul correspondent says that the prospects of a favorable settlement with Abdurrahman and the speedy withdrawal of the army from Cabul are no doubt seriously menaced by disaster at Candahar, but general Stewart is adequate for any emergency and need fear no combination that can be brought against it. LONDON, July 31. In the Wigton burgh, yesterday, there was an election for a member of Parliament in place of Mark J. Stewart (Conservative) unseated on petition, and Sir John Hay (Conservative) was returned by 636 votes, Gilbert McMeeking (Liberal) receiving 630 votes. In the Lords, last night, the leaders of the Conservative party decided to support the motion for the rejection of the Compensation Bill. NEW YORK, Aug. 1. The Tribune's London special says that Dillen, member for Tipperary, publicly confirmed, from personal investigations at the last meeting of the Land League, Redpath's statement that funds now held by hierarchy are sufficient for relief of existing distress. LONDON, August 1. Premier Gladstone was unable to attend the Cabinet Council yesterday owing to having contracted a severe cold, which today has developed into congestion of the base of the left lung, and he is confined to his bed. Several of the most eminent physicians are in consultation upon him, and great anxiety is felt for his welfare. The excitement in political circles is intense, and Her Majesty the Queen frequently sends messages of inquiry after Mr. Gladstone's health. LATER. LONDON, August 1—midnight. The doctors in attendance upon Mr. Gladstone are much disappointed at the increase of the fever. Doctor Andrew Clark will remain all night by Mr. Gladstone's bed side. LATEST. LONDON, August 2, a. m. Gladstone caught a chill after leaving the House of Commons, Friday, and is now suffering from congestion of the left lung. The latest bulletin issued on Sunday evening says his condition is less favorable, owing to slight fever; his in no immediate danger. The Queen telegraphed to learn his condition. CAPE TOWN, July 31. Parliament has been prorogued. Governor Bartle Frere in his speech attributed the failure of the Confederation policy to the unsatisfactory settlement of Zululand and the annexation of Transvaal. ROME, July 31. Cardinal Francesco Aputzari, archbishop of Capan, is dead. SCUTARI, July 31. Four battalions of Montenegrins attacked the Albanians on Wednesday, and were repulsed. UNITED STATES. NEW YORK, Aug. 1. At noon to-day Dr. Tanner entered on the thirty-fifth day of his fast. He slept well the night previous and appeared refreshed this morning. SAN FRANCISCO, July 31. The cutter "Corwin," searching for the missing whalers and the steamer Jeannette found that famine has prevailed for two years at St. Lawrence Islands near Behring Straits, 200 to 500 persons having died and the remains are unburied.

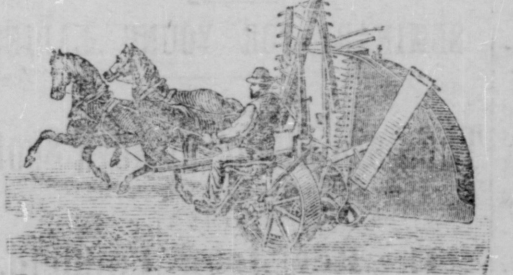
