Notes and Comments.

We learn that the Lieut. Governor declined to grant a dissolution on the advice of the Premier, and that the Provincial Government have, consequently, resigned.

The report of the United States consulate in Berlin shows a decrease in the exports from northern Germany to the United States for the first quarter of 1891 of \$2,439,965, as compared with the corresponding period in 1890.

The Montreal Gazette says: "So far in Montreal about half the work of taking the canals has been completed and it has only been necessary to remind one person that the Police Magistrate can take a hand in the enumeration when necessary. This is a fairly intelligent town for its size."

The Globe has finally given up the claim that the Conservative Government was beaten at the election. One of the ablest articles of the "if the party is to survive Sir John's kind ever written appears in its issue of Tuesday. The Montreal Gazette remarks that the Premier can meet Parliament now without a quaver.

Senator Wark, of Fredericton, a life long Liberal has written a long open letter to Hon. Benjamin Battersworth in condemnation of Unrestricted Reciprocity. He says: "I believe our true policy should be to cultivate closer commercial relations with the United Kingdom and all the rest of the colonies."

The Board of Trade had under discussion last evening a subject to which THE EXAMINER has repeatedly called attention. We refer to the washing away of the shore in front of Government Farm. It seems to us that the proposition to lease a small portion of Government Farm for the purposes of a first-class hotel, on condition that a breastwork and roadway be constructed around its shore front is worthy of favorable consideration.

On an Ice Flow.

A correspondent writes: "The people of Pownal Bay and vicinity were startled on Tuesday evening last by cries for help coming from the direction of the broken ice in the river. It appears that two young men, one the teacher of Mount Mellick School and Stewart MacEachern, were in the act of taking a short cut around the shore to Pownal Wharf and stepped on a piece of ice which was apparently solid, when to their horror it gave away from the shore, and before they realized their position the space between them and it grew so wide and the water so deep that they were completely cut off from escape, and in this manner were carried down the river till their cries attracted the attention of some parties on shore who speedily went to their rescue in a dory and brought them ashore and to the residence of Mr. McRae, where they were kindly cared for."

"A Trip Through Scotland."

Professor Mallich delivered on Thursday evening, in St. Dunstan's College, his very interesting and instructive lecture, "A Trip Through Scotland." The lecture was well received and highly appreciated by the students and visitors present. His style was clear, concise and pithy. The sublime, humorous and pathetic were happily blended and very effective. The subjects selected showed a nicety in discrimination and a due consideration for the audience.

The dramatic delineation of the tragic fate of Rizzio, and the pathetic description of the crucifixion by Vandeyck were strikingly pre-eminent. Historic Holyrood and Glasgow Cathedral were presented in a manner worthy of a Scott. His pictures of Scotia's beautiful scenery were graphically portrayed. The educational system, the principal industries and the chief cities were briefly described. Many interesting relics and the primitive customs of the people of Scotland were quaintly touched upon. His peroration was, indeed, eloquent, and a noble eulogy on the national glory, magnanimous spirit and high intellectual achievements of the sturdy sons of Scotland. At the close, a hearty vote of thanks was tendered the lecturer, who made a very fitting reply.

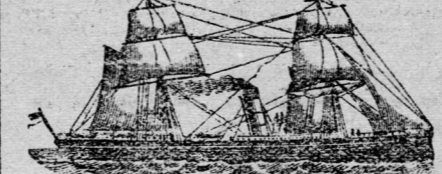

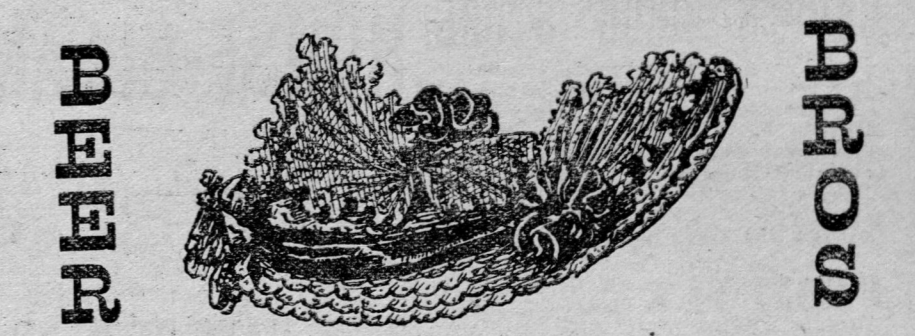

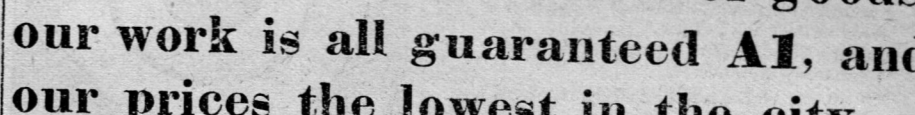
