MARITIME CHEESE.—The Co-Operative Farmer, of Sussex, N. B., says a number of Maritime cheese factories have contracted their season's output at about 8 1/2 cents per pound. Those factories which are making butter are getting a ready sale at from 17 cents to 18 1/2 cents per pound. It is probable the Sussex factory will turn 10,000 pounds of milk per day into butter through the season, the balance of the milk going into cheese.

A PLUCKY ACT.—While Mr. and Mrs. Clarke Chapman, of Chapman's corner, were absent last Friday evening, their young son upset a lighted lamp. The only other occupant of the house was Hattie Wallace, a girl fourteen years of age.
