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**KING'S COUNTY EXHIBITION.**

**A Very Good Display.**

The Weather Unfavorable.

The King's County annual exhibition is in progress at Georgetown today. The attendance is very good considering the unfavorable weather, and the show on the whole is highly creditable to the County. The exhibition was formally opened at one o'clock by His Honor Lieut. Governor H. Swan, whose remarks were most interesting and instructive and in keeping with the occasion.

The show of horses, cattle, sheep and pigs is, as usual, excellent, reflecting credit on the breeders of the county, but the entries would have been much larger were it not for the unfavorable weather.

The exhibits in the drill shed are neatly arranged. There are in all about one thousand entries. The display is in some classes not so extensive as last year, yet in other classes there is a gratifying increase. This is especially true of grains and roots and vegetables.

As might be expected in a year when the fruit crop is very poor, the showing is not so great as it was at the last exhibition. But many of the samples shown are fully equal to what was to be seen at the show in Charlottetown.

There is a very creditable display of flowers and plants; and of woollens and flax goods there is a large and highly creditable showing.

The exhibit of fancy work is large, and the quality and workmanship of the articles shown is of the best. There are some very handsome patchwork quilts in silk, as well as some exceedingly pretty sofa pillows.

There were six factories competing for first prize in cheese, and the quality of the various exhibits was so good that Mr. Spillet, the judge, found the task of deciding which was the best an exceedingly difficult one. He awarded first prize to St. George's factory, second to the Lakesville factory, and third to the factory at Murray Harbor North. There were only three exhibits of home-made cheese. The showing of butter was smaller than usual.

John McLean & Son exhibit a very handsome driving sleigh and a buggy. This enterprising firm also show some excellent farm carts and truck wagons.

An improved milk can is shown by Mr. John D. Bell, of Montague, who also makes a display of tinware that is in every way creditable to himself and to the thriving village from which he hails.

**ADDRESS TO CONSUL KANE.**

At the American Consulate, this morning, the Consul Hon. D. J. Kane, was waited upon by Judge Reiddin, S. Conroy, Dr. S. R. Jenkins, Dr. Kelly, P. Blake, Esq., J. J. Davies, Esq., Charles Lyons, Esq., and James Byrne, Esq., and presented with the following address, accompanied by a service of silver: "Hon. D. J. Kane, United States Consul, etc., etc.

The announcement that you will soon leave the Province of Prince Edward Island has been to us a cause of the deepest regret.

Four years ago you came to our shores as United States Consul. Those fine qualities of mind and heart, which you possess in so remarkable a degree, soon were discerned, and caused our people to give you without reserve their friendship and respect. Your benevolence, urbanity and courtesy, so constantly manifested, have been very warmly appreciated, and the habitual kindness of your disposition lent such a charm to the performance of your official duties that there will ever remain with our people many lasting memories of your consulship.

The great Republic, the genius of whose people has placed her amongst the foremost nations of the world, has had in you a representative, who most faithfully discharged the duties of a responsible position and was ever ready in the exercise of the functions of the Consular office to give his most loyal efforts to the service of his country. But in this fidelity and patriotism, you have ever shown yourself possessed of that becoming courtesy, that should always characterize the representative of a great Commonwealth.

The bonds that bind the people of the Canadian Dominion and the citizens of the United States must ever be strengthened by the recollection that from the same fountains have flowed the language that is spoken by almost all the inhabitants of the North American continent, the literature that is the common property of the people of the two countries, and jurisprudence that is the basis of their laws and the foundations of their liberties.

In bidding you farewell, we ask you to accept this service of silver as a slight token of our friendship. We beg to assure you and your amiable wife that we will always be glad to hear of your success and we are confident that wherever your future home may be, the fine social qualities which distinguished you both whilst with us, will be appreciated by those among you will make your home."

Mr. Kane made a fitting reply thanking the gentlemen for their expressions of regard and regretting his departure from the Island, where he will leave many sincere friends behind him. Consul Kane will leave by the Halifax on Friday next for Boston.
