THE auction sale of the McLean property, on the north side of the West River, Lot 65, eight miles from Charlottetown, took place on the premises yesterday. The sale was conducted by A. McNeill, auctioneer. That portion of the property known as the "Hyde farm," consisting of 102 1/2 acres, was offered first and realized \$3,920. Theophilus Crosby, Esq., of West River, was the purchaser of this fine farm. There was the purchaser of a number of wealthy farmers present, and the bidding evinced keen competition. The balance of the property was purchased at a nominal sum in Mrs. McLean's interest.

Following are the prices:—Beef (small) 5 to 10 cts per lb.; do per quarter 4 1/2 to 7 cts; mutton, 5 to 8 cts; pork (canned) 4 1/2 to 5 cts; ham, per lb. 13 to 14 cts; lamb, 6 to 8 cts; butter (fresh), 24 to 25; do (tub) 17 to 19 cts; eggs, per doz. \$2.30 to \$2.50; oats, 32 to 33 cts; hay per 100, 40 to 50 cts; potatoes, 18 to 20 cts; geese, 50 to 70; cabbage, per doz, 35 to 50; turnips, per bush, 13 to 14 cts; apples, per bush, 64 cts; veal, 3 to 70 per lb; turkeys, 80c to \$1.75.

MR. GEORGE A. DOCKENDORE, of North River, has the following to say concerning the recent trotting challenge of Alex. Morrison, of Tryon:—"I notice in last week's EXAMINER, a challenge issued by Mr. Alexander Morrison, in which he offers to trot his stallion French Sporter against any stallion, gelding or mare on the Island, race to take place on Summerside ice on the 15th March. Now, I consider my stallion Black Pilot too valuable to trot to ice, therefore I have no intention of accepting the challenge at present, but will be very happy to accommodate Mr. Morrison on or about September next, on any good track on the Island, for the sum of \$500 a side."

TO-MORROW being the feast of Ireland's patron Saint, will be celebrated as usual by the Irishmen of this city. At 9 a. m. the members of the Benevolent Irish Society will meet at their hall, Prince Street, where they will form in procession, and headed by a band of music, march to St. Dunstan's Cathedral, where a Pontifical High Mass will be celebrated and a sermon suitable for the occasion preached by Rev. Father Boyd. At the conclusion of the services the procession will reform and march through the principal streets of the city. In the evening a grand concert will take place in the Market Hall. A choice programme has been prepared and an enjoyable evening is anticipated.

DOMINION PARLIAMENT

THE RIEL MATTER, &c.

OTTAWA, March 15.

House met at three.
After petitions, on Mr. Speaker directing the House to introduction of Bills,

Sir Hector stated that Landry's resolution concerning the Government was very far down on the list, and could not be reached to-day unless by consent of the House. He would therefore move that Landry's motion be made first for the order of the day.

Blair objected on the ground that the Government had not brought down papers needed. Unanimous consent being required, Langvin's motion dropped.

In answer, Chapeau said Langelier, Laurier, Laflamme and Mercier had never sent a petition to the Government, praying for the exercise of Royal clemency in Riel's case.

After several speakers had finished, the House adjourned at 12.20.

Strong Language.

TORONTO, March 15.

A Washington correspondent states that Senator Frye is in receipt of a letter from a prominent member of the Dominion Parliament asking that the Canadian Dominion be included in his (Frye's) bill for a congress of American nations. The writer said Canada would enter into such a treaty, and if the English Government refused their consent then Canada would cut loose from Great Britain.

St. Patrick's Day.

LONDON, March 15.

Parnell publicly urges members of the Nationalist Party in Ulster, to refrain from celebrating St. Patrick's Day by demonstrations, such as parades, likely to anger Orangemen. In his circular, advising this course, he says:—"Do not irritate Orangemen, however misguided you may deem them. This is of vital importance now."

Gladstone's Irish Plans.

LONDON, March 15.

In the House, Gladstone authorizes the statement that he will take no notice of the various versions of his Irish plans recently given to the public. He says all stories published regarding his intentions with respect to Ireland are entirely baseless. He hopes to present his Irish programme in the House of Commons on Monday next.

A Contradiction.

LONDON, March 15.

Mr. Henegge authorizes a contradiction of the statement that he had resigned the office of Chancellor of Duchy of Lancaster. Gladstone occupied his usual place in the Commons this afternoon.

The Oregon

NEW YORK, March 15.

The value of the cargo of the sunken steamer Oregon was \$250,000. The entire loss will amount to \$1,500,000.

Has Not Resigned.

LONDON, March 15.

Trevelyan denies that he has tendered his resignation.
