AMONG THE FARMERS

Federation of Agriculture Newsletter

PASTURE IMPROVEMENT
Last Friday was the deadline for making entry in the provincial First Pasture Improvement Competition and a total of eighty-eight farmers got under the wire. In spite of a slow start Queens ended up with thirty-three entries, followed by Prince with twenty-nine and Kings with twenty-six. These numbers insure that there will be a good competition in each County, certainly the provincial finals should bring forward something quite special in the way of winners. It is planned to make two inspections—spring and summer—with a team of two judges for each County.

It is a rather interesting fact that the competition should coincide with a year that has produced an unusual amount of winter killing particularly in the old pasture. It would appear that the absence of stubble or any protective covering in these pastures has made them prone to fairly extensive killing in patches. Some pastures appear to have areas amounting to almost 50 per cent of the total in which there is no live vegetation.

NO RED CLOVER
While it doesn't always produce the best hay, heavy fields of red clover are very often the yardstick by which a farm or a farmer is judged. Clover is a soil builder and produces very heavy tonnage on favourable years. Fields that were seeded with grass and clover in 1958 showed very fine promise last fall but the very cold weather together with practically no covering of snow has turned that promise into a blighted hope. Very little clover is to be found this spring although new meadows do show a fairly satisfactory growth of grass.

The C.F.A. after one meeting last week on the question of deficiency payments for hogs is asking each province to state its position on this question and to decide whether or not a general meeting of hog people on a national basis should be called to consider the whole problem. The issue at stake is of course the probable effect of the Government discontinuing its offer to purchase hogs at a floor price and in stead let the market find its own level.

That would be a case of the trade handling all production and the Government making up the difference, to the farmer, between the floor and what the free market would actually bring. Hog people are concerned that under this system with very heavy supplies hog prices could go very low with serious effects on the price level of other meats and involving the Government in quite heavy expenditures.

Further, deficiency payments which can also be considered consumer subsidies give the consumer a false idea of the real value of farm products. The above are only a few of the implications of the problem. It is of course not confined to hogs

for the same system is planned for eggs and already is in effect with respect to milk for manufacturing purposes.

ABUNDANT BUTTER
For the week ending May 9 butter production in the province was over a hundred thousand pounds, possibly the first time that figure has been reached so early in the season. For the first four months of the year butter production rose by 14 per cent in this province as compared with last year. No other province increased by as high a percentage. If pastures are average this summer, production of butter could be a record this year.

In addition both cheese and ice-cream production rose substantially in the province for the first four months of the year.

URBAN OR RURAL
Undoubtedly Canada is changing from an agricultural economy to one in which industry is relatively more important. Agriculture laid the foundation in this country for practically all our industries. Transportation developed when the farmer produced more than he could use at home and wanted to move it elsewhere. The building of railways provided a market for our coal mines and our iron and steel mills. With an expanding agriculture the factories were needed to build farm machinery.

This employment was provided in the centers and urban population started to grow. Abundant agricultural production at low prices provided willing and able workers and the change from subsistence farming to

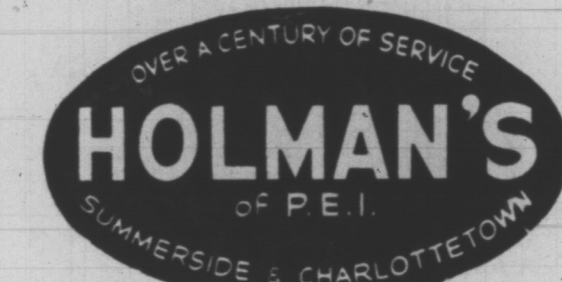
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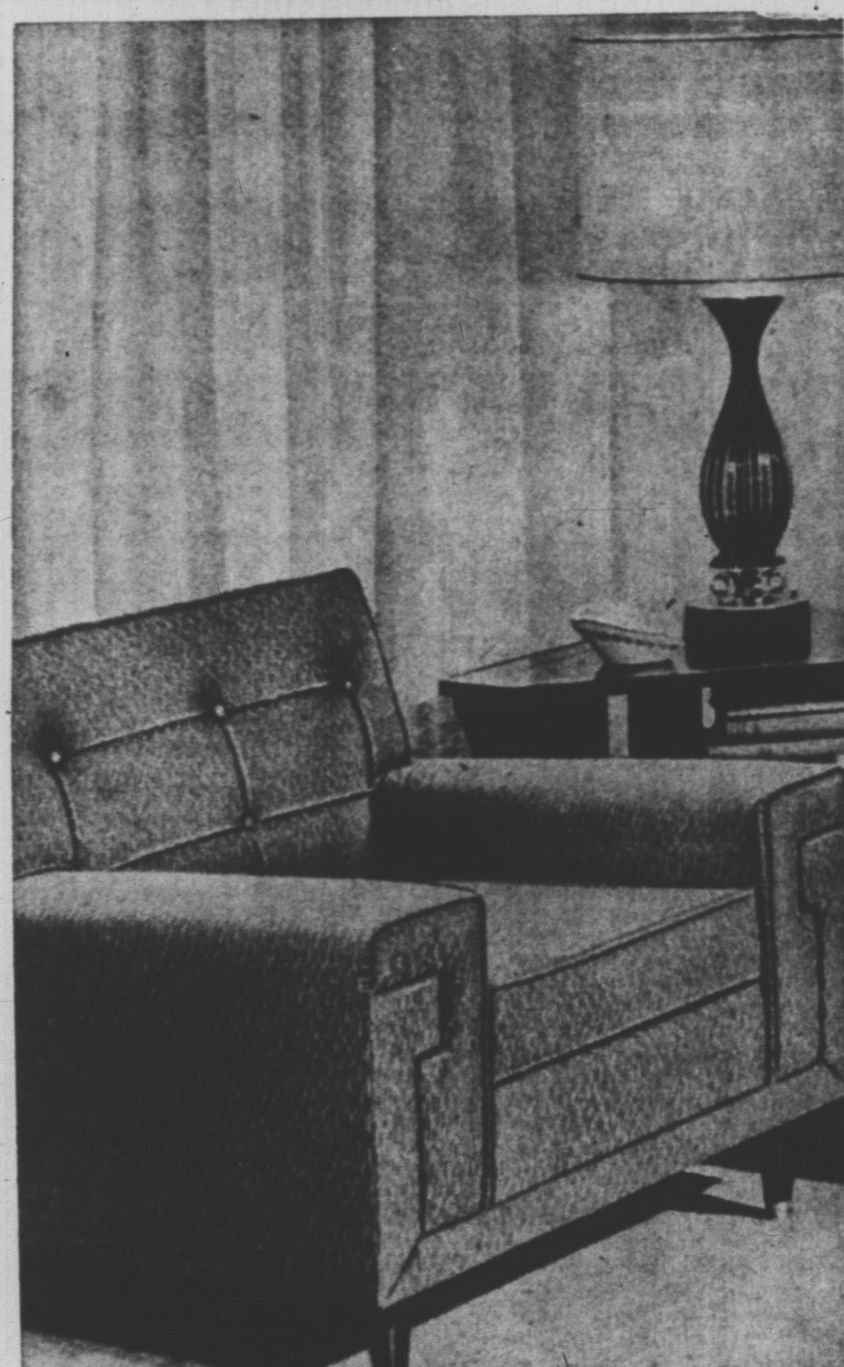
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
