**Nickel Workers Wage Demands Turned Down**

SUDBURY, Ont. (CP)—A conciliation board turned down the wage demand of 14,000 workers at the International Nickel Company of Canada Tuesday.

Mike Solski, Sudbury representative of the International Union of Mine, Mill and Smelter Workers (Ind.) said the union was "completely dissatisfied" with the report. Mine-Mill represents Inco workers at the Sudbury and Port Colborne, Ont. works.

The board's majority report, presented by Chairman Judge D. C. Thomas and company nominee Robert Bigelow, said a wage increase is not justified at this time but proposed a one-year agreement in hopes the world nickel picture might improve.

**SHOULD GET HIKE**

A minority report by union nominee K. C. Woodsworth recommended the 10-per-cent pay increase sought by Mine-Mill. It said the company had refused to make any offer or concessions. Union officials meet to ponder the next move. The union is legally free to strike next Tuesday, a week from the publication of the report.

**Immigrant Flow Slows This Year**

OTTAWA (CP) — Canada admitted 67,744 immigrants in the first half of this year compared with 102,416 in the same period last year.

Biggest group, according to an announcement Tuesday from the immigration department, was destined for manufacturing and mechanical work. This totalled 10,806.

About 5,000 were laborers. Another 6,000 were ticketed for various services. Some 3,000 were headed for farm work.

The largest group — 34,400 — headed for Ontario. Some 15,000 were bound for Quebec.
