Huge Gas Plant Is Opened At Pincher Creek, Alberta

PINCHER CREEK, Alta. (CP) — On 150 acres of rolling ranch land in the foothills of southwestern Alberta stands one of Western Canada's most important new industrial plants.
The \$35,000,000 complex of 17 buildings, huge storage tanks and pipe lines that is the British Pincher Creek gas processing and sulphur plant officially went into operation Wednesday.
The plant, serving one of the most extensive natural gas fields ever discovered in Canada, will be the largest supplier of gas to wells awaiting completion of the Trans-Canada Pipeline. Stage 2 extracts the additional products of propane and butane and produces gas suitable for domestic and commercial use.
Pincher Creek is located in the Rocky Mountains 50 miles west of Lethbridge. The town was hard when the coal industry began to fail in the early 1930s. Revived with construction of the B-A plant 13 miles south, the population now is nearly 2,000, an increase of 600 since 1951.
New businesses have sprung up with attendant housing and commercial development. Last year, \$240,000 worth of housing was built to accommodate gas plant workers who poured into the town. Plans are being made for 75 new buildings next year.
Pincher Creek is said to have been named as a result of a gold prospector, panning a southern Alberta creek in 1869, losing a pair of pinchers, or pinches. The rusted tool was found several years later and the stream promptly was dubbed Pincher Creek.

marked completion of stage 2 of an operation that began when the No. 1 gas discovery well, drilled to a depth of more than two miles, blew in Dec. 28, 1947. Daily production capacity is 100,000,000 cubic feet of gas, 3,950 barrels of stabilized condensate, 11,700 gallons of propane, 20,280 gallons of butane and 435 long tons of sulphur.
The plant was built in two stages. Stage 1, completed in January, 1957, was designed to recover only condensate and sulphur and to return the partially processed gas into reservoir gas wells awaiting completion of the Trans-Canada pipeline. 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ELECTION JOBS NOT FOR MAMA

TORONTO (CP) — The happy days when mama could pick up a few bucks working on election day may be at an end, at least in Toronto.
City Clerk Edgar Norris told the board of control Wednesday that ballot boxes are too heavy for the average woman to carry.
Moreover, he added, election day is too long, from before 8 a.m. to 2 or 3 a.m. the following day.
Mr. Norris had been asked why only two of the deputy returning officers named for the approaching civic election are women.
"I don't think it's quite a proper task for a lady," he remarked.

Building Of Houses May Be At New High

OTTAWA (CP) — At least 153,000 housing units should be started in Canada this year, an all-time high, Central Mortgage and Housing Corporation forecast Wednesday.
The present record for housing starts is 138,276, established in 1955. The figure last year was 122,340.
In forecasting the 153,000 figure for 1958, the CMHC said that in the first seven months this year the annual rate for housing starts, taking seasonal factors into consideration, was 115,600 in municipalities of 5,000 or more population.
"If starts in the remaining months of the year were at the same rate, total starts for the country as a whole would be of the order of 153,000 units for the full year."

U.S. Copper Market Strong

NEW YORK (AP) — A combination of increased demand at home and abroad and sharply curtailed supply have put the U.S. copper market in its strongest position in many months.
Prices here and in Europe are on the rise and further increases seem probable under current conditions. Only a quiet settlement of strikes in Rhodesia, Canada and the United States could change the picture in a hurry.
Further fuel was added to the fire Thursday with statistics from the Copper Institute showing a severe drop in stocks of refined copper during September. The total of 178,494 tons—\$7,066 tons less than the previous month—compared with the May peak of 253,463 tons and was the lowest since January's 176,287 tons.

Chiang Will Decide On Quemoy Force

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Eisenhower pledged Wednesday he would not press Nationalist China to reduce the size of its army on Quemoy. But he said he believes it illogical to keep so many troops on the shell-torn island.
"We are not going to coerce or try to coerce an ally about something in which they believe their very existence depends," he said.
Eisenhower spoke at a press conference, backing up State Secretary Dulles' remarks Tuesday that the U.S. would allow Generalissimo Chiang Kai-shek to decide for himself what to do with his Quemoy forces.

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
