5,000 TROOPS DAILY.

C. P. R. Can Transport That Many Across the Continent.

Montreal, July 18.—It is understood that the C. P. R. has intimated to the Admiralty authorities in London that it is prepared to transport 5,000 troops daily from Quebec to Vancouver if the emergency should arise requiring their presence in China. The accommodation to be provided for the men will be of the best description, and they will be hurried across the continent in "Imperial Limited" time. It is said that the Imperial authorities are intending to make Esquimaux the temporary base of supplies for any troops that may be taken across, and it is likely therefore, that Victoria will probably be the point of embarkation for the troops.

Plague in Peking.

LONDON July 18.—A despatch to the Central News from Rome says telegrams have been received there today which state that the bubonic plague is spreading alarmingly in Peking. There are also numerous cases at Tien Tsin. A letter received by the Propaganda says that early in June the plague was prevalent in Peking, and that four Italian missionaries died of the disease.
