The members of the Evangelical alliance and Rev. Mr. Kempton, of St. John, attended a public meeting in the F. C. B. Church last evening, all speaking strongly in favor of the Act as the most advanced piece of temperance legislation the Dominion has ever had, and holding that it can be enforced.

POLICE COURT.—This forenoon William Paxon, for being and entering the counting house of A. Down in Tuesday last, was remanded to jail until Tuesday. A Nova Scotia named Hawkins was fined \$3 or 14 days for being drunk in the vicinity of the Railway Station last evening. Hawkins gathered in by Sergeant Bradley about seven o'clock. He was very drunk and was placed in a cell in the station to sober up. About four o'clock this morning the officer in charge of the station heard a great noise below stairs—in the vicinity of Hawkins's quarters—and went down to see what was the cause of the disturbance. FEAR OF INFECTION.—According to a late despatch there is fear of infection at Halifax from immigrant steamers. The board of health was again in session on Tuesday night, when the following resolution was passed: The attention of the Dominion government is immediately called to the fact that the ocean steamships which usually make some portion of the United States their terminus are now calling here and landing passengers and baggage, on account of the laxity of our quarantine regulations, and as this landing and the disinfection of the baggage taken place in a central portion of the city and is a source of danger and serious menace to the health of our citizens, it is the opinion of the board that the government should be urged to equip our quarantine station at Lawlor's Island as speedily as possible.

The Vaudreuil Election.

MONTEAL, April 14. Of the Vaudreuil election the Star says: "The Liberal victory in Vaudreuil will present an almost irresistible temptation to such of the Tariff Reform press as are far enough away from the county to have escaped the echoes of the contest, to claim a triumph for their principles. Here, in Montreal, however, the allurement is more easily withstood; for we have known all along, and grieved to know, that the real issue upon which the election would turn, was the attitude of the two parties on the Manitoba School question."

A Mysterious Case.

OTTAWA, April 14. Mrs. John Boyd, of Hutley, was found lying in her bed shot through the heart yesterday morning. An inquest is being to ascertain whether the case was one of murder or of suicide.

Gladstone's Opinion.

LONDON, April 14. Mr. Gladstone, in an interview with a deputing of Imperial Federation League, approved the objects of the League, but said that he was opposed to preferential trade within the empire.

Killed by Lightning.

NASHVILLE, Tenn., April 14. The barn of Chas. Reed, a prominent horse man, was struck by lightning and twenty five blood mares in foal, by the celebrated horse St. Bass, were killed. Loss, \$300,000.

ST. JOHN, April 14. The Legislature will adjourn this afternoon.

General Telegraphic News.

LONDON, April 12.—The English, Scottish and Australian chartered bank has failed, with liabilities of £5,000,000. The bank was incorporated by royal charter in 1852. It is claimed to have a paid up capital of \$900,000; reserve fund \$310,000. The London office is at 38 Lombard Street, E. C. The bank has main branches in Sydney, Adelaide, Brisbane, Melbourne, and various lesser points in New South Wales, Victoria and South Australia. It transacted a banking and exchange business between Great Britain and the Australian colonies, and had large deposits. The liabilities are believed to be £8,000,000. Only approximate estimate of the assets can be given. They are supposed to be a large proportion. The reserve liability is £900,000. The last balance sheet made public in September, 1892, showed deposits of almost £6,000,000. The only reason given for the failure is that there has been for several weeks a steadily increasing withdrawal of deposits.

MONTEAL, April 12.—Hon. Mr. Angers met here to-day a large deputation of cattle exporters and steamship owners, who asked the minister to send Dr. McEwen to the old country to look after the first arrival of live cattle from Halifax towards the end of the month. The inspector announced that diseased lungs from American cattle had been passed off on British inspectors as being from Canadian stock. The minister said he was in communication with Sir Charles Tupper and would decide very shortly.

LONDON, April 12.—In the House of Commons yesterday Ashmead Bartlett (Conservative) made a speech against the home rule bill. Michael Davitt made a forcible speech in favor of the one course. He said the bill would be accepted by thirteen millions of the Irish race as a fact of peace to be honorably observed. He had changed his opinion since 1886, and now strongly supported the retention of Irish members in the Imperial parliament.

MONTEAL, April 12.—A Star cable from London says: The recent discussion in diplomatic and political circles over the Franco-Canadian treaty has directed widespread attention to the extension of the treaty-making power of Canada. Mr. Gladstone, speaking in the home rule debate, noted that the colonies are now making their own trade laws. In direct reference to Canada he said: "In the case of Canada, we have begun to allow her, subject, of course, to Imperial control, to prosecute her own substantial interests in connection with important foreign states." Joseph Chamberlain also referred to the nature of treaty making by British colonies. He declared that the former reservations in the case of Canada regarding diplomatic relations, had been found practically impossible to sustain. Continuing, Chamberlain said: "Canada now claims the right to be represented directly in all negotiations affecting her." These significant admissions indicate the most important concession secured by the Dominion. In proof of this, too, is quoted the presence of Messrs. Thompson, as arbitrator, Tupper, as British agent, and Robinson and Sir Charles Charles Tupper, as Canadian in the arbitration tribunal. Canada, indeed, is here regarded as being herself a treaty-making power now.

MADRID, April 12.—An explosion occurred in the Sala, Caladia company's mills in Mabro, to-day. The roof was blown off. The walls were rent. Most of the flooring collapsed. Fire broke out after the explosion was extinguished. The dead bodies of nine workmen and the manager were removed from the ruins. The number of dead is not yet known.

News Notes.

The Viceroy of Ireland has issued orders to restrict the importation of arms into Ireland.

Judge McDougall, at Toronto, has decided that 24 per cent. beer is intoxicating. The Quebec Legislature holds that 4 per cent. is not intoxicating.

During March the revenue collected on Chinese immigrants at Vancouver, B. C., amounted to \$1,501, a decrease of \$2,220 compared with the receipts during March of last year.

Oman Dignas has been leading in another raid against the Egyptians. There is nothing strange in this, save that the despatches have killed Oman as often almost as they have done for Emin Pasha. The resemblance between the two men is, however, confined to this. Oman is as ugly as Emin is mild.

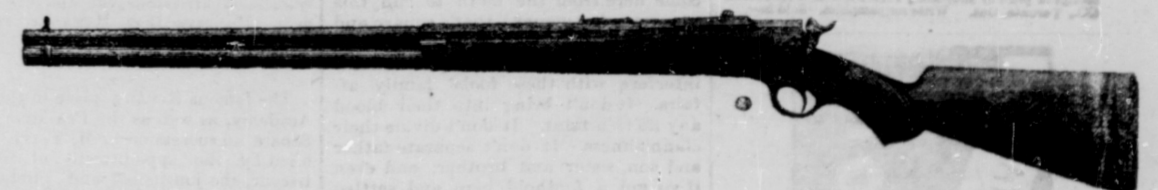
