We await the arrival of the English Mail in the hope, that more decided success on the part of the British arms will be the result of the present and honorable peace—in fact to be purchased, it must be honorable—and we trust that before this goes to press, some part of our columns will be occupied with a judgment upon the deeds of valour done by our brave countrymen, and their no less gallant campaign in arms. In the mean time, we observe that preparations for a contest of a more popular character are making nearer home. In alluding to the forthcoming city elections, it is not our intention to make any remarks upon the relative merits of whoever may be the respective candidates for the office of Mayor or those of Councilors. This is the first election, and we have no objection to its being treated except the past conduct of the parties in either public or private life, and by this criterion, we presume, the voters will be in a great degree guided. All that we would wish to impress upon the minds of both Electors and Candidates, is the propriety of conducting the election, if there is to be one, in a generous and liberal manner. On the part of those seeking office, it is a praiseworthy ambition to be desirous of serving the city, and devoting their time and talents to the benefit of the community, and in appealing to the latter to give them the power of being useful, they should remember, that as in a race, all cannot win the prize, so some will be content to see the other triumph, that they will go to the hustings with the determination to abide quietly and good humoredly to the decision of the constituencies, remembering always, that defeat is not disgrace, and that the unsuccessful may adopt Jacob Faithful's consolation "beiser luck, next time." On the side of the Electors, we sincerely hope, and trust, that keenly and ardently as they may enter into the matter, they will always recollect, that however tenacious they may be of their right to elect, it is the duty of those of them should be accompanied with a due regard to those of others who may differ with them in opinion, and that all will be on the side of peace, and that every attempt should be made, to war the harmony of the day. It is the first time the citizens will have been called upon to exercise their franchise in electing, and appointing their annual rulers, and we will not suffer ourselves to doubt, but that they will avail themselves of the opportunity of electing now worthy they are of the privilege by using it with discretion.

Mr. Editor:
Sir.—I have much pleasure in informing you and the public generally, that I have been quite successful in taking up and re-laying the Submarine Cable, in a plain clear of the rocks, and I have had such luck that portion of it which was injured part and secured, and it now works admirably. This affords me much more satisfaction, on account of the great doubt existing in the minds of many, and I believe among some of the Company, as to whether we could splice it, and preserve perfect insulation. Mr. Gibberne, who is not arrived at these matters, told me he would not undertake to raise the Cable and re-lay it, for less than \$1,000, and offered to do so for \$100 to \$1, that if we took it up and re-laid it, if you would not work, I have done it for less than half the sum, and although splicing in several places, it works as perfect as the original. Mr. Wm. Quinn, the operator in this undertaking, he always felt satisfied it could be done. Although it may be usual, it is the first instance of splicing Submarine Cable, and I believe has never been done before in working order from Cape Tormentine to Cape Amber, and in the course of six or eight days feel confident, we will be prepared to send messages to the West Indies, Canada, &c. The Company are getting on rapidly with the line through Newfoundland, and hope to complete it early this autumn.

At a regular meeting of this Division, in the Hall, at the West River, the question of a Prohibitory Liquor Law, and the following Resolutions were passed unanimously:
1. That we regard the opposition offered to the introduction of a prohibitory Liquor Law, by our Representatives, Messrs. Cooper and John McIntosh, Esqrs., with the most unqualified reprobation.
2. That we look upon their treatment of our Petition, which was signed by a majority of their constituents, as casting contempt upon the inhabitants of the district, and destroying all respect in their professions of zeal for the public good.
3. That, Whereas, if they had acted according to the expressed wishes of their constituents, the prohibitory Law would have been passed by the House, and much suffering and crime would have been prevented which will now excite, therefore, we should be held responsible for it all, and we believe that they will have to give an account to the Judge all the earth.
4. That while we highly approve of some of their efforts for the relief of the colored men, we look upon the lowering of the duty upon home manufactured Spirits, as deserving of our most unqualified condemnation, as damaging the interests of the colored men, and a favor, and as an insult to the Electors who signed the Petition for a prohibitory Liquor Law.

Resolved, That the members of this shall oppose a prohibitory Liquor Law, as an enemy to the interests and property of the country; and we solemnly pledge ourselves to give such no support.
