TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER. DOMINION PARLIAMENT. HOUSE IN SUPPLY Sir Charles Tupper the Chief Point of Attack. NEW SENATORS INTRODUCED OTTAWA, May 27. The whole of yesterday's session was spent in Committee of Supply, consequently only three items were passed. The chief point of attack was the High Commissioner against whom the Opposition will probably move a vote of censure. McMullen praised Sir Charles' ability and called him an ornament to Canada; but said that it was inconsistent with the dignity of his office to poke around after the egg and poultry trade. The Minister of Customs dressed down Sir Richard Cartwright, as also did the Hon. C. H. Tupper, contrasting the expenditures of the Customs and Marine Departments during Cartwright's administration as compared with those of the present administration. Hon. Mr. Tupper has given notice of a resolution that it is expedient to make an annual grant of one hundred and sixty thousand dollars to aid the development of the seal fisheries, and for the encouragement of the building and fitting up of improved fishing vessels and improvements for the benefit of Canada. THE SENATE. MAY 27. In the Senate, the new senators, Howland, McDonald and Snowball were introduced. Feeling tributes were paid to the memory of the late R. P. Haythorne, in which Senator Andrew McDonald joined and thanked the senators for their kind expressions of sympathy. James A. Davison, assistant clerk of the Senate, died last night. The Tarte-McTeevy case was heard yesterday before the Committee of Privileges and Elections. Nothing important was elicited. NEWFOUNDLAND. A New Proposal. La Grippe Sweeping Over the Country. St. JOHN'S, Nfld., May 27. In the Newfoundland House of Assembly last night, in the division on motion to extend the terms of the Local Coercion Act until the end of 1893, the members of the Government party voted with the Opposition. The session was held with closed doors. The Imperial Government has made a private proposal to the Newfoundland delegates which will obviate the passage of the Lord Knutsford Bill. The delegates are now considering the proposal. Despatches from Lunenburg say that an alarming epidemic of la grippe is sweeping over that part of Newfoundland. Hundreds are afflicted. The doctors cannot attend all the victims and some of the doctors are themselves very sick. The mortality at Benaring and Fortune Bay is really terrible. The Pope's Encyclical. BERLIN, May 27. The Emperor William has telegraphed the Pope that he is pleased with the encyclical on the labor question. NEW YORK, May 27. Cardinal Gibbons has cabled that the encyclical has produced an excellent impression in America. Senator Howland's Return. OTTAWA, May 27. Hon. Senator Howland returned to Ottawa yesterday, fortified in his faith of the practicability of the proposed tunnel through the opinions of Sir Douglas Fox and other prominent engineers. His conference with the Newfoundland delegates has been attended with satisfactory results. The Portuguese in Africa. LONDON, May 27. Latest advices state that Portuguese troops are committing serious outrages in South Africa. Immediate British occupation of the coast seems imperative. Weather Bulletin. TORONTO, May 27. -10 a. m.
