The Latest Treaty of Reciprocity.

The Treaty between the United States and Spain, which is now ready for the approval of Congress and the Spanish Government, provides that tonnage or consular fees shall not be charged, and that special privileges shall be given to the commercial travellers of both countries.

On the other hand, the United States will admit free of duty sugar not above No. 16 Dutch standard, molasses, coffee, dye and other woods, cocoa, fruits, vegetables, and some other products. Tobacco leaf, manufactured, is to be entered at a reduction of fifty per cent. of the present tariff rates.

Editorial Notes.

The Manitoba Farmers are commencing the agitation which they carried on unsuccessfully last winter. They are led by the same men who decried the country, and who are responsible for the loss which their mischief entailed on the Province.

We congratulate Major Irving on the distinction he has received in being appointed Commandant of the Canadian Artillery Team at Shoeburyness, England. This distinction is, no doubt, due to his conspicuous ability as an officer, and to the soldierly way in which the Island Team under his command acquitted themselves in the great Artillery competition at Quebec.

Here is a fact which illustrates the development of our home industry. In 1881, the Canadian Pacific Railway Company was obliged to import 85 p. c. of its railway supplies of all kinds. This year the quantity imported does not exceed 7 p. c. on the whole amount needed.

At the Empire Club dinner in honor of Sir John Macdonald, the Marquis of Lorne presided, and proposed the health of the guest in a complimentary speech. Sir John, in reply, reviewed the forty years of his public life in Canada, and said whether he was speaking in the backwoods or in the cities of the Dominion the sentiment of loyalty to England was always welcomed by his hearers.

would, of its own choice, always remain in close connection with Great Britain, but it was obvious that there ought to be a closer connection. But he considered the proposal for a direct representation of the Dominion of Canada in the British House of Commons as entirely impracticable.

Both the London Times and the Standard think that the loan of £5,000,000 which England offers to raise and guarantee, will be applied to the payment of the Governmental expenses of Egypt and for irrigation, and that Alexandria indemnities will be covered by the proposed issue of £5,000,000 preference stock, with Egyptian security.

The Board of Education have appointed Mr. William Cain, Inspector of schools for the Eastern Insular district, and Mr. John Artuckle, Inspector of schools for the Western district. Messrs Curran and Murray having both resigned.

The growth in Britain of the silo system of preserving fodder has been very rapid. A few years ago only a few enthusiastic experimenters had silos, but there are now, according to figures collected last June, no fewer than 60 silos, with a total capacity of 1,861,744 feet, and an average capacity of 3,052 feet.

The cultivation of cranberries in Massachusetts, is a growing industry. According to statistics, returned to the Bureau of Agriculture, the number of bushels gathered in 1865 was 34,621, and the value \$101,538; in 1875 the quantity had increased to 140,318, of which 45,267 were raised in Barnstable county alone—the total value there being \$113,818, and in the whole state \$289,113.

Talmage on Toleration.

From a sermon recently preached by Rev. Dr. Talmage, on Religious Toleration, we clip the following:—

"In tracing out the origin of sectarianism, or bigotry, I find that a great deal of it comes from wrong education in the home circle. There are parents who do not think it wrong to caricature and jeer the peculiar forms of religion in the world, and denounce other sects and other denominations. It is very often the case that that kind of education acts just opposite to what was expected, and the children grow up, and after a while go and see for themselves, and looking in those churches and finding that the people are good there, and they love God and keep his commandments, by natural reaction they go and join those very churches. I could mention the names of prominent ministers of the Gospel who spent their whole life bombarding other denominations, and who lived to see their children preach the Gospel in those very denominations. But it is very often the case that bigotry starts in a household, and that the subject of it never recovers. There are tens of thousands of bigots ten years old. Bigotry is often the child of ignorance. You seldom find a man with large intellect who is a bigot. It is the man who thinks he knows a great deal but does not. That man is almost always a bigot. The whole tendency of education and civilization is to bring a man out of that kind of state of mind and heart. There is no man more to be pitied than he who has just one idea in his head, no more, no less. Better vacuity overthrowing the philosophical theory than an entire vacuum is an impossibility, than just one idea wandering around about in perpetual loneliness and bachelorhood, waiting through the desert of the man's intellect. Better no idea at all than only one idea. Run up your schools and your colleges and your universities. More light, less sectarianism. There is nothing that will so soon kill bigotry as sunshine—God's sunshine. A man is a bigot who shuts his eyes to all the lessons he might learn from other denominations. You are wrong and I am right and that ends it. No taste for exploration, for investigation. No disposition to reason the matter over. And from the realm of God's glorious truth, over which an archangel might fly from eternity to eternity and never reach the limit, the man shuts himself out—a blind mole under a crust of stick."

On his arrival at Quebec from Rome, Archbishop Taschereau will be publicly received by the citizens, and presided with an address of welcome.
