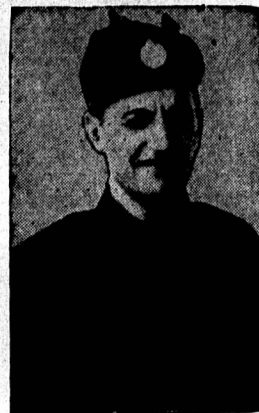
**SAYS HE'S GUILTY** — Robert A. Vogeler, 38, U.S. communications firm executive, who was arrested three months ago on espionage charges, testifies at his trial in Budapest. He pleaded guilty and asked the court for mercy. Seated behind the microphone is Edgar Sanders, Vogeler's British assistant, who also admitted his guilt. Diplomatic observers in Washington said the trial was an obvious frame-up.



**A B-36 on training flight from Alaska to Texas crashed on Princess Royal Island off the coast of British Columbia. Ground parties from R.C.N. destroyer Cayuga are beating through rocky terrain toward six persons believed to have survived parachute jumps. Other 11 men aboard, who parachuted to safety, have been rescued, including Sergt. Vitale Trippodi, who dangled head down overnight from his chute in a tree. M. A. **LOUIS RAES**

A 46-year-old Belgian-born sharecropper, went berserk at Comber, near Windsor, Ont., and crushed the skull of Mrs. Ellen Wallace, 48, who, hours earlier, had ordered the farmer to vacate a 100-acre farm. Charles Louis Raes later was spun to the ground in front of his farmhouse by a police bullet fired as the hammer-wielding ex-army private attacked police sent to question him in the death three hours earlier of Mrs. Wallace, administratrix of the farm. Raes — whose history indicated he was on the border of insanity for several months — was shot in the head by the third of three shots fired in total darkness.

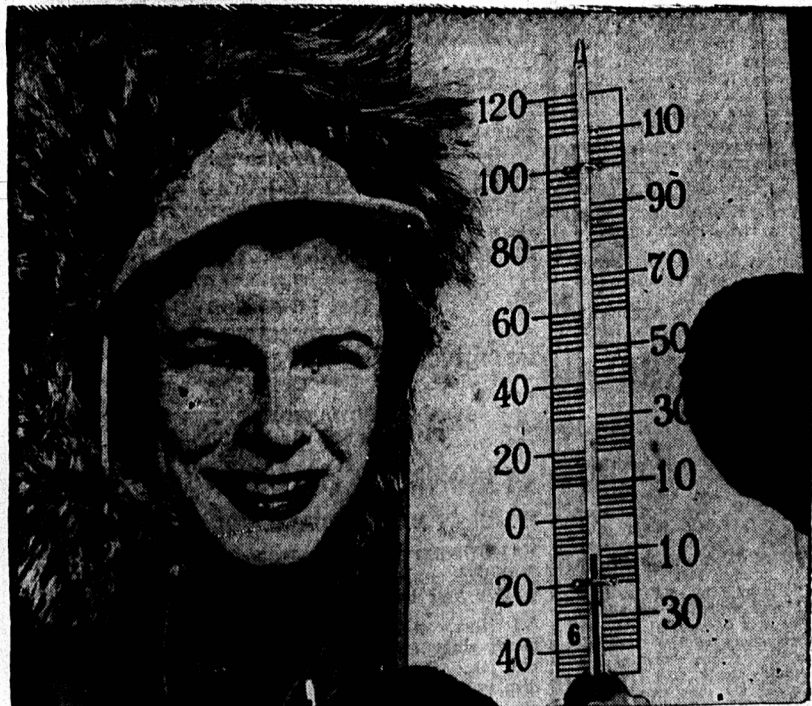


**DR. HERMANN N. SANDER AND WIFE**

Dr. Hermann Nelson Sander, 41, of Manchester, N.H., went on trial in superior court charged with the "mercy slaying" of a suffering woman cancer patient. He was charged with first-degree murder in the Dec. 4 death of Mrs. Abbie Borrotto, 59. Conviction would make life imprisonment mandatory, and the jury could decree that he be hanged. By his own admission, Dr. Sander injected a lethal dose of air into the veins of Mrs. Borrotto. The case has attracted wide interest, with euthanasia advocates taking the part of the New England doctor.



It's a far cry from the days of 1863 when Canada's first woman medical graduate, Augusta Stowe, received her diploma in Cobourg, Ont. Today, 700 women graduates later, there are 78 girl students at University of Toronto alone and they face little of the prejudice that followed the first women practitioners. 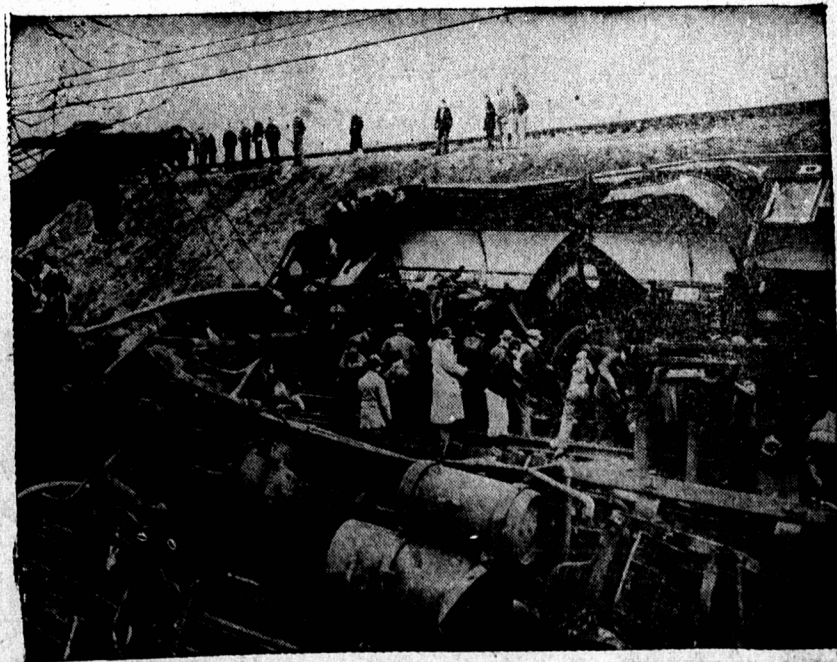


**STUNNED SURVIVORS**—Photo, taken just a few minutes after two Long Island Railroad trains collided head-on at Rockville Center, N.Y., shows some survivors trying to get out of car, others lying stunned where they were thrown. Car was tilted at 45-degree angle and balanced so precariously it rocked dangerously under the feet of rescuers. Twenty-nine persons died in the wreck and 100 were injured.



**MRS. PATTON WITH LARRY, MR. CARSON AND GUY**

Dragged unconscious from six feet of icy water in a farm cistern, two-year-old Larry Patton, King, Ont., was rescued by his grandfather, William Carson, 70, and his mother, Mrs. William Patton. "It was a miracle he didn't drown," said his mother. Five minutes after he fell in, a playmate of Larry's ran to the house, yelled that Larry was in the water. Mrs. Patton and her father dragged the boy up from where he was floating, five feet from surface.
