Collect \$61,743 For Winning Race

INDIANAPOLIS, June 3 - (AP)—Driver Troy Ruttman and owner J. C. Arzianian and his crew collected \$61,743.18 of a record \$230,100 purse Saturday night for winning the Indianapolis Motor Speedway 500-mile race Friday.
The total purse was up from the 1951 total of \$207,850, but Ruttman's cut was less than the \$53,612.12 Lee Wallard took last year because Ruttman led for fewer laps. Each lap was worth \$100 to the leader.
Bill Vukovich, in 17th place, won \$18,693.18, of which \$15,000 was lap money. A 50-cent clamp on the side of his steering gear made the difference between his purse and Ruttman's, because Vukovich was leading Ruttman by almost half a minute when the clamp broke and put him out of the race.

June Term Of Supreme Court Opens At S'side

At the opening of the Supreme Court in Summerside yesterday, which was presided over by Chief Justice Thane A. Campbell, the grand jury found a true bill in the case of Francis Arsenault, of Summerside, charged on two counts (1) Indecent assault against a female, and (2) Robbery.
He was arraigned and pleaded not guilty on both counts.
His trial will commence this morning.
The first of three civil jury cases, John J. Moran vs. Island Motor Transport, was adjourned by agreement until the November term.
This is an action involving injury by bus collision.
Hearing of the civil jury case of Edgar Reeves versus Hubert Agnew was set for June 10th by agreement.
This case is one concerning the breach of contract for delivery of potatoes.
In the only other civil jury case, Ralph Moase versus Ellsworth E. Bernard, absent debtor, judgment and costs were awarded Mr. Moase.
This was a case in which the defendant had given the plaintiff cheque for \$432.00 as payment for two cattle. The cheque proved worthless when it was later taken to a bank to be cashed. The plaintiff was represented by D. O. Stewart.
The only other case on the docket was the appeal case of Joshua Gallant from a conviction under the Temperance Act, which was adjourned from the April sittings, and yesterday was further adjourned to the November court.
On motion of J. Harold Goodwin, Esq. of St. John's, N.B., was appointed a commissioner for taking affidavits for the Supreme Court in P. E. I.
Chief Justice Campbell outlined their duties to the members of the Grand Jury. He read the report of the Sheriff, showing 11 prisoners remaining in jail out of a total of 65 admitted since the November court.
He said this report showed that the majority of these were charged with offences against the liquor laws, and said that vigilance of the police had prevented more offences from occurring.

GRAND JURY'S REPORT
Following is the report of the Grand Jury:
We inspected the goal and found the mattresses and bedding in a deplorable condition and would strongly recommend that new bedding be supplied to the inmates. We also found the floors and walls in a very damp and unsanitary condition, and would like to see some kind of heating system installed to dry out the rooms and cells. We would like to compliment the jailor, Mr. Harry Bishop, on his work with the limited furniture, etc. he has to work with.
We would respectfully suggest that the system whereby the Town of Summerside looked after their overnight prisoners be reverted to, as this is causing unnecessary expense to the Provincial Government.
We rejoice that there is only one criminal case on the docket. We deplore the prevalence of careless driving on the highway, and would recommend that the traffic laws be far more rigidly enforced.
We humbly request that the enclosed recommendations do not fall on deaf ears.

A petit jury will be picked this morning for the one criminal case before the court.

Spec N's Will Be Important People

The following article by Peter Inglis, Southern News Services, appeared recently in the Ottawa Citizen:
SUMMERSIDE, P.E.I.— This is to introduce a learned gentleman called the Spec N, of whom few Canadians have heard much if anything.
Spec N is short for Specialist Navigator. After an air force officer's name it carries about the same weight as Ph D after a scholar's.
There are not many Spec N's (just how many is "classified" information) but in the new air age of faster and higher flight into more remote places, especially the Arctic they are going to be important people.
You will not normally find a Spec N in the navigator's seat of an aircraft, although one died in the recent crash of a Lancaster here. Usually you will find him in a staff job. He is a brain, and a valuable brain.

One Of Products
The Spec N is one of the products of ROAF Station Summerside a sprawling establishment which is now the third biggest community on Prince Edward Island (only the civilian city of Summerside and the capital Charlottetown, have bigger populations) and a centre of airborne learning which has only one possible equal on earth.
The match folders they hand out in the officer's mess of the station are labelled "Summerside, the Garden of Navigation." The University of Navigation would be a better tag line: this place does very much the work of a university in every respect except one—the constant roar of aircraft taking off for training flights is not in the cloistered tradition.
Like a university it has its undergraduate school and its post-graduate school: technically, No 1. Air Navigation School and Central Navigation School. The former turns out the plain ordinary navigators, whose wings are about the equivalent of a B.A. At the moment the course includes young men in the uniforms of Britain and a number of other NATO countries. Central Navigation School produces gentlemen called Snins and Snips (standing for "Staff Navigation Instructor, Navigator, Pilot"), who are the M.A.'s of navigation; it does research work in new techniques and equipment; it sets training standards for the Air Navigation Schools here and at Winnipeg; and, finally it trains the Spec N's.
The Spec N. Course lasts 30 weeks, is small and select, and involves travel over a large area of the earth. The students are veteran navigators: Squadron leaders or senior flight lieutenants. Each class includes one officer from the United States Air Force.

Royal Air Force's Central Navigation and Control School (formerly Empire Air Navigation School) at Shawbury, England. The United States Air Force has nothing to match it.
Originally the Summerside course was patterned after Shawbury's, but in its four years of existence it has changed in scope and emphasis to meet the particular needs of navigation in Canada.
Roughly two-thirds of the course are spent in the classroom in the study of the more abstruse points of navigation and staff subjects. Nearly one-third is spent in travel. Each course puts in two weeks touring Canada and three weeks touring the United States, visiting research and test-and-development establishments in each country; it flies across the Atlantic to the sister school at Shawbury for a three-week tour of the United Kingdom and it ends up with an extended exercise in Lancaster bombers, in the Canadian Arctic.
Previous Arctic exercises have been based on Goose Bay and Churchill. This year's, which is under way at the time of writing, has pushed much farther north and is based on Resolute Bay on Cornwallis Island.
The existence in Canada's smallest air force of a specialized navigation course with only one equivalent on earth underlines the extent to which the RCAF is a navigator's air force. The fact that the course's "graduation exercises" are conducted in the Farther North is a reminder of why the RCAF needs to be a navigator's air force.
