LOCAL AND OTHER ITEMS.

SNOW.—The first snow of the season fell early this morning.

CHURCH TEA.—The ladies of St. Paul's congregation will have a tea and sale on the 12th of December.

DID NOT LEAVE.—The St. Lawrence did not leave for Pictou this morning on account of the storm.

THE CAMPANA arrived from Montreal yesterday afternoon and left again during the night. She had a general cargo both ways.

CROWDED OCT.—Correspondence agent the appointment of Mr. Jordan and other matters, crowded out, will appear to-morrow.

IMPROVEMENTS.—The Royal Electric Company have recently erected a large addition to their station, and are now putting in a new dynamo and plant, the whole costing, it is stated, about \$5,000.

BLOWS DOWN.—The flag-staff on Wright's building was blown down this afternoon and broken. The window of Rackham's shop, on the main floor, narrowly escaped being broken by the falling pole.

THEY AT THE HOSPITAL.—Mr. Edmund McDonald, the only son of Mr. Laughlin McDonald, of Scotch Lake, died last night at the City Hospital. He was landed from the American schooner Epps G. Tarr, and entered the hospital on the 4th of this month suffering from meningitis of the brain. He was given the best of care and was attended by Dr. S. R. Jenkins. But the disease proved too much for the efforts made to conquer it. The body was taken on this morning's train to Souris.

Messenger, of South Farmington, picked the last of the strawberries on his farm during the week of October 4th, and that Herbert Whitman, also of South Farmington, had trees in full bloom on the same date. From the same paper we also learn that J. M. Givens picked in his garden Jubilee roses, Halifax, on Wednesday morning, black-berry blossoms and berries; and that Mrs. Knight, Victoria road, had some luscious raspberries on her tea table last Wednesday evening, just picked from her own garden.

FROM ALL POINTS OF THE COMPASS.

Cholera Prevalent in Alexandria.

ALEXANDRIA, Egypt, Oct. 16.—The total number of cases of cholera at Damietta up to the evening of Oct. 15 was 16, and the number of deaths up to the same time, 4.

WINEY, Oct. 16.—Investigation proves that the disastrous prairie fires of the past week were, in every instance, caused by the carelessness of farmers or men in charge of threshing engines.

Boston's Masonic Temple.

BOSTON, Oct. 17.—A special meeting of the Leland Lodge of Masons of Massachusetts was held at Union Hall this afternoon, and after brief discussion the Board of Directors were authorized to dispose of the Masonic Temple property recently damaged by fire. This is supposed to mean that a new building will be erected.

The Spanish Sailors Found Guilty.

MADRID, Oct. 16.—The Imparcial's Hayti dispatch says: The court martial has condemned the lieutenant commanding the Spanish gunboat Mercante, which was recently captured and abandoned by insurgents while lying at anchor near Santiago de Cuba. The crew of the vessel are also found equally guilty with the commanding officer. The punishment will be made known later.

Great Damage from Drought.

CINCINNATI, Oct. 16.—Drought is causing great damage in western Indiana, Ohio, Kentucky and West Virginia. There has been no rain for weeks. The water in the river is so low a boat cannot float, and large quantities of produce of all kinds are rotting on the landing places. The loss will reach \$1,000,000. A water famine prevails in many places, scores of small towns being without a drop.

A Boy Killed by Smoking Cigarettes.

PITTSBURGH, Oct. 16.—Father Bigham, of St. Bridget's Roman Catholic Church, declared that Bartholomew Toomey, aged 14, had died in convulsions last Thursday, at his father's house on Wick street, of cigarette smoking. The father admits this to be the case, and says he has a 12-year-old son also addicted to the habit and that he has already had symptoms from the same cause.

Spanish Troops Defeated by Rebels.

SANTIAGO DE CUBA, Oct. 3, via Key West, Oct. 16.—A battle took place between the Spaniards and Rebels, October 7, between a Spanish troop and rebels which lasted five hours. The Spaniards were forced to retreat, leaving five officers killed, ten officers wounded, and 350 soldiers killed and wounded. The Spanish troops numbered 2,600 and the insurgents, under Antonio Maceo, 800. The rebels might have captured the entire force of the enemy had they not run short of ammunition.

Relations Between Russia and Germany.

BERLIN, Oct. 16.—The Kilmische Zeitung, writing of the relations between Russia and Germany, says: "The relations between the Russian minister of foreign affairs, during his stay in Germany, enjoyed it thoroughly, and had a change of ideas with the leading German statesmen. He clearly intimated that in the Franco-German relations, his efforts will be directed toward the maintenance of peace, and he has the assurance of Germany in his earnest wish for friendly relations with Russia."

Reforms in Turkish Administration.

CONSTANTINOPLE, Oct. 16.—Proposals submitted by representatives of Russia, France and England, for Turkish administrative reforms in Armenia have been accepted by Said Pasha, awaiting the approval and signature of the Sultan, before whom they had been laid. The Sultan's reply is not known, but it is hoped by the representatives of the powers that in the course of the week an imperial decree will be issued embodying the provisions of a new scheme in which they stipulate, among other things, that the imperial deputy commissioner charged with the execution of reforms shall be a Christian.

St. John's Custom Department Demoralized.

St. John's, N. F., October 16.—The smuggling disclosures which are growing now involve nearly every liquor dealer in the city. It is estimated the loss of revenue last year through the operations of the syndicate was \$60,000. Prominent officials, it is alleged, have been in active collusion with the smugglers. The whole customs department of the colony is demoralized. The board of revenue will prosecute every person involved and the magistrates threaten to cancel the license of every liquor dealer whose connection with the syndicate is proved.

These Armenians and Turks.

LONDON, Oct. 16.—The Daily News prints a despatch from Constantinople saying the agitation there is being renewed owing to the neglect of the Turkish officials to fulfill their promises given to Armenian refugees when they left their churches. Another attack was made on the Armenians on the 12th instant, when four were killed and a number wounded. It is alleged the police refused to interfere. On account of the action of the police the Armenians are again flocking to their churches for protection. Details have been received of an organized attack on Armenians by a Moslem mob at Akkisar, on October 9th. Forty-six Armenians were killed and a number wounded.
