Canadian Teachers To Meet In Ch'town, 1951

Announcement was made Friday evening at a meeting of the Island Teachers Federation executive that the Canadian Teachers' Federation directorate have accepted the invitation of the Island teachers to hold their 1951 annual convention in Charlottetown.

Appropriate arrangements will be made by the Island teachers for the accommodation and entertainment of the sixty or seventy delegates and guests from all Provinces.

The meeting authorized Mr. Milne MacPherson and Mr. J. A. S. Williams to publicize in the Educational Horizon Dr. Buck's history of the Federation, making the history up-to-date by completing it from the time of Dr. Buck's publication.

The question of summer school for teachers was discussed at considerable length, and after due consideration, conclusions were reached to have the matter further discussed by the Board of Governors in annual convention on November 3.

A confidential report was read from the national secretary, showing the favourable progress being made towards federal aid for education.

The following resolution, passed by the C. T. F. was also endorsed by the Island executive: "Resolved that Provincial teachers' organizations be requested to consider incorporating in their letter-heads, on the mastheads of their magazines, and in their handbooks, 'Affiliated with the Canadian Teachers' Federation.'"

Plans for Education Week, to be held nationally early in March, were discussed, and some suggestions for the consideration of the Education committee will be submitted to chairman, Miss Estelle Bowness.

The Secretary-Treasurer, Miss Mabel Auld, was instructed to present to Reggie MacQuaid, Miscellaneous, the J. D. Seaman Memorial Prize in English awarded by the Prince Edward Island Teachers' Federation to the pupil standing highest in English Entrance to P. W. C.

Present at the meeting, along with the executive, were Messrs. John Connolly and J. Weeks Murphy of the Constitution and Policy Committee, who presented for the consideration of the meeting several beneficial changes in the by-laws of the Federation. These suggested changes will be submitted for the consideration of the Board of Governors.

The meeting adjourned after a correspondence had been read.

Minister's Death Widely Mourned SAINT JOHN, Sept. 14 - The death of Rev. Christopher Graham, which occurred at Kentville, N.S. yesterday, was a cause of deep regret to the many who had known him as a leading figure in military and religious affairs of this city and the Maritime provinces for over a generation.

Although he had been officially retired from the United Church ministry for over a year, he had accepted a circuit in Hebron, Yarmouth County, N.S., in July of this year, and had intended to fill the post there, to ease a scarcity of ministers, for a period of one year.

Born in Saint John, a son of the late Mr. and Mrs. S.I. Graham of Lakewood, he was in his 70th year. He had resided in Saint John for the greater part of his life, and was a veteran of the Boer War, the First World War and the Second World War.

For a period during the Second World War he had held the rank of Lieutenant-Colonel and was commanding officer of the second battalion of the 8th Princess Louise's (N.S.) Hussars. He entered the ministry following the First World War in 1919, and was married in the same year, his wife being the former Miss Ruth Allan.

C. W. I. Delegation Overseas Report

Following are excerpts from a report of the activities of the overseas delegation of the Canadian Women's Institute, received through the director of the W.I. branch and home economic service, Ontario Department of Agriculture, Prince Edward Island representative on the delegation is Mrs. Malcolm MacLeod.

"One week of invigorating sea weather, stimulating daily meetings along with good food and happy fellowship has brought the 23 Canadian Women's Institute members to the other shore full of vim, vigour and vitality ready to give of their best not only to the Associated Country Women of the World conference deliberations but also as they visit sister Women's Institute organizations en route.

"Twenty-three of the thirty-five official delegates representing each of the ten Provinces across Canada travelled via S.S. Empress of France and are visiting Women's Institute groups in England, Scotland, Norway and Sweden en route to the triennial international conference of the Associated Country Women of the World to be held in Copenhagen, Denmark. After the conference they plan to meet with sister organizations in the Netherlands and Northern Ireland as well as visit Lady Tweedsmuir of Elsiefield Manor, Oxfordshire, and Miss Elizabeth Christmas, warden of Denman (Women's Institute) College.

"For the first time in history Canadian rural women travelled abroad as a unit officially recognized by the Federal and each of the ten Provincial Governments.

"The Canadians will go on record as wholeheartedly supporting F.A.O. and other United Nations agencies which will help countries help themselves to meet their problems and become self-sustaining.

"A feature of the conference is to be a panel on rural welfare chaired by Dr. Margaret L. Hockin, V.-A.O. Rural Welfare Officer (a Canadian by the way). In preparation for this panel, the delegation on board reviewed recent developments and programs throughout Canadian provinces.

"Discussion on the problems of food production and distribution proved very stimulating. The A.C.W.W. which has consultative status with F.A.O. is the only international organization that speaks for rural women as such. Hence, the Canadian delegation aimed to become well informed in order to speak intelligently and with force.

"A letter went forth from the delegation in support of the Canadian Prime Minister's recent action regarding the recruiting of a task force to serve under United Nations.

"Among other recommendations which will be submitted by the Canadian delegation is the one that a letter be sent from the A.C.W.W. conference in session to the Security Council of United Nations endorsing its action of the use of force to stop aggressor nations from preying upon weaker nations and that we favour a permanent United Nations force to preserve peace.

"Mrs. E.E. Morton, president, Federated Women's Institute of Canada and head of the Canadian delegation chaired all meetings which recorded 100% attendance. Goodwill and co-operation abounded."

Says Demand For P. E. Island Cheese Excellent

Commenting on a recent news item in the local press regarding the marketing of this year's cheese production, Mr. Donald A. MacDonald of Glenfinnan, official salesman of the Cheese Producers' Association of P. E. I. stated that he does not anticipate any difficulty whatsoever in disposing of the balance of this year's cheese.

He stated that there is only one quarter as much cheese at the Government Cold Storage Plant as there was at this time last year and practically all of that quantity has been sold during the past several days at about the highest price level ever paid for cheddar cheese in Canada.

Sales in the early part of the summer were very heavy, it was stated by Mr. H.J. MacDonald, Dairy Superintendent, last night with the cheese selling at 35-38 cents a pound wholesale. Sales slackened slightly for about three weeks but recently have been high. It was pointed out that Island cheese sales this year were the best on record.

Island cheese production from January 1st to August 1st was about 300,000 pounds, a decrease of about 200,000 pounds for the same period last year. August's production was nearly the same as last year's and September's may exceed that of September 1949.

In addition, St. Rita's Hospital board will break ground here next spring on the site of a 150-bed institution costing about \$1,500,000 capacity.
