

The Late Mrs. Edith Myers

After a long illness, there passed away on March 4, 1955, at the home of her daughter, Mrs. Ralph B. MacCaull, Carleton Siding, Mrs. Edith Myers in her 78th year. She was born in Fredericton, P. E. I., a daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. John Weeks. In the year 1900 she was united in marriage with Mr. Hermas Myers, Carleton. Shortly after the death of her husband in 1947, she made her home with her daughter at Carleton Siding.

Surviving are one daughter and two sons. The daughter is Mrs. Ralph B. MacCaull, and the sons, Heber Myers, Carleton, and John Myers at Carleton Siding. Also surviving are one sister, Mrs. Benjamin Craswell, Fredericton, and six brothers: Rev. Ernest S. and Albert Weeks in Bedeque, William H. Weeks, Stornoway, Sask., Gordon C. Weeks, Vancouver, B. The funeral service was held on Monday, March 7. Following a short private service at the home in Carleton Siding at 2 p.m. conducted by her pastor, Rev. George K. Ward, the remains were taken to Bedeque United Church where a large gathering of relatives and friends from various sections of the Island assembled.

Rev. Mr. Ward was assisted in the church service by Rev. Lloyd Archer, pastor of Tryon United Church. The following favorite hymns of the deceased were sung by the choir: "The Lord's My Shepherd" and "Rock of Ages"; with Mrs. Walter Craig as organist. Mrs. Hedley Lowther and Mrs. John Haslam sang as a duet "We Are Going Down The Valley One By One", while Mrs. Blanche Harper played the music.

Mr. Ward paid a touching tribute to the life of the deceased. She was a devoted wife and mother, a loyal and affectionate friend, an earnest and devoted Christian. During her long illness she was never heard to murmur or complain.

The pall bearers were six nephews: Morley Bell, Walter Bonness, Percy Boyle, Albert Craswell, Boyd and Milton Weeks. Interment was in the Searlestown Cemetery beside the remains of her late husband and her two daughters who passed away many years ago.
