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Taxation On Chain Stores & Acceptance Corporations Raised

Committee Reading Given Acts Dealing With Income And Personal Property Taxation, Slot Machines, National Park Site, Peddlers' Licenses, Succession Duties, Stallion Enrollment And Stipendiary Magistrates.

Legislative Chamber, April 16. The House met at 12 o'clock noon. Mr. Barbour asked the Attorney General to lay on the table answers to the following question:

(1) Was a flat granted to Allan Shaw or Cyrus Shaw or either of them to commence action against the Government of this Province for damage arising out of a Motor Vehicle accident near Lorne Valley in Kings County, on or about the 28th day of July, 1930?

(2) If so, was any action commenced?

(3) Was any public money paid to any party or parties with respect to same either as damages or costs and to whom and what amount?

Answers:
(1) Yes; to Cyrus and Allan Shaw.
(2) Yes.
(3) Yes, \$5,000 to Cyrus A. Shaw and Allan Shaw.

Hon. Mr. McGulgan presented a petition of Charles Greger and another praying for an Act to incorporate the Howes Hill Company at Brackley Point. A bill in accordance with the petition was received and read.

Hon. Mr. McGulgan introduced the following bills:
An Act to Amend the Prince Edward Island Fish and Game Protective Association Act, 1928.

An Act authorizing the Lieutenant Governor in Council to appoint a Commission to investigate certain Public Utility Companies.

An Act to repeal the Public Library Act.

Hon. Mr. Dennis introduced "An Act to repeal an Act to amend an Act to prevent frauds by secret bills of sale of personal chattels, and amendments thereto."

THIRD READINGS

The following bills were read a third time and passed:
An Act to incorporate Northumberland Trust Company.

An Act to further amend the Summerside Incorporation Act 1903 and to authorize the closing of a portion of Beaver Street.

An Act to incorporate the Prince Edward Island Co-operative Livestock Marketing Board.

PERSONAL & PROPERTY TAXATION ACT AMENDMENTS

On motion of Premier Campbell the House went into committee, with Mr. Wright in the chair, on second reading of an Act to amend the Income and Personal Property Taxation Act.

Section 1 of the bill adds to sec. 68 of the statute a provision that the rate of taxation on insurance companies shall apply to insurance exchanges, but shall not apply to special insurance brokers. Every special insurance broker accepting risks and carrying on the business of insurance against fire in the Province shall pay a tax at a rate to be fixed from time to time by the Lieutenant Governor.

The Premier explained that insurance companies carrying on business in the Province have to pay a license fee and in addition to that an annual tax of \$25. Some insurance associations have escaped paying this tax by forming themselves into what they call insurance exchanges. There are two defects in this system; first, the Government is deprived of revenue which it derives from the regular insurance companies; and second, it involves unfair competition with those companies which do take out licenses and pay the annual tax. It is now proposed, in the first place, to make the taxation of insurance companies apply to these insurance exchanges, and, in the second place, to provide "a reasonable system" of taxing special insurance brokers.

"There are," continued the Premier, "some classes of risks which the ordinary licensed companies in the Province do not care to carry at what is considered a reasonable rate. The Insurance Act provides that if persons who wish to take out insurance on such classes of risks offer the licensed companies to do business with them at a certain rate and the licensed companies are not interested in that rate, then the person who wishes to get the insurance can go outside the Province and insure at the same rate he offered the licensed companies. If he does that he must do

business through a special licensed broker. But up to the present time there has been no opportunity of taxing these special brokers. It is proposed that the rate of taxation on special brokers of that kind shall be fixed from time to time by the Lieutenant Governor in Council. As a matter of fact we have already fixed it for the time being, but we have had no legislative authority for doing it. This gives us the authority."

Hon. Mr. Prowse: "It does not interfere with the tax on the ordinary insurance companies."

Premier Campbell: "No, the tax on licensed companies will be the same."

Sec. 3, as amended in committee, provides for a tax upon all corporations doing business of loan companies or building companies within the Province, the sum of \$100, and upon all corporations doing the business of trust or trust and loan companies within the Province, the sum of \$400.

The net effect of this change, the Premier said, is to reduce the tax on loan companies from \$150 to \$100. The former rate, applicable at present to only one company, has been regarded as excessive. It is expected other companies will come in if the rate is reduced to \$100.

Chain Store Taxation

Sec. 4 imposes on every branch chain store doing business within the Province a tax of \$2,000; provided, however, that if any person or corporation so assessed shall establish that the said amount exceeds 3 per cent of the gross turnover of any such branch for the twelve months immediately preceding the first day of April in the current year, the amount of such tax shall be reduced to 3 per cent of such gross turnover for the said period of twelve months. No appeal shall be allowed against an assessment made under this subsection unless the Provincial Treasurer shall first have been furnished with an accurate statement verified by affidavit, setting forth the amount of such gross turnover.

"Chain store" shall mean and include any branch retail store operated or controlled directly or indirectly by any person, firm or corporation, who or which either within or without the Province operates or controls four or more retail stores, either directly or indirectly through parent, subsidiary or affiliated persons, firms or corporations.

This measure, the Premier said, would provide "a more reasonable method" of taxing the income of chain stores. At present we do not believe we are getting a fair tax from some of these concerns and we propose this amendment to provide taxation on a more equitable basis.

Sec. 5 increases the tax on Acceptance Corporations from \$200 to \$500.

The sections passed without any general discussion, and the bill was reported agreed to.

At 1 o'clock the House took recess.

After Recess

The House resumed at 3.15 p. m. The Premier tabled the annual reports of the Royal Canadian Mounted Police and of the Wholesale Liquor Vendor.

On motion of Premier Campbell the Credit Union Societies Act was read a third time and passed.

INSURANCE ACT

On motion of the Premier the House went into committee with Mr. Foley in the chair on an Act to amend the Insurance Act.

The amendments, the promoter explained, are those submitted by the Committee on Uniformity which suggests changes from year to year in insurance legislation of general application in all the provinces in order to make for smooth working of the law. The bill, consisting of eleven sections in all, was agreed to without amendment.

On motion of the Premier the House went into committee with Mr. Wright in the chair on "An Act to regulate summary proceedings."

The bill provides a uniform form of procedure for recovering penal-

ties under all criminal prosecutions. It was agreed to without amendment.

SLOT MACHINE BILL

On motion of the Premier the House went into committee with Mr. Barbour in the chair on second reading of an Act respecting Slot Machines.

The Premier explained that the provinces of Manitoba and Saskatchewan have already passed this legislation and it is being brought in this year in the Legislatures of New Brunswick and Nova Scotia. The object is that slot machines which under the Criminal Code are supposed to be illegal, shall not be the subject of property rights within the Province, and can be seized by the police when in operation, and ordered confiscated by the magistrate.

The Act defines the expression "Slot Machine" as follows:
(a) An automatically or mechanically, or automatically and mechanically operated machine, contrivance, or device which, upon or subsequent to the inserting therein or in a slot or receptacle thereof of any money, coin, disc, counter, token, slug or other substance and upon or without the operation of any handle, lever, plunger or other attachment thereof delivers or returns or purports to deliver or return to any person, depositing therein any money, coin, disc, counter, token, slug, or other substance, either with or without any article of merchandise or any goods, any money, premium, prize, token, reward, counter, coin, disc, slug or anything which is intended to be or capable of being exchanged for money or money's worth, or which may be replaced or re-inserted in any such machine, contrivance or device to again set it in operation; and
(b) any machine, contrivance or device the result of one or any number of operations of which is, as regards the operator, a matter of chance or uncertainty, or which, as a consequence of any given number of operations yields different results to the operator, notwithstanding that the result of some one or more or all of such operations may be known to the operator in advance.

Under Sec. 3 no such machine shall be capable of operating or being operated by the subject of property rights within the Province, and no court of civil jurisdiction shall recognize or give effect to any alleged ownership of or any property rights in any slot machine.

The bill was reported agreed to without amendment.

NATIONAL PARK BILL

On motion of the Premier the House went into committee with Mr. Cox in the chair on second reading of an Act respecting a National Park.

The bill reads as follows:

"WHEREAS it is proposed that a National Park should be established in the Province of Prince Edward Island, by the Government of Canada upon a site to be provided by the Government of Prince Edward Island;

"AND WHEREAS it is expedient to provide a legislative machinery for the procuring of such a site;

"BE IT THEREFORE ENACTED by the Lieutenant Governor and Legislative Assembly of the Province of Prince Edward Island as follows:

1. For the purpose of selecting a site for a National Park, areas or areas in the Province, the Provincial Secretary and any other person or persons authorized by him or her by the Executive Council may enter upon any land or premises alleged to be suitable for such site and may make an inspection and survey of the same.

2. If any lands within the Province are deemed to be suitable for a National Park, the Lieutenant Governor in Council may make an order vesting such lands, together with all buildings, appurtenances, easements, rights and water courses, and all other things belonging or adjacent in His Majesty the King in the right of the Province of Prince Edward Island absolutely.

3. Such order shall contain a plan and description of such land, as well as the names and addresses of the owners, lessees, or occupants of any part of and of all parties having any interest or estate therein so far as the same may be ascertained, and shall be filed in the Registry of Deeds for the county in which such lands lie.

4. The Provincial Secretary shall forthwith forward by registered post a copy of such order in duplicate to each person known to have any interest or estate in such lands, either as owner, or lessee, or occupant, or otherwise.

5. If, within a reasonable time from the making of the order in Council, a satisfactory agreement has not been reached with regard to the amount and apportionment of the compensation to be paid by the Government of the Province by way of compensation for the lands and premises thereby expropriated, the Lieutenant Governor in Council may make a further order fixing the amount of such compensation, and the Provincial Treasurer may thereupon pay the amount so fixed into the Treasury of Canada or in any such department, office, or trustee on behalf of the Government of Canada as may be proper for the establishment of a National Park on such site.

6. In case any lands so expropriated shall be necessary for the purpose of a National Park, the

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Lieutenant Governor in Council shall first offer to recall such lands to the persons from whom the same were expropriated at the price of the compensation paid therefor, and in default of such offer may sell or otherwise dispose of the same as the Lieutenant Governor in Council may see fit."

The Premier said it is proposed that the Dominion Government should establish a National Park in this Province, but the site must be provided by the Province. "We hope," he added, "that sometime during the coming summer a site may be selected and we are afraid that even the rumor of a selection of a site for such purpose would greatly enhance the value of lands suitable in the eyes of the owners. While the Government would not wish to buy such lands at a sacrifice, yet it is necessary to forewarn themselves by providing machinery whereby such a site could be procured and purchased at a reasonable market value."

Mr. Mustard asked if the approximate cost of such a site could be given.

Premier Campbell: "I cannot give you any idea of that, but it is anticipated that the cost will be trifling."

Mr. Mustard: "There is no minimum area required."

Premier Campbell: "No. The area varies extensively in different provinces. In this province it is anticipated that from 300 to 500 acres would be required as a start."

The bill was reported agreed to without amendment.

PEDDLER'S ACT

On motion of Hon. Mr. McGulgan the House went into committee with Mr. Stewart in the chair on second reading of the Peddler's Act.

The purpose, the promoter explained, was to consolidate the existing regulations.

Hon. Mr. LePage said he had received petitions signed by over 20 merchants in his district asking that the fee for peddlers within the Province be increased from \$20 to \$100. Perhaps the latter figure was too high, but he thought the present \$20 fee was certainly too little.

Mr. Cox said in his district there was not the same objection. Merchants themselves send out peddlers in the spring and a higher fee would not be acceptable.

Mr. Barbour said that in the Public Accounts the sum of only \$150 is shown as having been collected in licenses from peddlers last year.

Hon. Mr. McGulgan: "That has been the trouble. They are paying nothing at all at the present time."

Mr. Linkletter suggested \$25 as a suitable annual license fee.

Hon. Mr. McGulgan thought the present fee should remain unchanged. It was the intention, he said, to devote special attention to collecting it.

The Act exempts persons selling fruit, fish, meat, victuals or country produce, and also those selling the goods or wares of their own manufacture.

In the case of transient or itinerant persons carrying on the business of a photographer, or canvassing, soliciting or peddling photographs, or pictures made from photographs, or offering such pictures or photographs as a premium with any other goods, or selling or offering for sale frames for such pictures within the Province, the Act provides that the license fee shall be \$200.

Hon. Mr. Allen referred to cases of gross swindling on the part of itinerant peddlers of the kind
