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ORANGE CHIP CAKE

1/2 cup shortening, 1/2 cup granulated sugar, 1/2 cup brown sugar, 1/2 teaspoon vanilla, 2 well-beaten eggs, 1 7-ounce package semi-sweet chocolate, chopped very fine, 1/2 cup grated orange peel, 1/4 cup chopped walnut meats, 2 cups flour, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 1 teaspoon soda, 1 cup sour milk. Thoroughly cream shortening, sugars and vanilla. Add eggs; beat thoroughly. Stir in chocolate, orange peel, and nut meats.

Red Extortion

Continued from page 1 one United States dollar. Many letters bear local postmarks, indicating they are sent through Communist agents in Indo-China. The recipient gets eight days to pay. Some who didn't meet the deadline were informed later that a relative in China was in jail or had disappeared.

Indonesia: In this newly-independent country, which recognizes Red China, AP correspondent Bob Kroon learned that requests for funds were usually transmitted through "contacts in Hong Kong." Indonesia has stiff exchange barriers, so the money has to move through non-official channels. Malaysia: In Singapore AP correspondent Jack MacBeth learned that Teochew Chinese community received demands totaling 58,000, 000 Hong Kong dollars, (\$8,923,000) during 1951. MacBeth said many Chinese were ignoring the demands now.

Thailand: Correspondent Alexander MacDonald in Bangkok said Thailand Chinese were reducing the golden stream to China. A Chinese merchant paid 2,000 baht (\$100,000) to keep his mother from being dispossessed from the family land in Fukien Province. He learned later she was dispossessed anyway.

The Red Pelting radio, meanwhile, in an announcement today boldly reminded that after Feb. 1 the Red regime would confiscate foreign currency enclosed in incoming or outgoing letters.
