an Ottawa court.

2. Finance Minister Abbott said the government has not considered deferring payments on the 1946 loan of \$1,250,000,000 to Britain to enable her to buy more Canadian goods.

3. Trade Minister Howe said every encouragement is given to Canadian purchases in the United Kingdom. Canadian defence purchases there are expected to surpass the \$45,000,000 mark in 1951.

4. Members accepted senate amendments to the government's justice vamped combines law after Justice Minister Garson said they make no change in the substance of the legislation. The bill, now awaiting royal assent, provides for a director of investigations and a three-man restrictive trade practices commission to judge charges he may bring.

5. During consideration of the 1952-53 estimates of the Agriculture Department, Prime Minister St. Laurent said the Federal Government will build the South Saskatchewan River irrigation and power project if investigation shows it is a sound investment.

In the redistribution debate, attention was centred mainly on how seats in the Commons should be reallocated after each decennial census.

This is how the seats will be divided in the next parliament, with the existing division in brackets: Newfoundland seven (seven); Prince Edward Island four (four); Nova Scotia 12 (13); New Brunswick 10 (10); Quebec 75 (73); Ontario 85 (83); Manitoba 14 (16); Saskatchewan 17 (20); Alberta 17 (17); British Columbia 22 (18); Yukon-MacKenzie River two (one); Total 265 (262).

Had No Fear

When queried concerning possible fears she might have had in jumping from the plane high over
